Introducing



I caught up with Willie Goldwire at the Parish Retreat at Epworth-by-the-Sea under a shady oak tree. His wife, Loraine, joined us as I learned more about Willie's life. Like many of us, Willie was raised in the Church. He and two of his three sisters sang in church as children but at that age when children often rebel,

Willie left the "things of God" and made money his god. Years later a daughter was born with a birth defect and when prayers were going to be offered for her, he stepped back into the fold to seek help for his baby girl. In that homecoming, he was saved! His daughter underwent surgery and was fully healed as well!

When he was attending Christian Life Church in the late 1980's, Willie and some other members left with Pastor Ron Chambers to start a new church which later became Christian Revival Center (CRC). He played the guitar as a praise leader, and Freddie Hebron played the sax; Loraine was also on the praise team. Twelve church members, including Willie and Freddie, found the property at 2020 Bull Street for their new church, and God provided the financial resources for them to acquire it. When Pastor Chambers left, the remaining members elected Freddie Hebron as their leader, and most of our readers know the story after that: Pastor Freddie died suddenly and CRC suffered from a declining membership. What you may not know is that the church leadership, including Willie, was getting up at 4 a.m. and praying for their church at 2020 Bull Street when CCA entered the picture. Willie thinks the homeless congregation of CCA was an answer to prayer but he also thinks more prayers are about to be answered.

He is expecting the Holy Spirit to mightily use CCA at 2020 Bull in evangelism. He points out that 2020 is located at the very heart of Savannah, it's on the same latitude as Israel and its very address, "2020," means vision. I think it's these expectations that brought Willie to the planning sessions for the new 5 p.m. service on Sundays—a sense that this may be the next step in God's plan for CRC/CCA and the storied church on the corner of 37th and Bull. Willie is again playing the guitar as part of a team leading worship at 5 p.m. The music in worship has always been a drawing card for Willie. You may remember that he sang a moving prelude with David Duckworth at our first worship service at 2020. He and Loraine are both members of the choir and while he's had no formal training, Willie is enjoying learning new theory and methods in music from Mark Williams and other choir members. Willie loves to

learn new things. The Anglican liturgy was new to him. While he first thought it to be repetitious, he says he now sees Jesus in it.

Willie has two sons and two daughters, all grown, and although he has known Loraine a long time, they are practically newlyweds, having married in February 2012. In fact, it was during a worship service that Willie was called up to the front of the church (everyone thought he was coming up to sing) and then and there he asked Loraine to marry him, totally catching her off guard. What could she say but yes?! Willie makes his living in the construction business (although he did have a stint as a postman in New York for 7 years). He worked a long time with his father and at one time preferred trim carpentry work but now does all types of construction. Willie has been to Haiti five times where he has ministered and helped to give out food and clothing. Haitians have definitely left a mark on his heart.

Willie loves people. His smile is warm and friendly. He likes to kiss and hug those in his church family. He is filled with the Holy Spirit and is grateful to a God who waited on him to come back. He explains, "Who wouldn't serve a God like that? And give Him your all?"

Seven years ago I received an invitation to join a new Community Group in Sandfly. It would meet on Monday nights every week. Frankly, I could not see myself committing to attend a weekly, night time meeting for any purpose. My life was already busy enough. However, the idea of Bible study hooked me into trying it. Shortly thereafter, I could not see myself anywhere else except at that meeting every Monday night.

How exciting!

Over the years people have come and gone for one reason or another but the group that appears on Monday nights is a cohesive, loving group of people on whom I depend for love and support. We have a very special bond that is remarkable and comfortable.

A third reason is the intercessory prayer with which we end each meeting. We bring to each other and the Lord, our own needs as well as those of others. This is such a powerful, amazing moment in time.

Last but not least is the support we have given various ministries through our time, talent and financial resources, The Whitfield Center, CRC Mission to Haiti (Project Bean) and Anglican Campus Fellowship to name a few.

Help us decorate our new CCA Family Christmas Tree!

A brand new tradition begins this Advent with the placement of a freshly cut Christmas tree on the stage of Hebron Hall. This tree is more accurately called a Jesse Tree as it is being decorated in the season of Advent celebrating together the coming of Christ leading us to His birth at Christmas. Since the Jesse Tree is really an Advent Tree anticipating the coming of Christmas it may be more instructive, especially for our children, to allow the Jesse Tree to represent anticipation during Advent while letting the eventual fully decorated tree with ornaments be the celebration of Christmas itself.

The Jesse Tree is named from Isaiah 11:1: "A shoot will spring forth from the stump of Jesse, and a branch out of his roots." It is a vehicle to tell the Story of God in the Old Testament, and to connect the Advent Season



with the faithfulness of God across 4,000 years of history. The Branch is a biblical sign of newness out of discouragement, which became a way to talk about the expected Messiah (for example, Jeremiah 23:5). It is therefore an appropriate symbol of Jesus the Christ, who is the revelation of the grace and faithfulness of God

You and your family have the joyous opportunity to decorate the our new Hebron Hall Jesse Tree as we move as a family through the season of Advent!

Here's how it works. The Jesse Tree will be installed without decoration, other than the lights. You and/or your family then are asked to bring an ornament with a hanger during the season of Advent that you would like to donate to CCA and to hang it lovingly on the tree. With this, we should see our Jesse Tree flower with decoration as we move toward the Christmas celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ!

Sunday, December 6, is not only the Second Sunday of Advent and the first Sunday of December, but it is also St. Nicholas' Day!

The Advent Festival of Lessons and Carols



From the Rector

Why do We do That?

Every Sunday morning we offer intercessory prayer "stations" during the distribution of Holy Communion. This has not always been the case.

When I first arrived at Christ Church twenty-five years ago, I was asked if we could provide intercessors to pray for parishioners who may wish such a ministry in accordance with the instruction of James 5:14-16 – "Is anyone among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer of faith will save the one who is sick, and the Lord will raise him up. And if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven. Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person has great power as it is working."

Some years later, after a sermon on prayer and healing (accompanied by a wonderful testimony of healing by one of our own parishioners), we decided to make this ministry part and parcel of our Sunday worship every Sunday, recognizing that the ministry of Jesus was often summarized as "preaching and healing" (Matthew 4:23; 9:35). Over time, as is the case with many things done repetitively for several years, this ministry was often overlooked by many in the congregation, some of whom I believe would have benefited from it if they had only taken advantage of it.

Nevertheless, we continue faithfully offering this quiet but important ministry every Sunday. Teams of intercessors still make their way quietly to a corner of the church nave and pray for those who seek this ministry. It is an essential element of what it means to be the Church, and a central component of Gospel ministry.

As with most ministries, the invitation to engage in this particular expression of prayer may be summarized as follows: *All may, some should, none must.*

All may – Everyone present is invited to receive this ministry! Your concerns may seem to be "too trivial" to bother others, but if God is calling you to come, please do! There have been numerous times when people were hesitant to come, but afterward told me what a gift of love and grace it was, once they overcame the obstacle of asking for prayer from others.

Some should – There is not a single one of us who can make the Christian journey on our own. There are times when the burdens and troubles of life are more than we can bear. Allowing other members of your family of faith to pray for you and with you can often relieve the oppressive weight of those worries, cares, and pains. You will not be compelled to reveal elements of your life you wish not to reveal. God knows our hearts and circumstances, and He is the one who answers prayer. Praying with others, however, is part of the context God has established through which His grace and healing normally comes (see the James text above).

None must – There is no compulsion here. You are not a "second-string Christian" if you don't take advantage of this ministry. It is not there for a show. But it is *there*.

Just remember: this simple, quiet, but powerful ministry is present for you every Sunday. Perhaps one day you will be grateful it is there.

From the Rector

Advent Preaching Series on Worship: "O Come, Let Us Adore Him"

Robbie Castleman, in his book *Parenting in the Pew* (IVP, 2013, page 25), says "Worship is not a refueling to get us through another week. Worship is not a system of traditions built up over many years of congregational life until everyone feels comfortable. Worship is not a time to unwind, relax, tune out or take a mental vacation.

Worship is not an hour of Christian entertainment. It is not what makes us good people, faithful Christians or successful parents. Worship is not designed as a commodity to sell or a storefront window to attract 'shoppers' to come on in for a great selection of congregational programs.

Worship is the surrender of our souls to God who is jealous for our attention, time and love. Worship is a challenge...

Os Guinness, in his book *Fit Bodies, Fat Minds* (Grand Rapids: Baker, 1994), writes that modern people

- Worship their work
- •Work at their play
- •and Play at their worship"

Advent is the beginning of the church year, a time of expectancy and preparation for the celebration of the Incarnation, when God became man in the birth of Jesus Christ. One of the central themes of Advent is worship: Zechariah the priest received an angelic message that his barren wife, Elizabeth, would give birth to a son named John, the forerunner of the Messiah. He received this message while he worshipped. Mary, when hearing the message that she would bear a son through the miracle of the Holy Spirit, worshipped. The angels, as they pronounced the birth of Christ to shepherds in the field, worshipped in the heavens. The Magi, seeing the star in the heavens, came to worship.

Yes, some of the above events technically take place outside of the season of Advent, but they are all planted in the seedbed of the promises made to us in this holy season. For several months, I have sensed the calling of God to preach and teach about worship: something I have never done in a series before. In my study of Scripture and other reading, it seems God is continuously bringing to my attention this matter of worship.

I encourage you to be present during the Sundays of Advent. Bring a friend or neighbor, and "Come, let us adore Him."

CCA's New Bell

The Christ Church Anglican Bell

A church's bell is its building's voice, calling all to come and worship the Lord.

The bell hanging in the CCA bell tower was cast by in 1894 the Meneely Bell Company of Troy, New York. The 17-inch bronze bell weighs 100 pounds and rings a B flat. Although the wood cradle supporting the bell is new, it has all of its original swing mountings, wheel, and clapper. The bell originally hung in the Chapel of the Little Sisters of the Poor, located down the street from Christ Church Anglican at 37th and Abercorn Streets.

The Meneely Bell Company was also selected to cast the Centennial Bell for our country in 1876!

Frank restored the bell and constructed its new wood cradle.

It was installed in the bell tower in October 2015

by a volunteer crew of Frank, Bryan Kerr, Adam Ragsdale and Billy McGinley.

The day we visited the women and children of Open Door the shelter was in a state of transition as room was being made for eight more residents to be sheltered and for one resident to give birth to a child conceived when she was being trafficked. In just a few years the Open Door ministry, http://www.usadeschisa.ro/, one of very few programs in Romania, has offered a haven for many

women and children who were trafficked for sex and legal defense for men who were trafficked for labor. Through counseling, health services and legal aid many have been able to leave the shelter, receive job training and be employed. Most importantly, all have been offered God's love and care.

Through its legal arm Open Door has over 2000 cases in process. The shelter's lawyer has been able to aid in the prosecution of over 100 traffickers, including 9 mafia groups, securing 186 years of jail term for perpetrators and over \$100,000 in compensation funds for survivors. They have begun to change the legal and government approach to trafficking in Romania.

Dave and Jen, as board members and frequent visitors, have given spiritual and practical guidance to Open Door. They have wisdom and maturity from their many years of ministry in Romania as well as pre-missionary experience as house parents in a home for unwed mothers in Miami. We were grateful to also spend time with an enthusiastic, young German physician who felt compelled in her seminary education to visit and survey human sex trafficking across Europe. She is surprised that the Lord has placed her in Romania, a crossroads of Europe, but convinced that she is serving in His will at Open Door.

On a following day we prayer walked in a large amusement park nearby that is often used by predators to engage and entice victims. We prayed for protection, for the spiritual battle against traffickers and for the Lord's protection and wisdom to be extended to potential victims and their families. If you feel led, please pray for the Open Door, the support of their current ministries, their expansion, increased funding and wisdom for future ministry. Please pray for the witness of Open Door, that it will reflect the Lord's justice and compassion, His healing and His restoration.

Common Worship

Introducing Common Worship at Christ Church Anglican: A Short Q&A for Church Members and Regular Attenders



This October we launched a new weekly service at Christ Church Anglican. It is called Common Worship: A Service of the Word for Savannah. It takes place on Sundays at 5 p.m. You have probably seen or heard something about Common Worship over the past few weeks. This article is offered to answer a few questions you or others you know might have about the service.

What is Common Worship?

Common Worship is a simple service grounded in the Anglican tradition. It is a service where a believer can experience the presence of God and a non-believer can be led to Jesus. It is built on a basic liturgy that opens up space for musical worship and evangelical engagement. It features songs that are widely accessible and theologically sound.

Why is CCA launching this service?

The leadership at CCA recognizes the need to have

another weekly service offering. CCA is here to spread the Gospel and build Christ's Church in Savannah. We believe a service that is more casual and easier to navigate will appeal to people that might not be as comfortable in our other worship offerings. In addition, a 5 p.m. service will be attractive to people who are unable attend our morning services.

Is Common Worship a "Seeker Service"?

Common Worship is a seeker friendly service. This means that the service is designed with an eye towards

those who are not "church people" but are at least willing to walk into a church and see what it is like. As a result. time is taken to explain liturgy and the Eucharist, and homilies will speak to the unchurched. Also, the team from CCA behind the service is focused on evangelical outreach as a core purpose of Common Worship.

However, Common

Worship is not a service that is just for seekers. It is a service that richly feeds the souls of believers through sacrament, word and song.

How long does the Common Worship service last?

The service starts at 5 p.m. and lasts for one hour. After the service we have very basic refreshments (right now, coffee and water only) in Hebron Hall for those that want to stay around for some fellowship.

What about Child Care?

We have child care (a nursery actually) for children ages 5 and under. We hope that children ages 6 and up will feel welcomed and engaged in the general service.

Do I "have" to attend Common Worship?

No, but you SHOULD attend Common Worship at least ONCE! This service is a way to reach our community and build up the body of CCA. Please come and join us one time so you will be able to share about this offering with people that you know and meet. Also, if you come you might find that you will want to make Common Worship a regular part of your walk with God.

Prayer Ministry

A 30 Year Concert of Prayer

My earliest memory of the Christ Church Prayer Teams was just over 30 years ago in the Undercroft after the main Sunday service when a very young mom came forward for prayers of thanksgiving for the birth of her daughter. That family has since moved to another state and the young mother is now the grandmother of three who were birthed by that baby! Christ Church Prayer Teams have been in place to serve the Christ Church family for many years. Their roots are traced back to the altar rail ministry that went forth after the Prayer and Praise services held on Thursday evenings.



Intercessory Prayer Teams moved to Sundays and different venues were tried until they settled in the Narthex first and, now, the back corner of the Nave at 2020 Bull Street. On "Healing Sundays" two Teams with anointing oil are available in the front of the church. People stop for prayer about various things and when we don't have any customers" we pray for you as you return to your seats after communion! Bless --- as her pregnancy progresses, Help --- find a job, Please continue to heal ---, Give --- strength as she grieves, Thank You for ---'s successful surgery, Thank You for this place of worship, Give wisdom to the Vestry, Anoint Marc and Layne as they preach etc., etc.

Currently there are six Team Captains and approximately 22 "Prayer Team members" who faithfully serve the CCA congregation seven or eight times a year. We welcome any one who has a prayer concern or need or thanksgiving to stop for prayer on Sunday. All requests, of course, are confidential. And, if you ever felt the nudge to get involved in this ministry, do prayerfully consider coming alongside us and learning as you go. We would place a "newbie" with the

seasoned Captain and they would learn the ropes by being a part of a Team.


Prayer Teams are utilized at Parish Weekends, Retreats and other venues when the Body of Christ gathers. Other Prayer Opportunities include the Prayer Chain and Friday noon prayers at the Whitefield Center. Contact the CCA office if you want to receive email prayer requests for our church family. We currently have well over 100 people on the Prayer Chain! The Friday Noon Prayer team (contact Linda Savage for details at 912-238-4971) continues as we pray specifically for CCA, the children in Sunday School, the leadership, staff, etc. An interesting praise report regarding this noon prayer group is that we met for three years at noon on Fridays in St. Andrew's REC sanctuary while we were in transition without a permanent home. Over the years we got to meet many of the St. Andrew's folks. I recently spoke with their Sr. Warden who said that they have begun an intercessory prayer group because of our example. He reported, "Your group has produced much fruit!"

Why do we pray? Philippians 4:6-7 comes to mind as we "by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present our requests to God...." And from 1 Thessalonians 5:17-18, "Pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." And finally, in Psalms 34:15-18, "... the righteous cry out and the Lord hears them and delivers them...." Mostly we are there for our brothers and sisters who need the support and love of their church family. The Lord works through the teams in subtle and profound ways. And we may simply be a witness to the seeker as we stand ready to pray, and that would be enough. I personally want to thank all those who have served in this way over the years. Your availability to Him has been a blessing to many and your faithfulness to serve is a grand and visible testimony.

John and I are stepping down as coordinators of the Sunday Intercessors and Tom and Lori Kennedy are the new schedulers.
