Pastor's Corner

Autumn Greetings everyone!,

My article for this month is really three different topics, so it is divided into two sections...

Pastoral Changes

Over the summer, I spent time writing about changes here at St. Paul's. This month, we return to this topic. This time, its Pastoral Changes. To get this out there first:

NEITHER PASTOR GERRY NOR I ARE LEAVING! What is changing is the amount of time Pastor Gerry will be with us each week.

To ease into retirement, Pastor Gerry is decreasing his time with us from three days a week and one Sunday a month (plus the Thursday night service) to being with us one day a week and continuing his schedule of preaching here once a month. He will continue to focus on visitation, so what this means is the visits will be concentrated to his one day per week. The one day he will generally be here is Friday. That is my Sabbath day, which means he will be "on call" for emergencies on Friday as well as doing scheduled visits.

Pastor Gerry will continue to be the Pastor of the Community of St. Dysmas. Being here one Sunday a month allows him to continue travel around the Synod sharing that work with other congregations on the weeks when he is not with us at St. Paul's.

Pastor Gerry will also generally be the person to fill in on weekends when I am away from the congregation for vacation or events as well as being on call during those times.

His work here is greatly appreciated and he has made many connections to the members of our congregation. While he will be decreasing his time as a way to prepare for full retirement, I am glad he is continuing to serve here with us!

Reformation 500

As you have heard, this October 31 marks the 500th Anniversary of the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. Each year we have a festive worship service to commemorate this event. This year, since it's the 500th anniversary, our celebration will be even more festive! Join us on October 29th for this very special worship service! We will have one service that day, at 10:00AM!

LEAD Assessment

September 24 through October 8 we will be participating in the LEAD Assessment. The Assessment is 20 questions and computers will be set up on Sunday mornings (and Thursday evenings) for you to participate while you are at church. If you prefer, there will be inserts with instructions to complete the assessment at home as well as hard copies at church which can be filled out and returned to the office.

This assessment gives us information about the congregation which will help us as we go through this LEAD process together! Please take time to participate either following a worship service or at home!

LIVING GENEROUSLY

Ken Keefer just walked into my office wearing his Thrivent "Living Generously" T-Shirt" (which he likely got for free). He and his shirt got me thinking about stewardship, living generously and benevolence.

Christian stewardship cannot be taught as most things are taught. It can be caught by spiritually. It can be encouraged by example. It can be passed on by mentors. It can be only learned by experience.

Ralph Waldo Emerson truthfully remarked; "What you are speaks so loudly that I cannot hear what you say." What the church practices when it comes to giving... speaks loudly to its members, to its community and the world.

I wish we would use the term giving more. It seems to me that "stewardship" is a concept that we emphasize only once a year, while "giving" is an action that happens year around. The church needs fewer concepts and more actions. The persons who best understand stewardship are the good givers (by "good" I mean proportionally not necessarily the amount). Just because a person preaches (or writes) about stewardship, does not mean they necessarily understand stewardship.

Giving money away to missions and benevolences present the church with its finest opportunity to teach stewardship by example, or to practice what it preaches!

Believe it or not there are churches that give away as much as they spend on their own budgets. Those churches are teachers of stewardship!

The Rev. George Regas, retired Episcopal priest said; 'The world is judging the church not on what we spend on ourselves but on what we give away." That might be a good way to measure ourselves!

In "living generously". The church should not be afraid to fail. After all Christianity was not founded by being prudent, cautious or playing it safe!

Women's Daily Grace September 21st "Persistent Woman" (Women of the ELCA)

When God created women, God put something in us that was exhibiting itself within that parable of the widow and the unjust judge—persistence. More of the Banners of St. Paul's

As promised last month I am presenting more information on the Banner's at St. Paul's. By now I hope all of those who do computers have had a chance to browse: http://www.stpaulslutheran.info/photo.php?pageID=33&itemID=12

I have been working with Sandy August, Betty Kerwin and June Picket to fill in more of the blanks about the banners. Last month I reported that the banner Jehovah Nissi was made by Cathy Dymek. Cathy has corrected me and let me know it was actually made by Margaret Keeler.

The booklet is nearing completion and will soon be available. Until then I would like to show you some more of the 60 banners in our collection and perhaps give you a bit of history on Church banners in general.

Church Banner History -

Church banners have a history rooted in scripture itself. Consider Isaiah 11:10 "In that day the Root of Jesse will stand as a banner for the peoples; the nations will rally to him, and his resting place will be glorious." (New International Version) Banners often served as a rallying point in the Old Testament for the nation of Israel. In Jeremiah 4:6 soldiers were prompted to "...raise a banner (signal) to go to Zion. (NIV) Ancient church banners served as a visible reminder of who you were and your allegiance.

Taken from the French word "banniere" and late Latin bandum, banners are defined as a cloth out of which a flag is made. This piece of cloth often bore a symbol or message for its bearers.

Today our banners which are truly a gift of time, talent and treasure to the church promote church functions and events. They also serve to inspire us and remind us of the scriptures that reassure us that Jesus has already won a victory for us and secured our salvation. A visual reminder and re-enforcement of the message of the day or church season.

Each banner has a message and a story. In the booklet I am preparing I have done my best to present them and do justice to the work that went into each one. I hope that you will take the time to give it a look when the booklet comes out and perhaps also be inspired by them and take more notice of them when in the sanctuary.

My thanks to all those who have contributed in any way. I don't want to leave anyone or any gift out. I hope that if anyone has a related story or can fill in blanks about any of them that you will get in touch with me.

The LEAD Assessment has been tested for the past two years by congregations across the United States. It is helping congregations think carefully about next steps as they navigate all the changes in our world, in our neighborhoods, and our congregations.

Three reasons why our congregation should take the LEAD Assessment:

There is a direct benefit for our congregation's future. We get a written report from the LEAD Team that will help us make our own strategic decisions for the next few years. The more people who participate, the better the report.

Meeting Minutes Synopsis 9/5/17:

Opening Prayer-Bible Study by Pastor Carolyn

LEAD (Living Everyday as Disciples) had their first meeting August 28, 2017. The LEAD Assessment Survey will be available for congregation to complete online or manually, three consecutive Sundays, September 24th, October 1st and October 8th. The next LEAD Team meeting will be on Monday, September 25th.

August activities were discussed. VBS, Peach Festival and the Corn Roast were all well attended and went very well.

Pastor Carolyn and Erik Domaas to set up interviews for a new church secretary. Pastor Gerry's October 1st schedule was reviewed, since he will be semi-retired. He will be in the office on Fridays, (1) sermon per month and take care of the Baltimore North hospital visits.

FPU, Financial Peace University, coordinated by Ken Keefer, has several people signed up and will begin on September 13th.

Cemetery Fund-Erik Domaas announced the Men's Brotherhood will contribute \$5,000 towards the cemetery fund. There will be a "Chili Cook-Off" on Sunday, September 24th after the 11:00 service, where a "free will" offering will be collected, to "kick off" the cemetery funds campaign.

"THE VISION CONTINUES"-Pastor Carolyn, Erik Domaas and Bob Peters had a meeting to discuss the capital campaign funding to include cemetery expansion with a focus on 3 years-\$300,000.00.

A congregation meeting was scheduled on Sunday, October 1st at 9:45 in the parish hall to discuss "THE VISION CONTINUES" capital campaign and cemetery funding.

Ken Keefer made a motion to transfer \$7,000.00 from the Management Reserve Fund to the cemetery expansion, second by Russ Werner. Unanimous approval.

Congregation Meeting to discuss 2018 Budget is scheduled for November 12, 2017 at 9:45 in the parish hall. Committee budgets are to be turned in at the October council meeting.

Ken Keefer announced that a generous donor, will pay \$7,800 towards the maintenance of the stain glass window frames, as needed. Bob Peters made a motion to approve, seconded by Kerry Griffin. Unanimous approval.

Installation of new council members to take place at the October 1st Sunday services.

Pastor Carolyn to have a "REFORMATION" Book Sale in October to honor the 500 year celebration.


