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Bits & Pieces

Dear Friends,

The old saw has it that March comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb. Having lived in Carson City for nearly 30 years now I've found that is not necessarily true. What that saying attempts to describe, however, is probably generally accurate; at the beginning of the month we still experience a fair amount of winter while at the end we are (hopefully) beginning to move into the softer, refreshing gifts of spring. However the Resurrection became associated with this season of the year, most people, I believe, would find that the feast emulates the season. I mean that those acquainted with the entire Passion narrative would be able to identify the first part of the Passion, that is the betrayal, trial and crucifixion of Jesus with the deadliness of winter. We would also recognize in the Resurrection, Easter Day, the gift and promise of new life. Unfortunately, many people find the entire narrative too distressing and choose to focus on the latter part, Easter, alone.

In the olden days (listen to me!) the church had an entire week to work with the whole story. We would come into the service on Palm Sunday anticipating a triumphal entry into Jerusalem, illusory as it might have been. I say illusory because while Jesus had a pretty good sense of what would transpire at a later time, the disciples themselves seemed to cling to their dreams of power and influence with all their might. For me, after Palm Sunday there was a sense of either anticipation or foreboding, take your pick, about the coming week, Holy Week. I knew, as I'm pretty sure most of you knew, that we would be back at the sanctuary on Thursday to hear about the betrayal and arrest of Jesus. Jesus had warned the disciples many times what was likely to happen to him in Jerusalem but like most of us they heard only what they wanted to hear. Finally when it all got to be too much to bear they fled. Then on Good Friday they and we would face the condemnation and crucifixion. Frightened and demoralized after the crucifixion they hid in the upper room and missed the resurrection.

We need to take time to take in that narration. Considering what proportion of each Gospel the

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

Passion story comprises, that length of time is little enough indeed. But truly, that time between Good Friday and Sunday lasted an eternity, as we awaited the proclamation of the Easter Resurrection.

In some ways, not much has changed. In other ways, a great deal has changed. We are no more eager to encounter deprivation and condemnation than the disciples. We too would prefer not to have to contend with the loss of our dreams. Today, many people believe they have found a way to do that. They simply bypass the events of Holy Week by attending Palm Sunday and then returning only when they can count on good news, Easter Sunday. The broader church has attempted to address that by identifying in a new way the Sunday before Easter. What was once Palm Sunday is now the Sunday of the Passion. Instead of depending upon Christians coming to Maundy Thursday and Good Friday to hear again the account of their salvation, the broader church has conflated the events. The events of Palm Sunday and the rest of Holy Week are now a single narrative provided on the Sunday before Easter. Of course, we here at St. Paul's continue to offer the opportunity to engage in the entire Passion event, its confrontation with fear and death.

I know that by the end of January or the middle of February I've had enough of winter. I've been cold long enough, I've felt the bitter north wind out of Alaska bite through my jacket frequently enough, I've seen enough of the ice in the shadows of trees and bushes and buildings so that I ache for spring. I've seen enough of death. I've had enough of darkness. All I want is warmth and life. But, another part of me wonders, is that the answer? Is Easter, like spring, just about waiting? Is it only about finding comfort? And then I remember; the risen Jesus found the frightened, discouraged disciples in their darkness and despair. He found them. In him they lost their fear and their darkness and their despair. And in him, only in him, they were given life.

Food For The Poor

“Food for the Poor’s mission began with feeding the hungry, and remains at the heart of what we do. Faithful donors like you helped send the first bags of rice to Jamaica in 1982 to feed the hungry. You are still with us now, helping us to feed millions of hungry people across the countries we serve. From the smallest child crying from hunger, to a starving elderly woman thinking she is alone, you bring them lifesaving food, and the knowledge that someone does care.

From helping mothers in the remote areas in Haiti, to feeding schoolchildren in Guyana, you were there delivering food to where it was most needed in 2011. Because of you, the hungry are fed, and hope flourishes amongst the poorest of the poor.

With your ongoing generosity, thousands of families continue to be fed through outreach programs, school facilities and nutritional clinics in the Caribbean and Latin America. Thank you for saving and sustaining precious lives by supplying food to the poor. The impact of your love and compassion cannot be measured. May God bless you.

Feeding Facts & Figures

In 2011, Food for The Poor distributed more than 42.9 million pounds of food, enough to feed millions of malnourished children and their families This included more than:

- 24.9 million pounds of rice
- 7.7 million pounds of beans
- 10.3 million pounds of grains, canned foods and other assorted foods.”

The above information came from an annual report I received from Food for the Poor. I believe in our own small way we at St. Paul’s Lutheran Family are helping to make this happen. Our support is providing a meal for a hungry person, child or adult, who would very likely have to go without.

Thanks to our support and that of other church families like ours, Food for the Poor is able to provide a meal consisting of a portion of rice, beans, a piece of fish and a glass of milk for six cents a day. They are able to do this because they operate with only a 3.75% overhead.

If you feel God is asking you to help with this ministry, I would make a suggestion of a dollar a week donation. This amount will provide two meals a day for a hungry person somewhere in the world. There is a basket in the narthex which contains envelopes for your donation. You may either mail it directly to Food for the Poor or place the envelope in the offering plate. Whether you give the recommended dollar, more or less, it will be a blessing to a hungry person.

There are three opportunities to get together over food and worship on the Wednesdays of March 6, 13 and 20. These soup suppers, combined with the Holden Evening Prayer, provide an oasis in the middle of our work week. Come and join us in a true pot-luck. You are invited to bring a soup, a salad, a bread or a dessert; your choice. Beverages are provided. Invite a friend along and after supper there is yet another feast as we celebrate communion during our evening worship. See you there.
