A Culture of Prayer:

*Simple Instructions for
Praying Together on Sundays*

An important aspect of being the Body of Christ is praying together, especially on the Lord's Day in the Lord's House as the Lord's People. Particularly during the Prayers of the People offered during our 9 a.m. service, there are opportunities for people to offer their own prayers either silently or aloud. Just how should we go about this?

Some people simply pray within their own heart. This is certainly acceptable and encouraged. Not every prayer needs to be expressed audibly, and the Holy Spirit hears every heartfelt prayer offered in faith. Some people will pray aloud, but quietly, being heard by only a few. Those who can hear these prayers are encouraged to support them in love and a silent "amen," and those who can't hear these prayers clearly are asked to offer the person praying to the Lord, standing quietly in His presence. There will be others who will pray loudly and clearly for all to hear. They may unintentionally "pray over" some who may be praying quietly, but when this happens it is not to be interpreted as a personal slight, but rather the simple reality of being in a large room with many people and being unable to hear one another. In every instance, God calls us to be supportive, attentive and sensitive, developing a "Culture of Prayer" for our parish.

So that all things may be done "decently and in order" (1 Corinthians 14:40), keep your prayers brief and clear (a sentence or two). Remember we have personal intercessors who will pray with you more specifically during the distribution of Communion. Many have found this ministry helpful and encouraging.

Off The Top of My Head... From the Bottom of My Heart

In today's computing world, I am always counseled when looking for a new computer to start with the software, not the hardware. In other words, what do I do most often with my computer? Write documents? Work on graphic designs? Edit digital film? Analyze spreadsheets? Create architectural drawings? Whatever it is, find the best software to support such activity, then find the computer that best runs the software. The temptation is to become distracted with the hardware. After all, that's what you see on your desk, this gleaming new piece of equipment with a screen and a tower. But the discipline of buying the right computer is counter-intuitive: software first, then hardware.

It is similar to our situation as we look for a permanent place to be Christ Church Anglican. Before we can sign on the dotted line for a piece of property, we need to know what intangibles we value, what dynamics God is developing within us, what "software" we intend to plug into that particular piece of property, and then ask the question, "Will it fit?"

The Vestry has spent considerable time on this matter, looking at other Anglican churches that share some similarity with Christ Church Anglican and have exhibited biblical fidelity and healthy growth. Each of these congregations were different from each other, but all three shared some very important elements in common:

(1) Leadership Development. These parishes were focused and deliberate about discerning leadership within the parish, training leadership for the future, and deploying leadership in meaningful positions of ministry throughout the congregation.

(2) Gift-Based Ministry. Instead of the "warm body" approach to ministry, these churches worked hard at matching people of appropriate gifts with the proper ministry. By so doing, they not only saw fruitful results, but also contributed to an overall atmosphere of expectation, faith, and joy.

(3) Communication and Coordination. Creative sharing of ideas, problem solving, and sharing of information (from nuts-and-bolts logistics to strategic planning) was highly valued in all three parishes. Staff and Vestry collaborated in various ways and lay leaders were clear about what they were empowered to do and to whom they answered in an overall team effort to extend God's Kingdom.

There were other similar elements that overlapped among the three churches, but these three stood out. I believe they were obvious because they are the central elements that demand our attention at Christ Church. The Vestry is now working on a model of ministry, complete with supporting Parish By-Laws that will be presented to the congregation for approval within the first quarter of next year. Between now and then, pray for the Vestry, Staff, and other leaders as we seek to lay hold of the "software" God has given us, so that taking action on property, buildings, and other "hardware" will come more clearly and naturally.

‘You Lost Me’

An Article from Break Point

We’ve all seen the statistics and heard the stories: Good Christian kids go to college, grow disillusioned, and leave the faith. In his new book, “You Lost Me: Why Young Christians Are Leaving Church . . . and Rethinking Faith,” David Kinnaman writes, “Overall, there is a 43 percent drop-off between the teen and early adult years in terms of church engagement.”

We lose these young people for many reasons, according to Kinnaman’s research. Some have felt that their questions about faith were ignored, or that they were given pat answers. Others had their interest in the arts or sciences discouraged by church members who believed that these couldn’t possibly be Christian vocations. Still others “feel isolated from their parents and other older adults in the realm of faith and spirituality.”

It boils down to this: Young dropouts often feel that the church doesn’t understand their concerns and needs, and has no real guidance to offer. But Kinnaman believes there’s reason for hope. “The majority of young dropouts are not walking away from faith,” he says, “they are putting involvement in church on hold.”

Many dropouts still believe the tenets of Christianity. What they need from the Church is a renewed effort at disciple-making, an effort that meets them where they are; lets them express their questions, ideas, and doubts; and encourages them to grow in Christ.

And what do we do about those younger teens who haven’t yet reached that point where so many drop out? Kinnaman

says that we adults need to form one-on-one relationships with them, instead of trying to mass-produce young believers. He writes, “I think we are constantly building, tearing down, and rebuilding our youth and young adult development regimens based on the fallacy that more is better. . . . We need new ways of measuring success.”

So, he suggests, one metric of success might be to connect young people to older people — mentoring relationships. Kinnaman says, “These relationships would not be solely focused on spiritual growth, but should integrate the pursuit of faith with the whole life.”

That makes sense to me. Today’s younger generation is relationally oriented. Teaching them a set of principles in an isolated setting is not going to inculcate a biblical worldview in many of these teens. As my BreakPoint colleague John Stonestreet says, “When it comes to teens, worldview is as much ‘caught as it is taught’.”

Even providing lots of entertainment, as some youth ministries do, is not going to do it. It’s spending time with these kids, showing them that they matter to you, and living out your beliefs in front of them. That’s going to spark their interest and their desire for God.

So let’s not read the statistics and shake our heads. To keep our young people in the church is going to require a sustained effort — and a lot of relationship building. But it’s an effort that will pay off in a spiritually healthy younger generation and a revitalized Church.

SOMA Mission to Soroti, Uganda

The Gospel is carried on the backs of the lay readers of the Church of Uganda. In the Soroti Diocese with more than 360,000 Christians, there are only 49 parish priests, several dozen deacons but more than 700 lay readers. With geographic parishes as large as 10,000, there are numerous congregations within each, meeting in different villages. Some have buildings but many meet in schools or in the open air. It is the lay reader who leads services, preaches and cares for the people day to day. They prepare the confirmands and shepherd the congregations. Bishop George Erwau asked for a mission to focus on teaching the lay readers about the Work of the Holy Spirit by holding five conferences in five different Archdeaconeries (Deaneries). We watched the Lord raise-up two teams to join us over the month. What did we witness?

•Eager Students—Clergy and laity came with open hearts, took many notes, entered joyously into worship and ministry. In Kaberamaido some said, “We think we are in theological studies!” “When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth” John 16:13a.

•The Power of the Holy Spirit—

The Lord offered a fresh infilling for many, physical and inner healing, deliverance, new understanding of His grace and mercy, conviction, revelations, prophecy, witness, testimonies, faith and unity. As participants ministered to each other the Lord ministered to them. “I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts.” Ephesians 4:16-17



•The Power of Testimony—Many people in Uganda have suffered through years of terror, war, abuse, abandonment, loss of homes and family, famine and unrest. Many have suffered silently, trusting the Lord but not understanding His amazing power of Inner Healing—Healing of the Heart. When one of our American team members, a new Christian, gave a testimony of the Lord’s healing of inner hurts after

20 years of abuse, abandonment, betrayal, physical and psychological distress it was a powerful tool for people to understand the Lord’s ability to make all things new. No amount of teaching or preaching could witness like the radiant example of a transformed life in Christ. Praise God for His amazing ability to heal from the inside out! “Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new.” 2 Corinthians 5:17



•The Power of the Word—

Ugandan s know and trust God’s word, they often know scripture by heart. Every teaching on the Holy Spirit was grounded in Bible pas-

sages and Bible stories. When fresh insights are applied to a passage that is well known it has a tremendous power. The Word is a living, breathing guide for our lives! “All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work.” 2 Timothy 3:16-17

•The Power of Spiritual Authority—When this mission was planned last fall, Bishop George had not developed a much needed plan for new order and instruction in prayer ministry for the entire diocese. By this summer he had a complete plan ready. This mission trained 550 clergy, Lay Readers and laity in the ministry of the Holy Spirit, in all corners of the diocese. We heard over and over again was, “This is what we have prayed for, this is coming at just the right time, surely this is God’s timing.” “Obey them so that their work will be a joy, not a burden, for that would be of no advantage to you.” Hebrews 13: 17b

Partnership in ministry is a beautiful thing! Christ Church has humbly received so much from the godly leadership of Uganda and specifically the Diocese of Soroti. How wonderful that the Lord continues to knit us together, to use us for the building up of His kingdom.

Benchmark Presentation

November 18

This marks our 3rd academic year to be implementing our children's benchmark program, in which the Sunday School children learn key portions of Scripture and other Bible truths and Bible literacy. Bell Choir Applause

Mark Williams received the following letter from Thomas Russell, Organist and Interim Music Director at Covenant Presbyterian Church in Nashville, Tennessee where our Bell Choir recently performed.

It is my great honor to give my highest recommendation for the Bells of Christ Church of Savannah Georgia and their director, Mark Williams, due to their outstanding level of talent, musicality, professionalism and commitment to Christian ministry.

The Bells of Christ Church performed a concert at Covenant Presbyterian on May 13, 2012. Their performance was exciting, moving, and inspiring. The group clearly possessed a high level of talent and training and their music was well rehearsed. A wide variety of styles and genres were performed, demonstrating the wide range of possibilities in hand bell repertoire and the diverse capabilities of the group.

Each member of the group performed with intention, skill, and commitment to the music. It was encouraging to see a

group of young people so invested in their music. It was also encouraging to see the mature conduct of this group of relatively young musicians....They were respectful and courteous at all times and displayed their Christian testimony in the way they interacted with each other and our congregation.

Mark Williams' direction of the group was skillful, exciting, and highly effective. He provided engaging commentary between each piece, giving insightful background and communicating the meaning behind each work performed.

Our congregations' response to The Bells of Christ Church was unanimous in that they loved the concert, were inspired by the young performers, and were encouraged by the Gospel work of The Bells and Christ Church Anglican as a whole. It is indeed rarer in this day and age to find a group of young musicians with such commitment to making God's glory known through excellent music as The Bells of Christ Church....



Christ Church Anglican is in receipt of a second historic grand piano! A member of our church's Compline choir spoke with Mark Williams last week informing him that his mother is currently moving out of her Wilmington Island home of 25+ years and into a garden apartment. The family grand needed a new home and the Compline member suggested to Mark that it might be worth a looksie. Turns out the piano was a 6-foot Chickering originally built in 1840 and completely restored in the 1970's (new hammers, new strings, new bushings, all working parts cleaned and brought up to snuff at the time).

Chickering is considered among the finest American piano manufacturers between the 1830's and 1940's. Three Chickering pianos sit in the White House. Chickering and Sons was an American piano manufacturer located in Boston, Massachusetts, known for producing award-winning instruments of superb quality and design. Interestingly enough, when Henry E. Steinway and his large family arrived in New York as immigrants from Germany, Henry attended an opening night of a NYC concert series but showed little interest in the soloist for the evening. His profound interest was in the Chickering piano, to which he dashed for such careful examination that he nearly had to be hauled away so the concert could begin.

Founder Jonas Chickering made several major contributions to the development of piano technology, most notably by introducing a one-piece, cast-iron plate to support the greater string tension of larger grand pianos. Chickering was the largest piano manufacturer in the United States in the middle of the nineteenth century, but was eventually surpassed in the 1860s by his admirer Henry Steinway. In 1867, Jonas's son Frank Chickering had the Imperial Cross of the Legion of Honour, then one of the world's most prestigious non-military awards, bestowed upon him by Emperor Napoleon III for services to the art of music, one of more than 200 awards the piano manufacturer garnered over the years.

Our "new" period Chickering piano has a lovely walnut case, is in superb condition for a piano of its age (quite rare), has its original ivory keys which are in remarkable condition, has a nice action and tone, and only needs a simple tuning and voicing to bring it up to being a completely usable instrument. The piano is now stored on the IPC Chapel stage and will eventually find its home as the choir room piano for our new church. Thanks to the Cole family for their kind gift to us and praise be to the Lord for His continuing and abundant provision!
