

Introducing



There are so many members of our Church that I want to interview that I decided to double up this time and interview Corley and Ginny Nease together. Corley is a retired optometrist. Ginny is a long time and still active licensed clinical social worker and marriage and family therapist. From my own friendships with them, I can tell you that Corley has a quick wit and clever sense of hu-

mor, and Ginny is incredibly sensitive to the needs of others. They will have been married 48 years in December. Corley is undaunted by Ginny's professional skills. He says when she tries to psychoanalyze him, it doesn't work. The Neases arrived in Savannah in the 1960's from Canada/Florida (Ginny) and Lumber City, Georgia (Corley) after having met at Fort Benning in Columbus, Georgia. Corley had just returned from a four-year tour in the Army (as a bachelor and an optometrist) in the American Hospital in Paris, and Ginny was a social worker with the Red Cross working at the same Fort Benning hospital. Corley explained that Ginny's work schedule was publicly posted in the hospital so he knew just when to call her to go out. Their first home in Savannah was in the Chatham Apartments on Abercorn. Corley took over an optometry practice on Gaston Street and Ginny began her career in public mental health.

Ginny was born in Canada but since her mother was from Florida, she was named a good Southern name (Virginia, after the State, and Lee, after Robert E.) with hopes that she would choose U.S. citizenship as an adult (she did). But while in Canada, she attended an Anglican private school with mandatory chapel every morning. Her father encouraged her faith early on and she says that Corley has led her to a deepened faith in Christ in more recent years. Corley grew up as a Methodist in Lumber City and when they first moved to Savannah, they attended Epworth Methodist Church (within a stone's throw of 2020) but were drawn to Christ Church on Johnson Square in 1973 by its music ministry. You may know that Corley sings in the choir and has for many years. In late 2003, Corley's faith was tested and energized when he faced a life threatening surgery. He remembers lying on a gurney in the hospital looking at a strange doctor with a

pony tail and a black leather jacket who had been called in to help him. It was a time to confront the possibility of his own death and in his prayers, Corley saw that "God was in the whole thing." The doctor turned out to be just the right one and Corley was moved by the Christian love shown by other believers as he recovered from a difficult surgery. Since then, Corley's Bible study group has been a source of growth. He recently led the group in a study of Revelation, a book he's been intrigued by for the last 15 years. The choir is another small group within CCA which means a lot to Corley. As a couple, Corley and Ginny are taking a course online from the Trinity School of Ministry.

Ginny and Corley echo the sentiments of many with regards to the CCA journey to 2020 Bull. Like many others they see God's hand in the story and are aware of the new closeness and energy among the Church family. The congregation of today is vastly different from the one they joined in 1973 but the changes are all positive.

As a teenager, Ginny studied for a year in Switzerland. With that experience and Corley's time in Paris, the Neases love to travel. Between them they've visited 29 countries. Ginny comes up with the ideas for trips and Corley makes the arrangements. A trip to Israel and Egypt 4 or 5 years ago was a highlight. Still on their wish list are the North Pole and Krakow. But no matter where their travels or life take them, it's clear that Corley and Ginny are devoted to each other, to CCA and to their Lord.

Ephesians Study

Building a Community in Christ A 12-Week Study of Paul's letter to the Ephesians **August 23 – November 22, 2015**

One of the chief blind spots of many Christians in America today is to overlook the significance of the church. We tend to proclaim individual salvation without moving on to explain the prominence of the saved community. Our message is often individualistic good news of a new life rather than corporate good news of a new society.

No one can emerge from a careful reading of Paul's letter to the Ephesians with an individualistic gospel. For Ephesians is the Gospel of the church. It sets forth God's eternal purpose to create through Jesus Christ a new society. This society stands out in bright relief against the sober background of the old world.

On August 23rd, Christ Church Anglican will begin a 12-week study of Paul's letter to the Ephesians. Each week during this series the Adult Sunday School class, the sermon and every Community Group will examine the same portion of Ephesians. For the sake of the glory of God and the evangelization of Savannah and the world, nothing is more essential than for Christ Church Anglican to build authentic community in Christ that will be an example of God's new society in the world.

Copies of the Bible Study *Ephesians—Building a* Community in Christ by John Stott are available in the church office for participants in Community Groups or for those who would like to follow along in their personal study. A donation of \$5 is suggested for each copy.

New Service Opportunities



Acolyte Ministry Starting this Fall!

What is an Acolyte? The dictionary defines "acolyte" as "a person assisting the celebrant during worship."

I grew up serving as an acolyte in my home parish. It was a formative experience for my faith, as well as a meaningful ministry of service. I learned a lot about worship and found being a part of those leading worship a helpful way to pay attention, learn, and grow in Christ.

With the leadership of Jill Luse, we will reintroduce the Acolyte ministry at Christ Church Anglican this fall. Here are some basic questions you may have about this ministry:

Q. Who may serve as an Acolyte?

A. Middle Schoolers, High Schoolers, College students and adults may serve as an Acolyte. 4th and 5th graders may serve as Junior Acolytes.

Q. What are the duties of an Acolyte?

A. Duties of Acolytes will be explained in detail at our Acolyte Training. In general, Acolytes will carry the processional cross, torches (once they are purchased), and assist in preparing the Table for Communion.

Q. What is the time commitment for this ministry?

A. Acolytes will be expected to be present and vested 20 minutes prior to worship. They will need to attend at least one training session per year and brief, "special" trainings prior to the seasons of Christmas and Easter. All of these training sessions will occur on Sundays after our 10:30 worship. Depending on the number of people who sign up for this ministry, Acolytes should expect to serve approximately once per month.

Q. What if my child sings in Choristers or in the Parish Choir? Can they still serve as an Acolyte?

A. The duties of an Acolyte can normally mesh with the singing responsibilities of a Chorister or Choir member. In those rare circumstances where this may be more than can be handled, a change of the Acolyte schedule will be encouraged.

ACOLYTE ORIENTATION will take place from 9:15 – 10 a.m. on Sunday, August 16th, in the adult classroom in the Wesley Wing. Parents and potential Acolytes will be expected to attend where a review of the Acolyte Ministry will take place and questions can be personally answered by either Jill or Fr. Marc.

ACOLYTE TRAINING will take place on Sunday, August 23rd, immediately following our 10:30 a.m. service. Lunch and sign-up will be provided for Acolytes and their parents, followed by basic instruction. The training will conclude by 1:30 p.m. Attendance at this training session is mandatory for participation in this Ministry.

Family Altar Guild Getting Underway

The Altar Guild of Christ Church Anglican is a quiet ministry of service that prepares the sanctuary (the area immediately around the Holy Table) and the chancel (the area where the pulpit and lectern are located) for Sunday worship. One of the most exciting ways for a family to experience this notion of the "sacred" is to become an Altar Guild Family. Here parents and children join together to help prepare the Lord's Table for worship. Sharon Lawson, our Altar Guild Chair, and Fr. Marc have been in prayer and discussion about this idea for many months, and they both feel it is time to offer this ministry to the parish.

Whitefield Center Update

The Whitefield Center:

The Genesis of a Developing Eminence

No longer just the "old yellow house across from Elizabeth's," the Whitefield Center is becoming known to the neighborhood and community at large by its name. On July 26th, an update was given to the congregation regarding all aspects of the Whitefield operation and ministry, including building usage, maintenance, and future plans. This article will concentrate specifically on just Whitefield ministry...the initiatives



that are generating its reputation.



Hope Academy is a GED and high school diploma attainment school for adults 18 and over. Currently, 20 students are enrolled. The presentation of a biblical

worldview and personal relationships with the students it serves are at the forefront of Hope. Classes are held every Tuesday and Thursday, with supplementary days set aside each month for reading and writing practice, tutoring, and testing. As a bonus, the first Saturday



of each month is a Career Assessment and Learning Styles Seminar. All components of workforce preparedness and social skills are incorporated in Hope Academy instruction. Hope's ultimate goal is to assist its graduating students to either obtain post-secondary education, gainful



employment, or improve the status of employment. The Hope Academy is a partnership with Savannah Christian Church and is directed by Brian and Heather Flood under the auspices of the Whitefield Center.

Elementary Reading Tutorials take place at two



schools that serve the Thomas Square neighborhood: Gadsden Elementary and the Savannah Classical Academy. The Gadsden program is coordinated by a full-time, on-site volunteer

and the tutoring takes place during school hours. The tutor/student ratio is one to one. As many as 100 students are tutored during the course of a year. Tutoring takes place Tuesdays through Thursdays in one hour sessions. The goal is for the student to be reading on grade level or beyond within nine weeks.

Tutoring at the Savannah Classical Academy takes place after school on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4 to 5 p.m.; Steve Dantin coordinates the program. The tutor/student ratio averages one to three or



four. In addition to reading help and phonics, homework assistance is also provided. This program serves 25 students. CCA members who serve as Tutors in this program are: Ted Benton, Warren Thrasher, Bruce Jamieson, Heather Ford, Lori Kennedy, Debby Smith, and West Baker.

Whitefield Center Update

Financial Literacy is taught in a "hands-on" manner at



Savannah High and at the Fresh Start Middle School at East Broad Elementary. Both schools serve the Thomas Square neighborhood. Students are taught the very, very basics of personal financial management. At the conclusion of the eight week course each semester, they are expected to be able to explain the various nuances of a personal budget, checking and savings accounts, debit and credit cards, differences between stocks and bonds, basic investments, how money receives its value, the gold standard, and much more. Steve Dantin is involved in teaching both of these initiatives with assistance from representatives of the Savannah branch of Consumer Credit Counseling. The program serves 15 students at Fresh Start and 25 students at Savannah High.

The Fresh Start middle school program offers particu-



lar challenges as these students are all male between the ages of 11 and 14 and all have previously been expelled (not suspended) from school. These students are offered

the incentive of an American Eagle silver dollar for successfully completing their financial literacy test. Upon their successful completion of this test, Savannah High students are offered a small financial incentive to open a personal checking account. Supplementing the Financial Literacy instruction is training and coaching in personal social skills and workforce preparedness. Calvary Chapel Food Pantry serves east side Thomas Square residents on Saturdays at its Gregory Street location across from Oelschig's nursery. Calvary Chapel has been a Whitefield partner since its inception. CCA member Kayron Stevens assists in coordinating this program along with Michelle Wood of Calvary Chapel. Here again, relationships are not only mandatory, but the key to ministry. Volunteers are involved in the lives of each person/family served, offering various areas of personal counsel and sharing the Gospel with each person served. On a given Saturday, over 150 persons may be served and over 1,500 pounds of food distributed.

Williams Court Senior Advocacy serves senior citizens weekly, every Tuesday, at the Williams Court Apartments, just two blocks from the Whitefield Center. Williams Court is a retirement community for low-income seniors. This program is coordinated by CCA member Kayron Stevens and is centered around a weekly Bible study that residents cling to with great anticipation. As are all Whitefield programs, it is relationship centered, ena-

bling volunteers to assist and advocate in the lives of the residents. Handicapped transportation, assistance in taking prescribed medication, and basic financial



instruction may be components of serving various individuals at Williams Court. This initiative serves up to 35 persons each week.

IRS Income Tax Return Preparation Assistance takes place January through March for eligible Thomas Square residents at the Whitefield Center. This program is coordinated by John Albert and each of its 15 volunteer tax preparers are IRS trained and certified. Some of the CCA tax preparers are: Bill Sprague, III, Warren Thrasher, David Reeves, Jim Gardner, Jim and Janet Stevenson, John Albert, Liz Mays, Bob Hallock, Nelson Lawson, and Bruce Jamieson. Over 60 Thomas Square area residents were served this tax season – Whitefield's first year.

Whitefield Vacation Bible School and Day Camp

began its inaugural annual run this past June. It served 11 Elementary Tutorial students from the Savannah Classical Academy and operated 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. for one week. The program capacity for the camp was 15.



Students spent the mornings in Bible school and study coordinated by Kayron Stevens and assisted by Michelle Wood of Calvary Chapel, Heather Ford, Tracy Clatterbaugh, and Wray Williamson. Matt Robertson and the CCA youth were invaluable in providing recreational activities. Each student was given a Bible at the VBS, and four students accepted Christ during the course of the week. Lunch was provided each day and was coordinated

by Linda Sawyer, Gloria Harrison, and Cindy James.

Afternoon day camp activities were directed by Steve Dantin, Heather Ford, and

Linda Sawyer, and included field trips and "behind the scenes" looks to The Savannah Bee Company, Leopold's Ice

Cream, Tybee Island Marine Science Center, Old

Roundhouse Museum, Oatland Island Wildlife Refuge, and the historic Savannah Theatre. The week concluded with a family cookout at Whitefield coordinated by Joe and Gay Park, and an evening live



musical stage performance at the Savannah Theatre.

Yes, the Whitefield Center, in a physical sense, is just an old house; a nice and receptive old house, but an old house nonetheless. It does not possess the functional architectural attributes of a standard "community center". But, as the months have gone by, I'm learning it really is becoming much more than that. It is iconic.

To adult students trying to get a high school diploma and change their lives, it really does represent *Hope*. To elementary students it represents "the place where our tutors come from." To Williams Court seniors, it's the name that's announced over the loudspeaker signaling them that Bible study is beginning. To the parents of VBS and Day Camp participants, it's the place where "my child can't wait to get to" in the morning.

Additionally, to Art March enthusiasts and SCAD students, its that new gallery where not "everything" is accepted as art, but the place doesn't charge them. To seven area churches, it's where an interdenominational prayer meeting is held every Monday night to pray for the city.

And, as its Executive Director recently learned by speaking to a civic gathering consisting of citizens from all over the county, it represents "that church who took a stand for the Gospel, lost their original property because of it, and continue to 'bear witness to the Truth'."

Home Missions

2015 Tour of Homes Grants

The Home Missions Committee of CCA is charged with reviewing applications from qualified local non-profit organizations and providing funds within the amount available from Tour of Homes net revenues. Serving on this committee are Kacey Ratterree (Chairman), Karen Cooper, Dn. Steve Dantin, Fr. Layne Hansen, Dn. Sally Lufburrow, Ramona Petersen, Kayron Stevens and Debbie Webb. The organizations funded by this committee are in Savannah and serve community needs right here in town—some in our Church neighborhood. Applicant organizations meet criteria relating to their witness to God, to the uniqueness of Jesus as "the way, the truth and the life," and must affirm a clear mission of service to God, through evangelism and discipleship.

This year, the Tour blessed our committee with more than \$47,000 to distribute. All of the 2015 applicants will receive funds. Most of these have CCA members either on their boards or as volunteers in other capacities. They are briefly described below:

- The Barnabus Center for Counseling offers Christcentered, Biblically-based counseling, workshops, marriage and family therapy.
- The Bread of Life Food Pantry, a ministry of Calvary Chapel of Savannah, offers prayer and counseling to those who come to their facility on President Street Extension, as well as prepared food bags.
- The Children's School of St. John's Church is a
 Christian faith-based pre-school, with curriculum and mission centered on Holy Scripture and supporting families in faith and obedience to Christ.
- The Fresh Air Home, a project of the Froebel Circle, offers a camp at Tybee for at-risk children; the purpose is to build character and help them grow spiritually and morally, through activities that include age-appropriate Bible studies.
- **His Love Ministries, Inc.**, spreads the life-changing message of Jesus Christ through visits to and bible studies in correctional institutions, nursing homes, assisted living facilities and treatment centers.

- Heads Up Guidance Services (H.U.G.S.) is a faithbased provider of counseling and vocational guidance for those with mental and behavioral illnesses as well as those suffering from addiction; its location at 706 Wheaton Street maximizes service accessibility to those in need.
- Kairos Prison Ministries offers Gospel-focused study and counseling, by trained laity and clergy, to those in the local prison systems, through weekend Christian "short courses."
- The Living Vine Christian Maternity Home is a residential program for pregnant women in crisis.
- Savannah Baptist Center, located on Wheaton Street in the same building as HUGS, reaches the poor and needy in Savannah on two levels: spiritual, through ministry; and physical, through assistance with basic needs (showers, laundry) which are difficult for the homeless to secure.
- The Whitefield Foundation and Center seeks to transform lives and people in the Thomas Square area through Christ-centered workforce preparedness and education. More than 75 volunteers are involved in providing service.
- Young Life brings the gospel to young people through weekly programs for high school students, run by trained adults who guide the youth in Bible studies and service activities that help people in need.

We hope to bring these providers closer to our CCA community this year. Stay tuned!

The Savannah Tour of Homes and Gardens is a blessing which allows us to give back to the community which supports the Tour. Thanks to everyone in our congregation who volunteers for this event, as it returns so much to those in need. Debbie Webb is the Chair of our 2016 Tour – won't you make plans NOW to commit to this event?



From the Rector

The Church is an Anvil...

Much consternation and alarm has coursed through the Bible-believing churches of this country in the aftermath of the U.S. Supreme Court's decision to legalize samegender marriages. I have read the excellent and thoughtful response of the College of Bishops to our congregation, and our own Bishop Lebhar has put forth a wonderful pastoral letter to the diocese, which you can find on our diocesan website: gulfatlanticdiocese.org.

There is little I can add to the wisdom of our Bishops, both of our Diocese and our Province, but as your pastor, who lives with you daily and worships with you every Lord's Day, I realize it may prove helpful to hear a few thoughts from me.

Theodore Beza was a Protestant Reformer (born 1519) who was a solid theologian and a compassionate servant of Christ. When the French Monarch of Navarre decided to bring legal action against Protestants in his domain, Beza was called before him to explain himself. This famous quote from Beza before the king has echoed throughout the annuls of history: "Sire, it belongs in truth to the Church of God, in whose name I speak, to endure blows and not to inflict them. But it will also please your Majesty to remember that she is an anvil that has worn out many a hammer."

It is my intent to be that faithful anvil of the Gospel in an ever-changing sea of cultural confusion and preference. The only hope of humanity is for faithful Christians to love and serve others while ever pointing to the unchanging Truth of Holy Scripture, which informs both their love and their service.

With that in mind, I will simply remind us of the biblical teaching on marriage: Christian marriage is not a contract of convenience, but a covenant of commitment. As such, it brings before us three things.

First, marriage is an act of fidelity. The husband and wife make solemn and profound pledges of fidelity to one another. Why is this so? Because marriage was created to reflect the faithfulness of God to His people. We live in a world where loyalty and fidelity are words quickly disappearing from our lexicon, and even more quickly disappearing in human relationships. Contracts are broken at the snap of a finger, promises go unkept, and the results

are deeply destructive. Christian marriage stands as an anvil against the blows of a narcissistic culture bent on seeking pleasure at every turn, even if it is ultimately self-destructive. So faithfulness in marriage is essential. We as Christians have not done well in instructing our married parishioners about the seriousness of marital loyalty, nor have we helped our members see the joy and blessing that comes from such sacrificial love. As a result, marriages of professing Christians end in divorce as often as marriages of non-professing persons. What we have discovered, however, is that couples who actually live out their profession (pray together, read Scripture regularly, engage in worship weekly, and actively serve the community as an expression of their faith) have much lower divorce rates.

Second, the expectation of those outside of Christian marriage is that they will pursue a life of abstinence. Like fidelity, abstinence is not a word (or a behavior) that is applauded in today's culture, especially when it comes to human sexuality. And yet, we have great campaigns to rid our lives of high fructose corn syrup, trans fats, and other damaging foods, but we indulge our appetites without constraint when it comes to sex before marriage, sex outside of marriage, same-gender sex, or virtually any form of sexual expression whatsoever. The Cross of Christ shows the saving power of God, and as such stands as an anvil in today's culture, taking blows from every pleasure -seeking hammer there is. Through sacrificial love, God redeems sinners through the death and resurrection of His son. As such, the Christian sexual ethic reflects the same sacrificial love, as those who are married engage in sexual relations only with their spouse, and those outside of marriage abstain from sexual behavior altogether. This is a good and healthy thing. Why? Because it brings us closer to the very nature of God Himself, Who is the divine example of sacrificial love.

Third, Christian marriage is defined as the union of one man and one woman in a holy covenant that reflects the very nature of God. This definition now stands as another anvil in today's "marriage *du jour*" mentality. The cultural confusion of our day seems to say that marriage can be re-defined by anyone who has some form of authority. While Christians are to honor the State (see Romans 13), this honor is informed by a higher authority that has exclusive rights to define reality for our well-being and ultimate joy. If some governmental authority

defined me as an aardvark, it would not make it so. True, the culture might therefore treat me as an aardvark, and I would have to struggle with a world that was misinformed about humans and aardvarks, but simply stating something to be so, even in legal parlance, does not make it so. For the Christian, the definition of many essential elements to human life and joy are clearly stated in Holy Scripture. No King, no government, and no other authority can re-define that reality.

And so Christ Church Anglican will continue to pursue being the people of God according to the Word of God. I say we will "pursue" it, for such a lofty goal is still far beyond us. But simply because God's will for humanity has not yet been fulfilled does not mean we abandon this noble cause.

So we invite all human beings - wherever they may be in their struggle in life, whether it is with sexuality or greed or selfishness or anger or pride or any other aspect of life that separates us from God's good intentions for us - we invite them to come join us, to "taste and see that the Lord is good," to engage in the Christian adventure, to give one's self unreservedly to Jesus Christ, and discover His incredible love and power to those who believe.

Why Do We Do That?

This article normally explains a certain action or ceremony within our Anglican Tradition, helping the newcomer and worshipper understand why we do what we do.

"In the silence of the heart God speaks. If you face God in prayer and silence, God will speak to you. Then you will know that you are nothing. It is only when you realize your nothingness, your emptiness, that God can fill you with Himself. Souls of prayer are souls of great silence." – Mother Theresa

We live in a very noisy world. Traffic, conversation, music, television, and other elements of sound permeate our existence every day. Even when we have an opportunity for quiet, many of us stick "ear buds" in our ears to fill our lives with even more sound. Noise is so much a part of our world that a few moments of silence seems unusual.

The same is often true in modern worship. Running commentary, music (usually loud) and wordy sermons, dominate the worship landscape of modern Christianity. Noise is such a part of our worship that if there is a quiet pause for more than a few seconds, people begin to get fidgety, wondering if "something is wrong."

In our Sunday worship at Christ Church Anglican, silence is a part of our worship. We want God to speak, and in order for us to hear, we need to slow down, empty our minds with all of the "clutter" of the day and be still. Be very still.

We do this at one specific point in our liturgy: immediately before the Confession of Sin. It isn't long, just about 10-12 seconds or so, but it can be very important. It is a time to get settled, to prepare to listen. Here may be when the voice of God is heard most clearly, when certain sins we have forgotten or have hidden away may become apparent, or when God may simply speak, because He delights to be in communion with His people.

In the coming months, cherish the moments of silence. Anticipate them. In so doing, you may invite such moments into your life at home or at work. You might discover God speaks more frequently than you ever imagined. You just couldn't hear Him because of the noise.

Organ Update

IT WILL LOOK AS GOOD AS IT SOUNDS AND SOUND AS GOOD AS IT LOOKS... LORD WILLING.

You may have noticed the large new organ console in our church's balcony. I have been asked many questions this summer about our new organ project, and am excited at your loving interest. Here are four of the best questions I have been asked and their answers.

Question #1: Does the organ kit you are using come with a manual?

No, sadly, there is no digital organ builder's manual; in fact there is no organ kit you can buy. Our new organ is a complete custom instrument from top to bottom. I have been concept designer, parts and materials procurer, and custom organ builder all rolled into one

and it has been quite a ride as well as an honor to have been entrusted with the task.

To further answer the question, you can have a custom organ like the one I am currently building, or you



can purchase an off-the-shelf organ of similar size from an organ company for about \$450,000. Know, however, that it would take the organ company anywhere from 12-16 months between ordering the instrument and the instrument's delivery. Given this, know that I have been at construction of our new instrument for about nine months now and should have the organ completed in under 12 months of work.

Question #2: How did you get this job?



For this church musician, who has been dabbling at organ construction since High School, this will be my third successfully completed instrument. I felt a Godly appointment to build our new organ...that my past collection of experiences had led to a calling

upon my heart to do so.

Ours will be a marvelous new organ that should serve us for many years. The new organ will be bold



and beautiful, it will sound as good as it looks and looks as good as it sounds, and it will be honoring of God. Our new instrument will incorporate every element of fine organ

design that I know, and it will come in at a total cost of about \$19,000 which has been lovingly funded by interested church members.

#3: I hear that you have been building our new organ in your garage at home. Yes?

Yes, I have been at the construction of our new

organ working out of my home garage that is, for better or worse, the same temperature as the temperature outside come Winter or Summer...so please be patient with me...it's hot outside!



Question #4: How far along are you to have a working instrument in worship?

I would say that I am two thirds complete on our new organ project and have several important items to complete prior to having a working instrument in worship. My estimate, if things continue at their present pace, is that we will have a working instrument in worship by late August/early September.

Now, to finish answering that first question, the one about the organ kit manual that I am following. Yes, there is a manual...it's the one that I am creating for our new instrument as I go along!

I look forward to a day when we have a glorious new organ that sings along with us in our worship and praise of the living God.



Stewardship & Finances

Understanding Stewardship

Webster defines the word as "the activity or job of protecting and being responsible for something; the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to one's care." What's your definition of stewardship? For some of us, the word stewardship conjures up thoughts and feelings of challenge and commitment, even obligation. For others, it brings to mind feelings of compassion and a caring community. Much of our understanding, thoughts, and feelings about stewardship come from our past experiences growing up in a church culture where challenge and commitment was the main focus. Like it or not, I am beginning to realize that the world we now live in is more and more becoming an unchurched culture. A culture where people are motivated more by caring communities and compassionate people, than by challenges and commitments (which tends to come later in our Christian pilgrimage).

The challenge for church leaders today is how to bring these two cultures (the churched and the unchurched) together into the one body our Lord calls us to be. All equally sharing in good stewardship of all He has so gracefully given to us. In order to effectively build up our stewardship here at CCA, we must somehow build a motivational bridge between key leaders, the grassroots members of our congregation and the unchurched.

The Good News is that God's word speaks to all groups. Our understanding of Jesus' sacrifice on the cross is that he did this out of his love and compassion for us, not out of his commitment to us. The Bible does not say, "that God was so COMMITTED to the world, that he gave his one and only son......", no, it says "for God so LOVED the world, that he gave his only son......". The Bible does not say we are committed to Jesus because he was first committed to us. It says, "we love because He first loved us." In the gospel of John, Jesus does not ask Peter, "Are you committed to me?" The question to Peter is, "Do you love me (compassion)? Then tend my sheep (community)."

On the other hand, God's promises await those who are obedient. He challenges us to give him the privilege to prove himself and has promised to bless us in return. "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this says the Lord God Almighty, and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that there will not be room enough to store it." (Malachi 3:10). Will you trust the Lord and take on the challenge and then sit back and wait on the promise of blessings? We must all come to understand that true Christian stewardship begins when we say with confidence, "I Believe."

CCA Budget Category Descriptions

It won't be long before it's time to start the Operating Fund budgeting process for 2016. In order to help parishioners understand how the budget is developed, here are the key budget categories for both Income and Expenses.

Income

- Budgeted Pledges specific pledges from church members
- Donations non-pledge checks from any source
- Plate Offering cash collected primarily on Sundays
- TOH Proceeds CCA portion of expected Tour of Homes proceeds to be given to Missions (75% Home/25% Global)

Expenses

- Outside Giving 10% of our budgeted income (pledges, donations and plate offering); 50% of this amount goes to our Diocese, the Gulf Atlantic Diocese
- Worship Ministry supplies for Worship and Altar Guild
- Music Ministry music purchase, licensing & dues, Bell Choir Tour, instrumentalists, instruments and instrument maintenance, supplies
- Evangelism newcomers, hospitality, Founder's Day, advertising, PR and special events
- Discipleship staff training, nursery, Christian education, small groups, youth, VBS, lay leadership development, pastoral care and Parish Weekend
- Personnel salaries & benefits for Rector, Assistant Rector, Parish Administrator, Parish Musician, Assistant Parish Musician, Facilities Manager, part-time Administrative Support, Nursery workers
- Administrative Expenses postage, copy machines, computers, paper, cell phones, audit fee, and office supplies
- Property Expenses utilities and security
- Operating Expenses insurance, phone service, furniture & fixtures, Whitefield Center repairs & utilities
