# Celebrating 1866 - 2016

On July 5<sup>th</sup> 1866, a group of German immigrants set a cornerstone for their new church on property in East Port Chester, CT donated by Philip Rollhous and William Abendroth. This was after a year of meeting in Port Chester at the Presbyterian Church on



Main Street. Now they were build-

ing their own house of worship and forming a congregation then called "St. Paul's German Evangelical Lutheran Church."

Next month that congregation will mark it's 150th Anniversary with a worship service and luncheon.

The young congregation grew rapidly and by the 1960s was ready for a new, modern building. After an interim which meant converting a residence into a chapel (now a residence again on Castle View Ct.) and also renting the old Mason's Hall on Irving Avenue in Port Chester, a new building was ready on March 20<sup>th</sup> 1966. For the last 50 years St. Paul's has worshipped on King Street in what would become Rye Brook.

While the congregation began as German, there were always other nationalities, especially Finish, Danish and Swedish. Today the worship is in English although there are still a number of German emigres. The congregation continues to have an immigrant flavor but now it is an international recipe with first or second generation immigrants from China, Kenya, Sweden, Taiwan, Russia, Peru, four different Caribbean Islands, Mexico, Botswana, South Africa, Ghana, Finland, Germany, Brazil and England.

In the 1960s, St. Paul's marked their 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary by breaking new ground. They purchased seven acres from the estate of the granddaughter of the industrialist William Ward who had built a castle on the New York side of the NY/CT border (check it out on Magnolia Drive).

Breaking ground is something we do all the time; one of our members was the first Lutheran woman ordained in Metropolitan New York. In 2003 we called a woman Pastor. For the members of St. Paul's breaking ground means pioneering a mission to reach out to groups that were once excluded. This is in keeping with the mission of the apostle for whom we are named who once wrote, "there is no longer slave or free, Jew nor Greek, male or female, all are one in Christ." (Galatians 3)

Breaking ground is something we do all the time.

In the 1960's our longest serving Pastor, Luther Freimuth, ad-

vocated for better housing for the poor and joined in public demonstrations for civil rights with the NAACP. The journey for an ever greater circle of inclusion continues; in 2009 our national church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, voted to allow gays and lesbians in committed relationships to serve as Pastors.

As old as we may be we are "always being made new." (2 Corinthians 5)



### **Pride Month**

As clergy of Jewish and Christian houses of worship in Rye Brook and Port Chester, we join our voices to affirm both the divine image of the human being and the call to love all neighbors. As LGBTQ Pride Month draws near, let us be mindful that God cares for gay and lesbian people no less than anyone else and we reject any use of our religions to tarnish their humanity and dignity. We speak from our traditions and from our faith practices to call for an effort to teach our children respect for differences. As a community, it is incumbent upon us to speak out against bullying and harassment and to remember that indeed, each of us is created in God's image.



When Bishop Eaton visits next month it will be a special honor to have our national Bishop visit us for our Anniversary. It is not the first time we have been visited by our national leader. Dick Case recently gave a talk about Franklin C. Fry. On Easter Sunday 1963 worship was led by Franklin Clark Fry who had been national Bishop from 1944. The previous year, Rev. Fry led a merger of four Lutheran denominations in creating the Lutheran Church in America, becoming its first President. (The title "Bishop" would replace "President" in 1980.) After 25 years this national church would again merge with two other Lutheran denominations. Fry also served as President of the Lutheran World Federation. Dick Case was baptized by Franklin Fry as he was his pastor in Akron, Ohio.
