Multiple languages, sending people out around the world—how can this be a celebration of unity? All people languages are united in One Spirit, One Lord, One Baptism. No matter language we speak, no matter the country of our birth, we are all one people, speaking and hearing the language of love. This is love in action, make no mistake. We receive the Holy Spirit, not to be complacent, not to accept things as they are. We receive this lively, noisy, messy Spirit so that we are inwardly changed, so that we can go out and change the world.

DIAKONIA MUSINGS

The following is an article that I wrote and was hoping to have posted on the diocesan website. Since it hasn't been published as of yet, I wanted to share this with all of you.

A Deacon's Fish Tale

As a new deacon assigned to St. James parish in Batavia, I feel the need to toot a horn about the wonderful fish fries that I experienced this past Lenten season. I have never had the privilege of working with a twenty-three year old, "well-oiled machine" like the St. James fish fry group, as it steamed along week after week. Wayne Judkins, aka "The Codfather," is the man behind the wheel and the keeper of the expertise, engaging at least a dozen volunteers in the kitchen preparing food and cooking from morning till night on Fridays. There were always at least twice that many volunteers in the dining area and behind the scenes, serving, delivering, running, handling drinks, and cleaning up. There were students from two local high schools as well as Genesee Community College that spent hours volunteering. Members of St. Mark's Leroy also had fun serving in the dining area as they helped out their deanery neighbors.

Hungry people arrived an hour early so they would not miss out on the phenomenal homemade desserts that are made fresh every week by a team of very special bakers. They made a variety of mouthwatering delights that included: rice pudding, grape pie, strawberry rhubarb pie, carrot cake, peanut butter pie, chocolate cake and cheese cakes. Each week had its surprises.

This year, there were 2,073 fish dinners, and 80 mac and cheese sold, which translated into 1,275 pounds of fish. The dinners were an enormous amount of work, especially for the core group involved in ordering, kitchen prep and cooking, and yet I witnessed a display of camaraderie that only comes from serving others with love. They all had so much energy and enthusiasm for the tasks at hand.

Something that really touched my deacon's heart was the money collected for charity. Every year, St. James, selects six agencies or groups in Batavia to be recipients of donations collected at the fish fries. The names were publicized so people knew where the money was donated each week. A "tip jar" was put on the checkout table for the donations and patrons were always very generous. This year, with the publicity and selection directed by Theresa DeMars, the following organizations were honored with a total of \$1,380.00 in tips: All Babies Cherished, Books to the Rescue, Eagle Star Housing, LeRoy Backpack Program, Mercy Flight, and Volunteers for Animals. The generous giving is possible because of the church family and also the many community members who come to the dinners during Lent. They are owed a big thank you. I am definitely looking forwards to next year.

WARDEN'S REPORT

Rain and more rain! You may have noticed that all this recent rain has turned up yet more leaks in the church roof. Our roofing contractor has been busy trying to take care of these plus the work on the lower west roof of the Nave we planned for last fall. This is a nagging problem that we are doing our best to keep ahead of. A little dry weather would help in the short run, but we have to identify these leaks and take care of them before they cause serious problems. We will keep on it.

The Day of Caring was a huge success. Our volunteers from P. W. Minor cleaned and sorted the upstairs classrooms. This was something that has been on our "to-do" list for a long time. They also did a lot of outside work with Lilo Townsend beautifying our grounds. St. James also served lunch to some 30 or so volunteers from two work sites. Thank you to all who participated.

It has come to my attention that there are some in the congregation that are unsure of how things are getting done around St. James. I'm referring to things not related to our religious life but rather the day to day running of the church. First of all, of course, there is the Vestry, which is the final decision on most matters, especially financial. Members of the Vestry are listed on the back of the weekly bulletin and the newsletter. You can make your thoughts known to any of them to bring to the Vestry as a whole. You can also attend Vestry meetings if you wish.

Some members may not know that Mother Bonnie and the Wardens meet almost every week on Thursday afternoons. The first meeting of the month we put together the agenda for the following Vestry meeting (the third Tuesday). The fourth meeting of the month, the Treasurers are included, along with input from Barb, the Parish Administrator. This larger group focuses on financial issues of St. James. The other monthly meetings are devoted to issues that may arise from time to time, many of which will be passed on to the Vestry, ECW, Maintenance Team, Property Committee etc. for further action. Although, these Wardens' meetings are not generally open to the congregation, most of what goes on, with the exception of confidential information, is available by speaking with the Rector or one of the Wardens. As a rule, we do not discuss issues related to worship, liturgy and such. Related questions should be directed to Mother Bonnie.

St. James belongs to all of its members. Speaking for myself, I would like to see more participation--a lot more.

ADOPT-A-PROJECT REPORT

Adopt-a-Project is a way to keep our buildings and grounds, beautiful, tended, safe and welcoming without impacting the St. James budget. These projects are funded, and in most cases completed by loving St. James parishioners who put their time, money and expertise into completing these projects.

How can you help? You can fund all or a part of a project. You can donate your time and expertise to completing a project. Is a project too big for you to fund entirely? You can donate what you can, or find other interested parishioners to help completely fund a project. Project contributions can be made anonymously, if you prefer. Please remember that donations to Adopt-a-Project are in addition to your pledge to St. James, not in place of it.

If you'd like to participate, please talk to Mother Bonnie, Jim Neider (Sr Warden), Russ Dvoroznak (Jr. Warden), Peter Mark (Treasurer), Keith Price (Treasurer), or Barb King (Parish Administrator). This group of

five (Rector, Wardens, Treasurer, and Parish Administrator) review all potential projects to determine their acceptability and priority before they are offered to the parish for support.

The following is a brief description of projects since last fall that have been funded and completed (or nearly so). The materials and supplies for these projects were funded by “Adopt-a-Project” and “The Paint Can Fund”. Most of the labor for these projects was donated by members of the Maintenance Team. Our operating budget (funded by your donations and investment income) WAS NOT affected by these projects because of the generous donations of time, money and labor by our parishioners.

Front Doors and back of the Nave

1. The doors are openable, add weather stripping, drop pins, etc. were added.
2. Painting of walls up to the stained glass sill in the front door area.
3. Replaced the entire sill at the bottom of the stained glass windows.
4. Repaired wall cracks and loos plaster areas.
5. Repaired the brochure table, including the Formica and trim.
6. Replaced the drop pins on the side doors.
7. Repaired pews

Handicap Entrance

8. Replaced the decking of the ramp (to be completed this Spring)

Thrift Store Entrance

9. Repaired and painted the concrete of the entrance to the Thrift Store, which eliminated a possible tripping hazard for people entering the store.
10. Railings painted

Double Door Entrance (“Turner Entrance”)

11. Concrete steps repaired and restored, masonry wall repointed, rails painted.
12. Wood coat rack built and installed, walls and ceiling repaired and painted, new ceiling light

Reception Hallway and Stairway

13. Paint, wall paper, wall crack repairs

Landing Restrooms

14. Walls repairs, corners rebuilt, painting. There is still work to do on this project! Please see below.

Northwest Nave Entrance

15. Masonry of steps repaired
16. New railing built and installed
17. Doors repaired, drop pin installed, “hold open” system created

Parish Hall

18. New windows caulked and painted
19. Base concrete blocks cleaned out, mortared back in, waterproof sealed with tar, bottom blocks painted
20. Many areas of black top repaired

Barn

21. Repair work and cleaning

AND...many small repairs, fixes and clean-ups (at least 50).

Landing Restrooms

- Already Funded: New tall toilets
- Already Donated: Lots of labor and painting
- Needed: \$1,500. Funding for tearing out the old flooring of both bathrooms and the landing, installing new underlayment, new commercial grade inlaid flooring to all three areas
- Needed: Funding for purchase and installation of new sink fixtures (Cost TBD)

Stair Lift into the Parish Hall

- Needed: Funding to purchase a new or used stair lift to make our Parish Hall handicap accessible.

Outside Black Metal Stairs and Landing outside of the kitchen door.

- Needed: \$700. Funding for labor and materials. This should be done soon to prevent additional rust and deterioration. (We don't want them wind up as bad as the emergency stairs and landing.

Parish Hall and Kitchen Doors

- Needed: \$250. Funding to paint the doors, door jambs and inside trim.

Nave Floor-Red Squares

- Donated: labor to paint
- Needed: Funding for the paint. Stay tuned, as soon as we have measured the area and figured the cost of paint we will get that information out to you in the bulletin.

New Floor Mats for Building Entrances

- Needed: Funding for six 6-foot mats at \$80 each, an 8-foot mat at \$105 and a 12 foot mat at \$150. These costs are approximate and may change based on number, size and quality of mats.

VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS

1. The vestry hears a presentation from the third of four companies that it is considering for engaging as our investment manager. QCI Asset Management, Inc. Presentation by H. Edward Shill and Timothy M. Maher.

2. Rector's Report: Resignation of Sexton, Gerrit Wilk. His duties will be evaluated and other possible solutions for the cleaning of the church and yard work are being explored. Property Committee will identify and prioritize work that needs to be done. Guest musicians are being programmed for the summer.
3. Sr. Warden's Report: New sound system has been installed but may need to be adjusted. A permanent solution is needed for handicapped accessibility from the Nave to the Church Hall.
4. Jr. Warden's Report: Adopt-A-Project is in limbo as more funds are needed to complete some projects. Security Roofing will be giving us an estimate on the work that needs to be done on the roof after our last episode of major flooding in the church.
5. Treasurers' Report: Increase in parishioners' giving. Ad-Hoc Committee of Dorian Ely and Lilo Townsend will look into the Scrip Program. Easter offering will be used to purchase new acolyte and Eucharistic minister robes.
6. The vestry approved an ECW fundraiser. They will be selling chicken barbeque tickets at \$11.00 each for Alex's.
7. Outreach Team: Community effort called Connections (formerly UMTOO and started by the United Methodist Church). Looking for a new location before reopening to the public. International effort: CHERA (formerly known as the Bishop Masereka mission. All of St. James are encouraged to become involved in an outreach activity.
8. Barn Roof Replacement: Vestry accepted Bid from A-Z General Contracting LLC.
9. Trash: Our contract with Waste Management ends on July 1, 2017. Vestry voted to accept bid of ARC of Genesee-Orleans for trash pick up.
10. Scholarship Awards: Nanami Nakayama; Jenna Essig; and Nichole Essig.
11. Audit Committee 2016: Barbara Pierce, David Lange and Theresa DeMars.
12. Rectory Lease: Present Lease extended to June 30, 2017. New Lease will be negotiated by the Wardens.

NEWS FROM THE NATIONAL CHURCH

**The Episcopal Church and the United Methodist Church
are working on a Full Communion Agreement.**

The Episcopal Church-United Methodist Dialogue Committee has released its proposal for full communion between the two denominations. Full implementation of the proposal will take at least three years. The Episcopal Church General Convention and the United Methodist Church General Conference must approve the agreement, which culminates 15 years of exploration and more than 50 years of formal dialogue between the two churches. General Convention of the Episcopal Church next meets in July 2018 in Austin, Texas. The General Conference of the Methodist Church next meeting s in 2020.

The 10-page proposal, titled “A Gift to the World, Co-Laborers for the Healing of Brokenness,” says it “is an effort to bring our churches into closer partnership in the mission and witness to the love of God and thus labor together for the healing of divisions among Christians and for the well-being of all.”

Montana Bishop Frank Brookhart, Episcopal co-chair of the dialogue, and Bishop Gregory V. Palmer, United Methodist co-chair, wrote in a recent letter that “the relationship formed over these years of dialogue, and the recognition that there are no theological impediments to unity, pave the way for this current draft proposal.” In the coming months, there will be opportunities for feedback, regional gatherings and discussions on the proposal, according to a May 17 press release. “We encourage you to reach across denominational lines to establish new relationships and deepen existing relationships by shared study of these materials and mutual prayer for the unity our churches,” Brookhart and Palmer wrote. “We believe that this proposal represents a significant witness of unity and reconciliation in an increasingly divided world and pray that you will join us in carrying this work.”

The Episcopal Church defines “full communion” to mean “a relation between distinct churches in which each recognizes the other as a catholic and apostolic church holding the essentials of the Christian faith.” The churches “become interdependent while remaining autonomous,” the church has said. The Episcopal Church-United Methodist Dialogue Committee, says the two denominations are not seeking a merger but that they are “grounded in sufficient agreement in the essentials of Christian faith and order” to allow for the interchangeability of ordained ministries, among other aspects of the proposed agreement.
