

# Views from the Mountain

### From the Rector

The Community Garden at Ross Farms yielded 1,000 pounds of produce. Partnering with neighboring Episcopal parishes, those vegetables were raised by faithful gardeners, and donated to area Food Banks. So when Fr. Rick Morley, the Rector of St. Mark's in Basking Ridge and I started to make plans for High Holy Days, we wondered about that plot of earth, frozen and fallow in the weeks of Lent. We wondered what it would be like to celebrate the First Eucharist of Easter and be fed by God a few feet away from where our communities, by God's grace, had experienced the privilege of feeding others.

That is how it came to pass that we found ourselves in a barn on the Highest Holy night of the year, joined with about 70 members of the community who gathered around the new fire and then huddled in the barn to listen the ancient story of salvation, to renew the promises of baptism using an evergreen branch that had been cut from a tree just outside the barn, and to celebrate the first Eucharist of Easter with glowsticks and Christmas lights to be reminders of the Light of Christ.

Planning the days was a creative delight for us and for the musicians and lay leaders, especially Rick Morgan, whose inspiration shaped our celebration in remarkable ways. Our parishes collaborated to mark the Paschal Triduum together in a unique fashion.

Maundy Thursday was celebrated at St. Mark's, using one of the oldest Eucharistic prayers, and both communities sat at round tables together, shared a meal, and washed one another's feet; indulging in such intimacy with people that we had, in some cases, met just that evening. The evening ended with the our united community gathered around the consecrated Bread and Wine that would be shared on Good Friday. "Stay with me. Remain here with me. Watch and pray," we chanted together by candlelight.

On Good Friday the parishes gathered in our magnificent Parish Hall. Before a wooden cross was carried and placed in our midst and the Bread and Wine from the previous evening was shared, the Passion of Jesus was read by lectors from both congregations. Musicians from St. Mark's and St. John on the Mountain offered hauntingly beautiful expressions of the holiness of the night, and a Warden from each parish led the assembly in solemn prayer for the Church and the World.

On Saturday night, we were joined by our neighbors from St. Bernard's. Having shared a remarkable three days of prayer and worship, we sat side by side while the choir sang a Shaker tune that was probably best sung in a barn set to the text called "Lord of the Dance." It gave the words richer meaning.

"Dance, then, wherever you may be.
'I am the Lord of the Dance,' said he.
And I'll lead you all wherever you may be."

It will be time to plant again soon. I wonder where the Lord will lead us next.

Alleluia! Christ is risen!
