Someone once said that hospitality saved us. Sounds a little strange. And it's a little bit of an overstatement, but there are some things to learn by taking a hospitality approach to some salvation oriented texts. It might just spur us on to more of a community-hospitality-salvation mindset ourselves. They are not such strange bed-fellows as they might at first glance appear.

We were once strangers to God, but are now welcome (Eph. 2:12); enemies, but now friends (Rom. 5:10). The Lord Supper's reminds us that we are traitors not just forgiven of treason, but brought in for supper.

In Luke 7, when Jesus chides Simon the Pharisee for not lowering himself enough to wash his feet as a hospitable courtesy, we get a foretaste of the hospitality of Jesus. He not only wrapped a towel around his waist and carried a basin for his followers, but he also eventually put a crown of thorns on his head and carried a cross so that curtains could be ripped and veils torn, bringing us into God's presence "with confidence" (Heb. 4:16).

Jesus' told His followers to "Love one another, even as I have loved you." And the letter to the Ephesians restates Old Testament truths of alienation between Jews and Gentiles: "Remember that you were at one time separated from Christ, alienated from the commonwealth of Israel and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in this world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near" (Ephesians 2:11-13). Later on, he focuses the teaching further: "Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you. Therefore, be imitators of God, as beloved children. And walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God" (Ephesians 4:32-5:2).

This is the function of the church early on in Acts. In Acts 2:42-46, Christians were eating together with happy hearts, being hospitable to each other as their Father was to each individually. Take careful note of what kind of results this fellowship produced. We can be sure they loved each other more and enjoyed each other's company greatly but notice also, "the Lord added to their numbers daily those who were being saved" (Acts 2:47).

It appears as if Christians opened their homes to unbelievers - food, fun, and conversation. Deep discussion followed sharing their food and homes. This appears to be Paul's recollection of his time with

the Thessalonians as he writes, "So, being affectionately desirous of you, we were ready to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves" (1 Thessalonians 2:8).

Some TACC action items:

1. Let us open our homes in hospitable ways to our friends at TACC. There is no better way to develop deep and lasting friendships than in our homes together sharing God's goodnesses to us. Spiritual gifts are best used in the context of personal relationships. Seek to build up, minister to, and encourage.
2. Purposefully allow the discussion to center on Christ, His church, and our mission to the world and Orange.
3. Open our homes to our co-workers, neighbors, and

friends. There is no better apologetic for our faith than a Christian home centered on Christ.

4. Practice hospitality, not entertainment. Entertaining seeks to impress or entertain. Hospitality opens the heart and home as they are, with warts and faded fabric, so that Christ is exalted and society's "norms" are not the focus.
5. It's much easier to spend Sunday afternoon at a restaurant with well-known and mostly safer friends. Make a habit of opening your home to lesser-known, maybe less safer acquaintances who just may need a friend in time of need.
6. Be a good listener. Do not so much seek to have others understand you, but seek to understand each other, and make efforts so that they know you know, so that they are convinced you understand.
7. As you part, pray together. Nothing fancy or pastoral, but as one friend to another.

There is a certain kind of so-called conversion which separates a man from his fellow men. It may fill him with a self-righteousness which rejoices in its own superiority to those who have had no like experience. It may move a man to a Pharisaic self-isolation. The plain truth is that such a one should very seriously examine himself, if he finds what he regards as his Christian experience separating him from his fellow-men, or his fellow-Christians.
