A reflection on the role of The Blessed Virgin Mary in our salvation.

When we think about Mary, we should not be afraid of recognising her special role. Sadly, she has been the focus of a lot of controversy over the centuries. Sometimes her importance has been bizarrely exaggerated, so that others have overreacted and tried to make little of her. At the very least, she is the first person to put her trust in the God who is shown in Jesus. She is at least our elder sister as a believer. And older sisters often have a rather distinctive role in helping younger siblings to grow up and discover things. An older sister who knows her business can make a great deal of difference.

Mary knows her business. By her consent she makes Jesus possible in that place, at that time. And we should not be ashamed of looking to her to hold our hands from time to time. It's quite hard to imagine the depth and the level and the cost of what is asked of her by God in Luke's story of the Annunciation; to look at her and meditate on her 'yes' and seek her friendship in prayer is not at all an eccentric or foolish thing for a Christian to do if we want to grow in trust.

Reader A reading from the holy gospel according to Luke.

ALL Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

God's messenger was sent to the tiny village of Nazareth, to Mary, a young woman engaged to Joseph. Joseph is descended from David and this child, whose conception is announced, will occupy "the throne of his ancestor David" and "of his kingdom there will be no end". This is the work of the Spirit. Mary has conceived through God's loving and now to be embodied engagement in human affairs, and not by Joseph.

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn. Luke 2.1-7

A reading from the letter to the Galatians

Some teachers in Galatia had claimed that a Christian must first embrace Judaism, observing Mosaic law, which, it adopted, would have excluded women from full membership of the covenant. Paul wrote this letter to rebut this argument, to insist that both men and women, equally and together, come into union with God through faith in Christ with whom God makes us co-heirs of God's promises.

When the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, in order to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as children. And because you are children, God has sent the Spirit of his Son into our* hearts, crying, 'Abba! Father!' So you are no longer a slave but a child, and if a child then also an heir, through God.
