OUTREACH

The Outreach Committee's focus for April is on local organization: Emmanuel House



Who we are:

Emmanuel House is a non-profit, Aurora-based organization dedicated to helping refugee and working-class families save and break the cycle of poverty through home ownership. In close collaboration with our partner organizations, qualified families are selected and subsequently given the opportunity to live in one of our apartments for 18 months. Families pay market rate rent just as they would anywhere else, but by leveraging a variety of created and existing resources, an entire year's rent (between \$10,000 - \$12,000) is channeled into a trust for the family. This provides a down payment on their first home in Aurora, eliminating the *primary and often sole barrier to homeownership – the ability to save a down payment.*

Marchesani Scholarship Recipients Seizing Opportunities in College

From the time T'Prinn was four years old, her family has benefited from the services available at Hesed House, whether it was case management, the PADS Emergency Overnight Shelter, the Transitional Living Community or the Lighthouse Permanent Supportive Housing program. With the chaos that accompanies homelessness, T'Prinn and her two older brothers struggled with truancy, but never lost the desire to learn and to improve their situation. "My experience with homelessness has been long, and there were ups and downs, but it also instilled in me many lessons that might have taken me years to learn in any other situation," T'Prinn said. "Humility, perseverance, strength in family... the list is endless." In spite of a challenging childhood, T'Prinn has set her educational goals high and is aiming for nothing but the best. She is attending the University of Illinois at Chicago on a Pre-Med track with plans to attend medical school. She wants to show others in her situation that it is possible to be successful and to show the world that no one should be written off at first glance. "There are many people who are homeless that have great things to offer the world. They simply need a chance," T'Prinn said. While recognizing there are financial benefits to becoming a doctor, the benefits T'Prinn expects to receive personally are what draws her to this career. "There is satisfaction in knowing that I can help people and being able to do that is amazing to me," T'Prinn said. "I just hope that one day I can give back to all of the people that have helped me my entire life and contribute to the world in a positive way." ELECTRONIC GIVING AT ST. MARK'S

giving, the amount that you wish to commit to the work of St. Mark's Lutheran Church is automatically withdrawn from your checking/savings account on either a weekly or monthly basis. **The amount that you designate for electronic giving can either be your full pledge or only a part of your pledge.** If you sign up for the weekly option, the amount you designate will be withdrawn every Thursday. If you sign up for the monthly option, the amount will be withdrawn on the first Thursday of the month.

GIFTS OF STOCK TO ST. MARKS



As you finish your 2015 taxes and begin your financial and tax planning for 2016, one option you may want to consider is a direct gift of stock to St. Marks. While the stock market is going through a volatile period right now, one option you could still consider is making a direct gift of appreciated stock or mutual funds. This can create a win-win situation for both you and St. Marks. You will receive a charitable income tax deduction for the full fair market value of the stock or mutual fund and potentially reduce your long term capital gains on the appreciated stock. In order to take advantage of this, you would have to donate the stock directly to the church without selling it. The congregation would then sell the stock to turn the donation into

cash. The congregation does have a process in place to handle such gifts. If you are interested in moving forward with such an option, please contact our Financial Secretary, Jim Erickson at: jerickson@stmarksaurora.net or (630) 897-0291.

You should consult with your financial or tax advisor before actually making such a gift to insure that it meets your situation.

SHARING THE PEACE

In our worship times we have the opportunity to greet one another and share God's peace with those around us. This is a time to remember that we are part of a community that is built on our relationship in Jesus Christ.

It is not imperative that we necessarily "shake" hands but a simple nod with a greeting, a fist bump, or touching elbows suffices. The reason is that for some who have compromised immune systems germs and viruses can be transmitted through no fault of anyone. And with the recent influenza and flu bugs that have affected so many we have begun the option of sharing the Peace by either a verbal greeting, a nod, a fist bump, or touching elbows. Health and wellness are important and we need to make sure we do all we can to provide for that for those who come to worship.



The method of sharing the Peace is not important – the fact that we are doing it, is. Peace be with you.

PAUL'S MINISTRY

You may have noticed Paul's Ministry listed under Prayer Requests section of our weekly Courier. Many people are asking about it and want to know exactly what it is. So here is a brief background:

Two years ago, the Adult Bible Study covered Paul's letter to the Colossians. As with all of our studies, conversation and discussions are lively and this was the case with Colossians. Paul, from prison, was writing to this new church. His purpose was to encourage the new Christians and caution them to follow the Word of God and not to be led astray by the old ways and local gods. Paul told them to trust in God's promises. Times were stressful and dangerous. Christians were in hiding and were fearful. On the last day of this study, the Holy Spirit whispered and a comparison was made between Paul's ministry then and now. In Paul's time it was dangerous and stressful, it was easy to slide back into being like everyone else and worship other gods. Realization dawned that Paul's ministry might again be appropriate. Times are tough! Many have no faith or belief in God, churches are closing.



Therefore, a group of St. Mark's members began Paul's Ministry with the goal of writing to every ELCA church in Illinois. The letters are encouraging, they remind others of our connections and our purpose. We write about being apart of something larger than just our one church. We let them know that our staff, our prayer team, and our congregation has prayed for them and ask that they pray for us. We ask them to be strong and trust in God's promises for he has a plan although it may not be easy to see or understand. Connecting and affirming that they are not alone is the whole purpose.

Are the churches listed under "prayer requests" in trouble? Not necessarily! That is not our purpose. We simply want to reach out and let them know that others are thinking of and praying for them. It's sharing God's peace by letter.

PRAYER CORNER

Recently I had a wonderful conversation with a young man I've known since he was born. He talked about learning something new, something just for him. He continued that he had his work, his family, and church but that he needed something more. A balance, I said, you are looking for a balance.

Too often we get wrapped up in our day to day lives and we get out of balance. We need the darkness to enjoy the light. When we walk through the desert or the wilderness, and we hope to encounter an oasis or meadow. We need family and community but we also need time alone. We need sorrow to appreciate joy. As humans, as Christians, we need a balance in our lives. Worship, daily prayer, being of service to our own congregation, our community and our world.

Lent, for me, helps bring the need for balance into focus.

In Medieval times, it became too dangerous for Christians to make an annual pilgrimage to the Holy Land. Daily prayer was important but other methods of "physical" pilgrimage needed to be invented. **The Stations of the Cross is one method** (there are purple sheets at the Welcome Desk with information on the Stations of the Cross). Christians could follow in Jesus' footsteps on the way to the cross without traveling to the Holy Land. **Another method was the Labyrinth**. A Labyrinth is like a maze however there is only one way in and one way out. When walking a Labyrinth, the path leads into the center (representing Christ) and back out about again. As you walk the path, you make an equal number of left and right turns. Those equal number of turns, physically do something to your inner ear and sense of balance.

Lent ends with the Tritium: the three days before Easter. During **Maundy Thursday** worship, the last supper, we strip the altar of book, candles, communion ware, altar cloth, and banners. During **Good Friday** worship, we walk the Stations, the Way of the Cross, as if we are walking with Jesus. We listen as Scripture is read, we rest in the silence, we reflect as musical offerings speak to and for our souls. The lights go out, we hear the "tomb" slam shut and the low, lonely bell is rung. Then during the Vigil of **Easter**, we wait.

Yet...we are not left in darkness, in the desert, alone or in sorrow because there is a Resurrection!

Alleluia! He is risen! He is risen indeed!

FEED MY STARVING CHILDREN





We have celebrated our daughter-in-law's birthday for several years with a FMSC packing party with friends and family. We were delighted to have the opportunity to pack in our first mobile event.

Imagine entering a football stadium, you sense the excitement, energy, and determination. There are 1,000 volunteers on the field working around 350 large tables. They are filling bags at the rate of over 14,000 per hour, and there are about 30 volunteers moving about distributing ingredients and hauling boxes packed with meals. The final session is cut short, the warehouse has run out of rice! The volunteers have exceeded the goal of packing 1 million meals in 2 days! They pray over the pallets. Over 99% of the meals will reach their intended destination!

The volunteers have packed more than meals, they have packed life and hope. An image of a baby appears on the orientation screen, only it isn't a baby, it is a 2 ½ year old boy who weighs less than 10 lbs. A new image appears, it is the little boy after 3 months of FMSC meals. He weighs 20 lbs., he is smiling, he can stand and walk. The missionary reports the little boy is now 3 years old and weighs 30 lbs. He is able to run!

We are fortunate to have a permanent packing facility in Aurora. There are jobs for everyone regardless of abilities, and children are encouraged to participate. FMSC will validate service hours for students. The ingredients for 1 million meals costs \$250,000. Donations can be made on line, and gift cards can be printed. We have given these to our grandsons to honor their first communions. The local facility has unique gifts from around the world. They also have popular items like t-shirts.

Have You Been to Yellow Springs?

You may not have ever heard of or traveled to a small town in Ohio called Yellow Springs, but it has a rather fascinating and unbelievable history and present day reality.

Today in Yellow Springs, Ohio, people are still receiving Christmas presents from an Earth Angel -- an ex-slave named Wheeling Gaunt, who was born in 1812 and who died in 1894. Just before he died, he deeded nine acres of land at the south edge of town to the village of Yellow Springs, the proceeds from the sale of which were to buy perpetual Christmas gifts for "poor widows," which the village continues to buy to this day.

Yellow Springs has renamed those nine acres Gaunt Park and it now serves as a place for people to enjoy nature and for children to have fun. However, still to this day 10 pounds of flour and 10 pounds of sugar arrive at the home of every widow in town just in time for holiday baking, thanks to this former slave. The inscription on his plaque reads: "Not What We Have But What We Share"

"NOT WHAT WE HAVE BUT WHAT WE SHAKE"

JULY 4, 1978

As a pastor greeted persons at the door following a stewardship sermon in which he discussed pledging, a disgruntled member asked accusingly, "Where in the Bible do you find anything about pledging?" Like many of us this man was uncomfortable being challenged to pledge to his church.

Instead of being defensive about his sermon the pastor answered good-naturedly, "That's a good question. Let's get together over lunch and talk about it this week." The gentleman agreed; a time and place were set. Later that week the two of them did get together for lunch. After they had ordered, the pastor brought up the subject.

"You know, your question is a good one." The pastor said the question forced him to do some thinking. "The Bible is full of references to pledging," he told the reluctant church member. But the member remained unconvinced.

"Come on now, Pastor," he said. He knew that sometimes pastors have a way of exaggerating.

The pastor told him that he looked up the word, "pledge," in a Bible dictionary.

He had written down some of the words he found there that pertained to pledging: "Commit, promise, dedicate, devote, covenant, vow" — very familiar Biblical words. That made the man think more about stewardship. His pastor explained, "Christian stewardship is merely a reflection of our spiritual commitment to Christ. Stewardship is, first of all, our response to God." The man's attitude about pledging changed as a result of their lunch together.

During these Easter Season days, we are reminded of the great hope and promise that we share in and through the Resurrection of Jesus. It is because of that powerful event in which God defeated the powers of death and the devil that you and I can respond in joy and thanksgiving.

Our stewardship, not just our giving of money, but our whole life is a celebration of what our God has done for us in and through Jesus' Resurrection! May the power of that first Resurrection morning give you hope and confidence and energy and power to live your life in grateful response to the God who has given us all.

April is IBS Awareness Month



If you have IBS, you're not alone.

If you have irritable bowel syndrome (IBS), you are not alone. IBS is common with worldwide prevalence estimated at 9% to 23%. Yet many people remain undiagnosed and unaware that their symptoms indicate a medically recognized disorder.

Facts About IBS: Irritable bowel syndrome (IBS) is a disorder characterized by abdominal pain or discomfort, and altered bowel habit (chronic or recurrent diarrhea, constipation, or both – either mixed or in alternation).

- IBS affects between 25 and 45 million people in the United States (10 to 15% of the population). IBS affects people of all ages, even children.
- Worldwide it's estimated that between 1 in 10 and nearly 1 in 4 people (9% to 23% of populations) has IBS.
- Most persons with IBS are under the age of 50. But many older adults suffer as well.
- The exact cause of IBS is not known. Symptoms may result from a disturbance in the way the gut, brain, and nervous system interact. This can cause changes in normal bowel movement and sensation.
- Stress does not cause IBS. However, because of the connection between the brain and the gut, stress can worsen or trigger symptoms.
- The impact of IBS can range from mild inconvenience to severe debilitation. It can control many aspects of a person's emotional, social and professional life. Persons with moderate to severe IBS must struggle with symptoms that often impair their physical, emotional, economic, educational and social well-being.
- IBS is unpredictable. Symptoms vary and are sometimes contradictory. Diarrhea can alternate with constipation. Long-term symptoms can disrupt personal and professional activities, and limit individual potential.
- Treatments are available for IBS to help manage symptoms. Not all treatments work for all people. Through research, better treatments may be found.
- Although IBS is common in the general population, few seek medical care for their symptoms.
- Approximately 20 to 40% of all visits to gastroenterologists are due to IBS symptoms.
- For those with IBS an additional burden comes from living in a society where the word "bowel" may scarcely be spoken. Individuals must cope with multiple symptoms that affect every aspect of their lives. Those around them may be unaware of the impact, or even the existence, of the disorder.
- IBS can only be diagnosed by a medical professional.
