This last month it was exciting to see Raymond and Michelle, who immigrated to New Zealand and three years ago, met some members of the church and were baptized into Christ.




When they were baptized, it was their desire to teach their own family and friends back in the Philippians. So they

This last month was also sad as we lost a dear brother and friend Barry Raine


