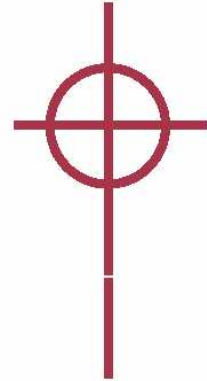
THE ONLY CONSTANT IN LIFE IS CHANGE

Last night while at St. Lawrence (more about that later), I overheard two people lamenting how quickly the year was rushing past and that they were not mentally or emotionally prepared for the changing seasons and the impending holidays. As I often do, I found myself thinking the exact opposite. I love when the weather changes and we have new seasons upon us. I can't wait until the current year is over and we get to start a new year. My wife claims I have one of those attention deficit conditions with some long acronym, but I've always thought maybe I just get bored quickly. I embrace new challenges and believe few things change fast enough to be interesting. We have one of those motivational placards on the wall where I work that says, "Life is change. Growth is optional. Choose wisely." I think those words are true. Life is all about change. It is how people decide to accept change that makes the difference in whether they are happy or not.

Last night Bishop Lee was at St. Lawrence to talk about the Diocesan Convention next month. One of the things he said that I found interesting was that he asked a high-powered consultant who is working for the Diocese what three things he could do to make him a more effective leader of the Diocese. One of the things the consultant told him was to change 30% of what the Diocese was doing. When Bishop Lee asked him why he should change so much of what was currently being done, the consultant told him you have to always be changing how you do things. I'm not sure whether 30% is the right number, but I agree with his premise. Benjamin Franklin said "When you're finished changing, you're finished."

I believe St. Lawrence is on an exciting path that will include changes. By the time you read this article, the St. Lawrence Long Range Plan will have been rolled out to the parish. This is a project I have enjoyed working on over the past several months. I have had an opportunity to work with a large number of parishioners with extraordinary talents I didn't realize we had. The feedback we received from the parish overwhelmingly supported changes in one fashion or another. I am not talking about wholesale, 180 degree change for change's sake, but I foresee changes and I am sure there will be some grumbling. There is always grumbling when things change. But, hopefully, the grumbling will be ephemeral. If we execute the long range plan properly, I believe we will have a more relevant and effective church that will be doing fewer things better. I hope this will make the vast majority of the parish even more proud to call St. Lawrence their church. Maybe we will attract more new members who will be impressed with what they see us doing in the community.

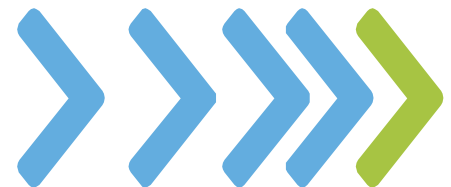

The event coincided with the beginning of the annual clergy conference held at St. Mary's Conference Center on Oct. 18 and 19. The liturgy that evening was festive, the music joyful. GREEN MINISTRY TEAM

If you have read many of these columns, you probably know that trees are special to me. I can't say exactly why. I enjoy observing any plant or animal in nature, and I have spent more time studying wild flowers, grasses, and sedges simply because there are so many more species of them. But I find for some reason that looking closely at trees, walking among them, smelling the bitter odor of a crushed cherry twig, touching the bark of a red oak, or listening to the wind high up in the branches of a white pine has a calming effect on me.

I have four young trees in my front yard, now about three feet tall. Three are progeny of the big bur oak in my backyard. The fourth is also a bur oak, but judging by the slightly different size and color of its leaves, it is of different parentage—probably from one of the neighbor's trees to the west. Never mind, it has a home in my front yard. The squirrels plant acorns around my house every year, and seedling oaks pop up in the grass and flowerbeds. I spotted these little trees last spring and moved them to their present place in my front yard. This has been a wonderful year for young oaks, and they have more than doubled their height. My neighbors stop to admire them, which makes me a proud father. At some point in the future, I or the next owner will need to make a choice—all four trees will not fit in the same small yard when they get big, but those choices are some years ahead. By then fate or changing circumstances may have pared the four down to two or one, making the choice unnecessary.

I will not live to see any of them become large, but that is alright too, as watching them grow is repayment enough for the small amount of work it takes to care for them. At the beginning of the 19th century, the ground where my house stands was part of an oak grove, and old bur oaks and Hills' oaks are scattered through the neighborhood to this day. But there are no small oaks to replace them as they pass away. There are many other trees to be sure, and these trees add much beauty to our neighborhood, but very few oaks. In particular, there seem to be none of the progeny of these old trees. I imagine this is so because we are told that oaks grow slowly, and we want a quicker return on our investment. It is quite possible that the oak you plant today, or the oak seedling you allow to grow, could change the world 200 years into the future, when it is a great spreading tree that *(continued on page 8)*

enriches the life of a young girl or boy who grows up beneath it, or who rides their bike past it every day in every summer, or who sits on one of its large lower branches and watches the world go by. To believe this is to believe in the future.

These oaks are not just trees, they are part of our history. The oaks in my yard descend from trees that lived in the area thousands of years ago. All trees are beautiful, but there is a continuity and sense of belonging to these trees that sets them apart. I like to think that tending these oaks is a tribute to the place where they grow, paying my respects to history.

If you look around town within 1/4 mile of the old Cook Mansion, you will find a scattering of very old sugar maples. Exactly who planted the trees is unknown to me. They are gorgeous old trees and come to us from the middle of the 19th century, the early days of the village. Presumably, there were many more at one time. They put on a brightly colored show each fall, and everyone who frequents the downtown area enjoys them. Like all trees, however, they grow old and die, and it would seem a feature of the village we would want to recognize and maintain. The more recently planted trees in Cook Park are beautiful in their own right, but there are no sugar maples among them, and they are much like the trees in countless other parks across the Midwest.

Each generation will make its own stamp on the land, but the stamp that marks our generation apart need not disregard the past. If we do not honor the history of places, they all end up looking the same—cookie-cutter landscapes as universally reflective of pop culture as shopping malls, made over every few decades to appeal to a new generation of shoppers. Is that really what we want from the nature that is nearest to us?

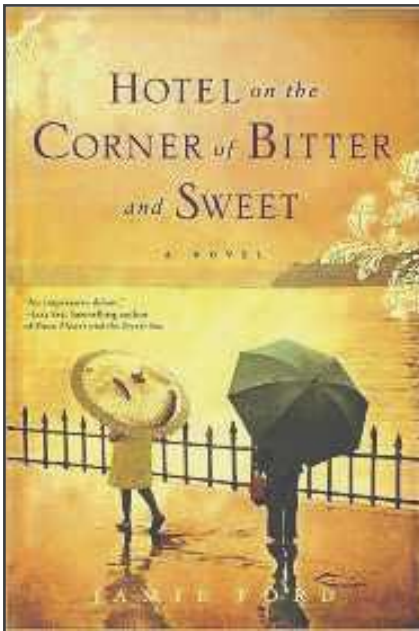

7) **If I/we had a million dollars...** We would use the money to help those in need and the rest we would use to pay off student loans and go back to school!

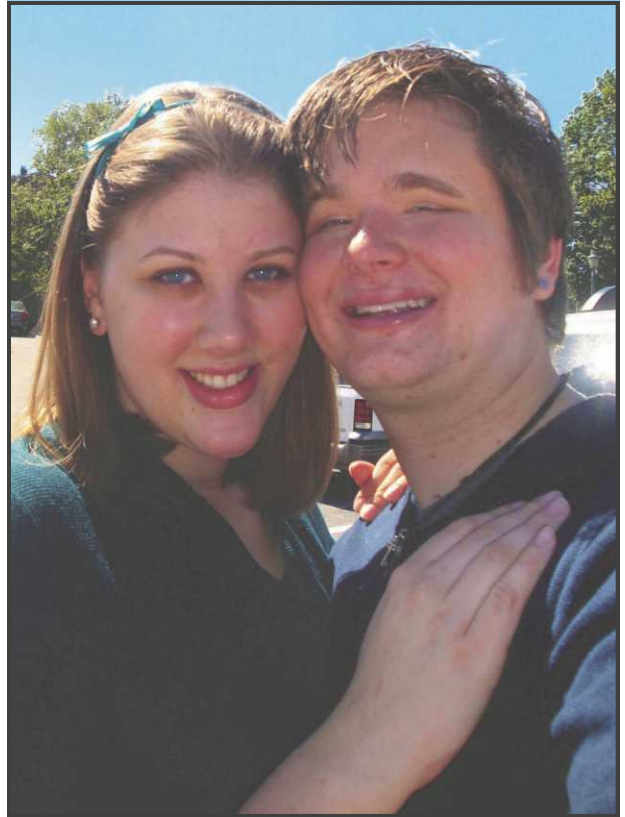
8) **Favorite time of year...** Fall. We love this season for the fall weather, Bears football, and fall drinks from Starbucks.

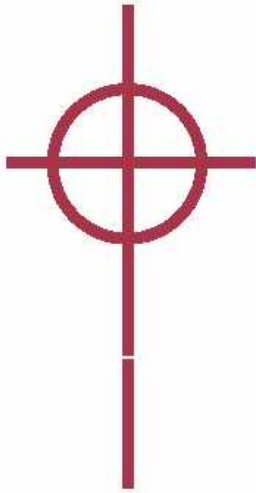
