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Unit Summary

Many people, including Christians, settle for a very self-focused life goal—to arrive at death safely, with as much comfort as possible along the way. This is hardly God's best! Though the world offers fun and excitement, only the Lord's plan promises deep, rich fulfillment (John 10:10). God makes available a life of adventure when believers pursue the purposes for which He made them. What a privilege to introduce children to this journey!

We can help kids elevate their perspective to see that life can be thrilling when they follow God's plan. We can help children develop a Biblical worldview, a broader view of God's purpose in the world and what His plan is for every Christian. We can help children learn how to understand what God's specific plan is for them and how to form an action plan to experience everything God has for them.

This series will help your kids discover God's will for their lives! They will learn that growing in Biblical knowledge, in Christlike character, and in godly conduct are key to fulfilling God's wonderful plan.

Lesson Summary

There is an old saying: "If you aim at nothing, you are sure to hit it." Knowing that God has a specific plan for your life is wonderful. But if you want to see that plan realized, there are responsibilities you must carry out. Wanting to grow in knowledge and character and conduct is great, but just wanting something rarely makes it happen. What is needed is an action plan. This lesson is designed to encourage children to be intentional about making specific goals

and determining specific actions they can take that will help them realize God's plan for their lives.



SPARK INTEREST

Choose from the following activities and ideas to engage kids and grab their attention.



Welcome!—Candy Temptation

As children arrive, have a giant bowl of small candies in the front of the room on a table. A giant sign that says "DO NOT TAKE ANY CANDY" should be prominently on display near the bowl. Do not post any leader near the candy to protect it. If any children take candy, let them. If any children come and tattle that candy has been taken, the answer is simply, "Don't tattle; you need to just worry about yourself." The point will be to see if any do. It is important that they are small candies, but there should be a lot of them to make it tempting. The children's actions will be dealt with later in the lesson. Grace will be extended, but only after the point has been made.



Let's Meet-n-Greet!

Have all the children leave their seats and meet three kids they don't know. They should learn the names of the kids and ask them, "If you had \$1,000 and had one hour to spend it, what would you do?" Leaders need to do the same!

Leaders, be sure to stop whatever you are doing to move through the audience and greet the children, especially those you do not recognize. Announce any birthdays for the week. (See the **How to Use DiscipleTown** guide for quick and easy ways to acknowledge visitors and birthdays.)



Let's Worship!

During the worship time, be sure to comment and focus on God's desire that we experience the awesome plan that He has for each of us. Also emphasize that we need to follow Him in order to see that plan come to pass.

Puppet Intro

Leader & puppet introduce today's lesson. You will find a scripted version of this intro at the end of the lesson. **Supplies:** puppet, calendar

Puppet has a calendar for 2027, and he is writing on the calendar what he is going to do during that year. He has very specific things at precise times of day—down to the minute, years in advance. He has written such activities as taking out the garbage, stubbing his big toe, and playing tic-tac-toe. Think of many more examples. Leader asks what puppet is doing. Puppet explains that he understands the lesson is on planning ahead and having an action plan for the future, so he's been working hard on his plan and is up to 2027! Leader explains that we can't make detailed plans that far ahead, but we can plan some things. We don't know what the future holds—certainly not in 2027!—but we can plan to do our part so that God can do His part. The point isn't to plan every detail of our lives—it is to make sure that we are doing our part to grow in knowledge and character and conduct so that we can see God's plan for us unfold. If we aren't doing our part, God won't force His part. Puppet says, "Oh, so I need to plan to attend church every chance I get, do my best in school and Sunday school, and plan to be working on both my character and conduct?" The leaders says, "I couldn't have said it better myself!"



Let's Play!—Lily Pad Lava Relay

Supplies: large sheets of paper



Kids, this is a relay race that will require you to form an action plan in order to succeed!

Choose two teams of five kids each. You may choose to do boys against girls or teams from different sides of the room, or another breakdown that fits your situation, but be sure that both teams have an equal breakdown of older and younger children. You will need some older children to think through the logistics of the race and to help the younger children. It is okay to have younger children participate, but a team of all young kids will not be as likely to succeed as one that includes upper elementary children.

Using masking tape, make two lines on opposite sides of the play area. Explain that between the two lines—the race area—is hot lava that *cannot* be touched. If a player touches it with a foot, the player must return (run!) all the way back to the beginning. (The player may run over the lava when this happens.) All players begin on the same side. Each team is given only *three* pieces of paper. It is best if they can be larger than letter-size paper, but no bigger than 11" x 17". A fun color adds to the excitement, and laminating the pieces of paper will help them not tear. (If you can't laminate them, have replacements available!) If you can have carpet squares or something similar, that is fine—be creative—but each piece must be big and sturdy enough for two children to barely stand on, or for one child to stand on and another to step on it and over. The object of the game is for each team to travel across the "lava" (the room) safely to the other side using the "lily pads" (paper) without ever stepping in the lava. It *can* be done, but it takes some planning! The secret is that two travel at the same time using the three lily pads; when standing on the second lily pad, move the back one to the front and move forward again. Then, once one child is safely across, the other one must return across the "lava" to get another team

member. It is important not to give any help or hints; let each team figure out how to get across the “lava.” Of course, the children will learn from watching each other. That is okay.

The Point: Life is full of challenges. We gain knowledge as we think through challenges and observe others. We develop character as we learn to work with others. We grow in conduct by behaving well, not cheating, learning from failure when we mess up, and so on.



Connect with Your Kids

Consider doing something incredibly silly this week. Is there something absolutely nonsensical that you could teach the children how to do? An action plan for how to make chocolate-covered ants? How to create modern art with whipped cream in your hair? How to illustrate a Bible story with ketchup and mustard on a white dress shirt? Or eating ten Ding Dongs after placing them on each of your fingers? Laughing children are learning children!

Connection Tip: Let’s face it: we remember things that made us laugh, and we especially remember *people* who made us laugh! If you want to make a lifelong connection with children, do something absolutely hysterical that they will be talking about ten years from now. You can do it. Set your pride aside, and do something crazy. You don’t have to do this every week—just this week!



DiscipleTown Visitor

Coach Katrina*: A woman hurries by carrying a whistle and a ball. Leader stops her and asks, “Why do you like being a coach?” The coach says, “I like it because I get to help kids reach their full potential. I give them an action plan both for their preparation and for the game.” Leader says that God is like a coach; He wants to see kids succeed in life! He wants to help them prepare for life and win during the different “meets” or “competitions” that come up along the way. Just as there are rules in sports, there are rules in life that we must learn to obey if we are to win. Just as in sports there are various techniques to learn to get better at winning, in life, there are techniques we can learn to help us be more victorious in our Christian life—techniques for Bible study, prayer, and getting along with people. “The more teachable I am, the more of a winner I will become, whether in sports or in life!”

Let's Search!—Bible Dash

Supplies: Bibles



Ask all kids with Bibles to participate, or invite a few volunteers to come to the front. As children hold Bibles closed with hands on covers, state the Bible reference twice, then on the command "SEARCH!" have the students race to locate the verse. Once they have a finger on the verse, they can stand and call out, "FOUND IT!" Have the first child read the verse aloud while you project the verse on a screen via PowerPoint. See suggestions below for comments on each verse. Keep your comments brief and to the point of the lesson.

Let's Learn!—My Action Plan! James 1:22

- **FACT: God has an amazing, incredible, exciting, totally cool PLAN for my life!**
- **BUT: There is a condition. I must do MY PART to see God's awesome plan unfold!**
- **THEREFORE, I want to grow in knowledge and character and conduct!**
- **I NEED AN ACTION PLAN!**



How to grow in KNOWLEDGE (Proverbs 1:7)

Show a Bible. If you have taught the **DiscipleTown How to Use My Bible** unit, review what you have taught on how to have a quiet time. Talk about the importance of reading and studying the Bible and learning all you can from God's Word. Emphasize to children the advantage they have as children. By starting their study of the Bible at a young age, this book will help them throughout their whole life.

How to grow in CHARACTER (Mark 12:30-31)

Character is who you are when no one is looking. It is the REAL YOU. Your action plan should be to start making the person you are when no one is around match the person you are when other people are around. A person of good character is genuine or real. No more pretending to be someone you aren't. Good character is working on being more like Jesus. It is remembering WWJHMD: What would Jesus Have Me Do? That is why the growth in knowledge is helpful. The more you know your Bible, the more you will know what Jesus would probably have you do.



How to grow in CONDUCT (James 1:22)

Conduct is your behavior. It is choosing to act in a way that pleases God. If you taught the DiscipleTown How to Grow Spiritual Fruit unit, you can easily review a little of what you learned in that course. Emphasize the need to allow the Spirit of God to work through us. **Our conduct improves only as we learn to walk in the Spirit and allow Jesus to live through us. As we abide in Christ, this will happen more and more. But it will never happen automatically—it will always require effort on our part. We'll never be off the hook. God wants to see our effort—but He will always help us, too. Our action plan can be to start and end our day in prayer, asking to be filled with His Spirit and seeking His help in the areas where we know we are weak.**

Candy Bowl Follow-up: There was a candy bowl out earlier with a sign that said, "Do Not Take Any Candy." I do not want anyone tattling on kids who took candy. If they want to, they can keep the candy; but I will also give them an opportunity to confess if they wish. We have been learning about having an action plan for following God's plan. Do you think it was God's plan for those kids to steal the candy? (No.) Do you think everyone here had the knowledge to read the sign that said not to take any? (Yes.) Character means that if the sign said not to take the candy, you wouldn't. But I think some kids did, didn't they? (Yes.) Their conduct didn't match their knowledge or character, did it? (No.) Well, the truth is, there is a reason I said not to take any candy. It is because I had something better for you all. That candy was left out this week, and a mouse got into it and I saw droppings in it; it isn't healthy to eat! Let kids respond. I was just kidding, but what if that had been true? It could be. Or it could be old, or maybe spoiled. I know a bowl of candy is a tough temptation for a child, but I have something even better—a better candy that I'd like to give to all of you, but only if those who took some candy before the service are willing to come up and put back the candy they took. If you ate it, no worries, there was nothing wrong with it, but just come put the wrapper back, or just tell me you took one, and I'll give you a high-five and forgive you. And I'll give everyone something even better. Allow those kids to come forward. Then give all the kids a better candy!

When we see that God tells us no, we must trust that He has a reason and that He has something better for us. When we do mess up, I John 1:9 promises that if we confess, He will forgive us and cleanse us—and He still loves us!



Suggested Bible Narrative

The Sending of the Seventy-Two—Luke 10:1–24

Jesus wanted to spread the good news of the Gospel, so He had an action plan! He sent out 72 men ahead of Him, two by two, to every city He was going to be visiting. He gave them specific instructions about where to stay, what to say, and what to do. He even gave them power to do amazing things in His name! God still has an action plan today, and that plan involves YOU! He wants YOU to go ahead of Him! He will help you know what do and say and will even give you power to do things in His name!



Dee's Disciple Tip: Remember—a week without the Bible will make one weak!

KeyVerse

Topic: God's Plan for Us

Reference: Jeremiah 29:11



One of the most wonderful things you can teach children about Scripture is to personalize it and to replace the word *you* with their name so that they understand that God is talking to them. One of the best verses to do that with is Jeremiah 29:11, even verses 12–13. Review and personalize the theme verse. Have the children replace the word “you” with their own name. It is fine for all kids to do this at the same time out loud. (“You” occurs four times in verse 11, and nine times in verses 11–13.)



Dramatize the Point

Act this out or read as a story. **Supplies:** camping/hiking gear, "Crazy Campers" PowerPoint, same actors from Lesson One



On this final week, our crazy campers finally get it right! Work with your actors. Using whatever props you have, write the skits so that the campers get it right finally! They gather for the final day of their camping trip to go on a mountain climb; each has come prepared with his or her part of the action plan! One has brought a map for the hike, another has a rope, another has a video camera, another has a flag for the top of the climb, and so on. (Improvise with your own ideas and the equipment you have.)

The Point: **The campers have learned the importance of working together, following a plan, and having an action plan. As a result, they are sure to have a great time on their final hike! In our Christian life, we need to do the same—be informed, be prepared, and have an action plan so that we can be successful!**



Object Talks—The Medal and the Handcuffs

Supplies: video projection

The video clip for this lesson features Karl, the Kidologist, doing a short object lesson featuring a medal and a pair of handcuffs. They discuss the need for Christians to have an action plan to live a victorious Christian life in order to receive God's reward and avoid spiritual bondage. Use this short teaching video to show the kids or to train a leader to do the talk "live." *Featured verse: 2 Timothy 2:5; Hebrews 11:6*



Let's Talk!—Small Group Discussion

Name something that if you did it today could impact your future a year from today. This doesn't have to be a "spiritual thing." Think of anything you could do today that could impact the future. After several of the examples, use Paul's Power Principle in a sentence. **Wow. See? Your actions today can affect your future tomorrow!**

Use the following questions to help children process what they've learned:

- 1) Have you ever had to really plan ahead for something? What, and why? How did it turn out?
- 2) Planning for our spiritual life is probably a new thought for most of you. What do you think of that?
- 3) Do you have a daily quiet time?
- 4) What part of an action plan is hardest for you?
- 5) How can we pray for you? (Take time to pray for one another.)



DiscipleTown Super Citizen

Have your leaders look for a child who did something very helpful during the service. Choose that child as the Super Citizen of the week. Announce that the choice was made on the basis of the child's character and conduct!



Let's Pray!

Chip's Snack Time!

Supplies: various snacks

Let the kids make their own trail mix from an assortment of ingredients. As they are enjoying their snack, talk about how life is a journey. Explain that when hikers go on a long hike, they need to plan ahead and prepare for the route and the weather. They need to take the right gear, and they need to travel with good companions. The same is true in our Christian life. You can have fun with the comparisons of hiking and the Christian walk as they enjoy their trail mix.

Group Activity

Supplies: bags, various props

Choose two or three teams of four to five kids who are willing to be actors in an impromptu skit. Give each team a bag and tell the kids that it is filled with miscellaneous props from around the house. (Each bag has different objects.) Send the teams off into different rooms to prepare, perhaps during the worship time. When they return, they are to perform a three-minute skit that uses every person in the group and every object in the bag. The audience then votes by applause for the best skit.

The Point: The kids had to work with what they had and quickly form an action plan to succeed. In life, we are also given a mixed collection of things and gifts and opportunities and limited time. We must make the most of everything we have with the time we have, and we must do it with a good attitude. If we do, heaven will applaud us!

Additional Ideas

- **Kids in Da Word Rap** During the lesson segment on how to grow in knowledge, have some kids or puppets appear and rap the following lyrics:
