It's good to be outside again, and to leave my house without a jacket. The winter was long and hard and there were days when I thought that I would be wearing fleece for the rest of my natural born life. It is good to wear flip-flops again, and let my toes see the light of day, and let my boots collect a layer of dust in the back of the closet. It is good to sleep with the windows open, and hear the birds when they wake me up too early in the morning. It is even good to hear my beloved spouse complain about allergy season in the middle of the night before slamming down our open window when he can't take it anymore. There were many nights over the winter when I slept in multiple layers and was buried under a heavy weight of blankets, shivering in the cold, listening to wind and ice batter my window, wondering if the earth would ever thaw.

The Great 50 Days of Easter return to us every year, just when we fear we might be stuck forever in a frigid world of purple. Just when we don't know if we can cope with one more penitential psalm, Mr. Morgan and the choir lead us in Alleluias. THE COMMUNITY OF ST. JOHN BAPTIST CONCERT


Sunday, May 3rd

A VIRTUOUS CYCLE

Joe Ray Bikes for St. John's

A Virtuous Cycle to Benefit St. John on the Mountain

Parishioner, Joe Ray, will ride 1500 kilometers in four rides (April 18, 25, May 16 and June 6) in order to qualify to ride in the Paris-Brest-Paris Randonneur ("PBP") which will be held this August in France. Each ride must be completed within a set time limit. The time limit includes stops for rest, flat tires, food and drink, etc. Rides are unsupported, so whatever you need you bring with you on the ride or you find it along the route. There is no "team car" handing out food and performance drinks. So, what makes this *Virtuous*? You!! Joe is inviting fellow parishioners to pledge \$x.xx per kilometer to sponsor him. All money raised at the end of the journey will be paid to St. John on the Mountain to support the church's operations for 2015. The total amount of money will be based on the total kilometers completed. Assuming Joe successfully completes all four rides, here are some examples of pledges:

DIOCESAN NEWS

On April 18th, our Diocesan community gathered in Trenton for the Bishop's Spring Conference, which focused on Christian Formation. Our Rector was in attendance, and it was an inspiring day of meeting with neighbors throughout the Diocese and learning from people from other parts of the country whose work and passion is Christian formation and discipleship in an ever-changing word. In the coming months, we will be learning more from our new Canon for Congregational Development, the Rev. Canon Rob Droste, whose work in our Diocese will focus on congregational vitality and growth. Canon Droste worshipped with us on Easter morning, which was a high honor for us! What a gift it is to be in community with our Bishop and his staff!

AN EXCERPT FROM A LETTER FROM BISHOP STOKES

Dear People of the Diocese of New Jersey,

Wow! The first Bishop's Spring Conference was really a wow! Nearly 400 people gathered last Saturday to hear three outstanding speakers raise the roof.

The Rev. Canon Angela Ifill, Canon Missioner for Black Ministries for The Episcopal Church, talked about moving the people in our churches from "membership" to "discipleship."

Dr. David Anderson presented a high energy and compelling case for reestablishing the home as the primary locus for faith formation. Reminding us of the Benedictine foundations of our Anglican/Episcopal way, he offered concrete ways to strengthen the partnership between the home and the congregation. David introduced "Taking Faith Home" leaflet inserts that encourage families to engage in the "four keys" of "caring conversation," "rituals and traditions," "devotions" and "service." David also emphasized blessing the milestones of life in the home and in the congregation with intentional "milestone ministries" that capture the sanctity of these turning point moments.

John Roberto reminded us that in our world with a population of 7.21 billion people, more than 3 billion are active users of the internet. He stated: "Our world is personal, portable and participatory, our faith formation needs to personal, portable and participatory as well." He urged us to recognize that "God is blessing us with an abundance of new resources and tools for faith formation and that it is incumbent upon us to use these tools." John offered practical ways every parish can

communicate the Christian story and faith more effectively using technology resulting in vibrant congregations living vibrant faith.

Those who attended the Bishop's Spring Conference last Saturday were energized and received practical suggestions for addressing the very real challenges facing all congregations today. If you weren't at Trinity Cathedral last Saturday, you really missed an important event.

Fortunately, we can put into practice what we learned last week. Those who missed the Conference can connect with it by watching John Roberto's talk online and listening to Angela Ifill and David Anderson's talks which are now available on our website. I urge you to do this. It's really about a cultural change going on in our diocese and our church that will help us deepen faith in our congregations and beyond.

I hope that vestries and Christian formation committees will watch or listen to the talks and then engage in conversations about them. I hope you will find ways to implement what you learn from them into your congregation's practices. It's an exciting time to be the church.

I pray that your Eastertide continues to be joyful.

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
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
