DID YOU KNOW...

...if you have donated bottles of water, diapers or any other material to storm survivors in Texas or Florida, your donation will likely pass through the Seventh-Day Adventist!

After the initial cleanup – the Methodist have work crews helping pulling mud out of houses – the church sends trained volunteers into the wreckage to help families navigate federal and state aid programs and private insurance.

...that Colin Kaepernick who took a knee during the national anthem to protest injustice against African Americans was confirmed a Lutheran!

...that The Convoy of Hope, a nondenominational Christian organization based in Springfield, Missouri, specializes in feeding. Before Hurricane Irma made landfall in Florida in early September, Convoy had three trailer trucks stocked with food, water, and sanitary supplies parked in the State, waiting to be deployed to areas hardest hit.

...that Prince of Peace Lutheran Church in Rosedale, Maryland (my former Church) partnered with the local elementary school to support a Houston Elementary school with 719 students whose belongings were destroyed by Hurricane Harvey!

...FEMA administrator Brock Long has asked concerned citizens to make donations through nvoad.org – the site for National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster, the alliance of voluntary organizations that are helping FEMA channel disaster assistance into affected areas. About three quarters of the organizations that are part of the alliance are faith based!

...that Samaritan's Purse, an evangelical aid group run by Franklin Graham, had trucks at the ready in Florida with debris removal experts. The group has responded to 20 disasters already this year.

Women's Daily Grace Jesus' Loving Example Oct. 29th (Women of the ELCA)

During the Reformation, some wanted to put distance between Protestants and Catholics, and they saw the elimination of the crucifix image as one way to separate the faiths. This is what happened later in the United States where Lutherans were influenced by Calvinists to abandon the image of the cross bearing the body of Christ. In European Lutheran churches, crucifixes remain common.

I have chosen not to focus on the end of Jesus' life and ministry, nor on his profound suffering. This is significant and must be remembered, but it is not the primary focus of who Jesus is. I focus on Jesus' loving example—how he refused to stone the unfaithful woman, how he honored the offerings of the poor widow, how he showed love and grace to the woman, outcast and bleeding for over a decade, who only wanted to get close enough to touch his dusty hem.

Today is Reformation Sunday and the 21st Sunday after Pentecost. This message is an excerpt of "Jesus the Shepherd" by Karen Craigo in the May 2017 issue of Gather magazine.

Giving Thanks to God

With Thanksgiving approaching, I wanted to also take the opportunity to give thanks to God. I am thankful for the fellowship I have here at St. Paul's. The good friends I have here and those of you who have taken the time to donate to Archive and share a story or two.

I am also thankful for what my sister calls "God Winks". What is a God Wink you ask? Well I will give you some examples. This past October 21st, My Mom's birthday, the monarch butterflies started hatching at my house. It is a small miracle that what seems lifeless (the chrysalis) can become the beautiful butterfly. We had given up all hope of our efforts to encourage the monarch butterflies by planting the butterfly bush and allowing the milkweed to grow and then butterflies appeared even though it was much later than normal!

If your open to them, "God Winks" appear when you need them the most. Another example is during cleaning up the Archive in preparation for the Sr. Fellowship Luncheon, myself, my Mom and Dad were all occupied when without warning we were startled by a loud thump. The 1958 Mission Band Bible had fallen on the floor. It is a rather large, heavy, thick book and it was laying flat. The grass is up. The road into the new cemetery is paved. Where the posts go are marked. Just waiting for the posts to be put in so the expansion will match the original cemetery.












