Diakonia Musings

As I sit and write this during the winter storm, I can see the birds outside my window. They come to my feeders every day, knowing they will be feed. Today, with the snow piling up and the frigid wind blowing snow around, they are barely visible to me. Yet, they anticipate that there will be food for them. If the supply gets too buried by the snow or depleted by the abundance of birds and squirrels that are eating, they will wait patiently in the trees, watching for me to take more seeds and meal worms out and sprinkle them in the cleared area below the feeders. In this kind of weather, eating the right kind of food gives them heat and energy to stay warm.

It is the same for us, God's children. Like the birds that I take care of, God can be counted on to take care of us. We gather at church for services to be feed by prayers, scripture, music, words, and the eucharist. We gather in community to share a meal with each other. We are feed by the love of friends and family that imitate the love of Christ for us. And during the storms of our lives, it is nice to know that God does not abandon us as we wait patiently in the trees. The love of God for each one of us, from the tiniest sparrow to the biggest crows, from the nasty bluejays to the predatory hawks, is absolute, and nothing we do will interfere with that reality. The creator always takes care of us.

Outreach

In the coming weeks, Diane Cox and I are going to meet with people about the respite care ministry, making sure we are associated with the right organizations to meet our needs. We will keep you posted on our progress. Thank you to all of you that have signed up so far and we look forwards to hearing from more of you so we can make this a reality. Jesus called us to look out for each other and especially to those that are marginalized. This is a wonderful way to answer this call to a communal ministry.

You can volunteer once a month, once every few months, or a few times a year. It's up to you how often you want to assist. Each month we need enough volunteers to be one on one with a guest, someone to help with music/games/projects, and two people to make, serve, and clean up lunch. There is a two hour training for all involved which will give us many hints, insights, and ideas about working with those who suffer from memory loss. Prayerfully consider giving of your time and talent.

If you are interested in helping out with the card ministry, help would be appreciated. The commitment would involve getting cards for shut-ins signed and sent out about 6 times a year or every other month.

Welcome to our New Resident Sexton and his Family

We are pleased to announce that St. James has rented the rectory and has, at the same time, engaged Mr. Clinton Young to serve as part-time Resident Sexton. Clinton in the last year has moved north from North Carolina. There he had many years’ experience as a carpenter/remodeling contractor. Currently he is working for A to Z General Contracting of Batavia. Clinton has already done some jobs at St. James working for A to Z. He is an experienced framing to finish contractor. Last Sunday (Annual Meeting Sunday) we pressed him into early sexton work, blowing snow,

shoveling, and applying ice melt. We were shorthanded and he came on short notice to clear snow for the meeting.

Clinton and his family will officially take over renting and sextons duties on March 1st. Clinton along with Tina McCue and her son will be living in the rectory, in exchange for rent and Clinton doing the Resident Sexton's duties. Tina's son will be attending GCC this year. Clinton is experienced with care and maintenance of mowers, snow blowers, weed eaters, etc. So when you see Clinton or Tina please welcome them to St. James.

The part-time Resident Sexton's duties include outdoor work only, including shoveling snow, mowing grass, and trimming bushes.

NOTE: Projects #1, 2, 3 and 5 are arguably not "capital improvement" projects. They are maintenance efforts, by classical definition, and are included in the 12-Year Capital Improvement Plan because they are considered fundamentally necessary to preserve and extend service life of elements of church infrastructure.

As previously noted, the Finance Team has recommended that all 2019 projects which were not previously funded by the Vestry will be funded by the Bricks and Mortar Project, in order to minimize the current year draw on the Endowment.

As such, subject to project approval by the Vestry, your continued support of Bricks and Mortar will be needed in order to progress the Masonry Repair and Bedroom window replacement projects listed above.





Recipe Corner for February

7 Up Biscuits

4 cups Bisquick
1 cup sour cream
1 cup 7-up
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup melted butter

Mix Bisquick, sour cream and 7-up. Dough will be very Soft - don't worry. Knead and fold dough until coated with your baking mix. Pat dough out and cut biscuits using a round biscuit/cookie cutter. Melt butter in bottom of cookie sheet pan or 9 x 13" casserole dish. Place biscuits on top of melted butter and bake at 425° for 12-15 minutes.
