Pastoral Note

What's So Special About TPC of BG?

The other day, someone asked me to describe what was special about our church.

My immediate response was to say that our church takes a thoughtful approach to our study of the Christian faith, and that we are willing to struggle with our faith-questions, and even our doubts, without fear. Honestly, we haven't "cornered the market" on thoughtfulness, but we are inheritors of a tradition that honors careful and serious theological reflection.

(Bring Your Own Brain)

John Calvin, the pastor and social reformer of Geneva in the mid-seventeenth century, wrote an influential theology called <u>Institutes of the Christian Religion</u>. The admirable theological rigor and wisdom of Calvin's work gave rise to a particular branch within the Protestant church known as the

"Reformed" branch. The Presbyterian Church is a good keeper of the Reformed and "Calvinist" flame. The hallmarks are serious Bible study, reflection that welcomes the contributions of other disciplines (philosophy and science, for instance), a healthy understanding of the depth of human sin, and a deep reverence for our sovereign God. The title of one of our recent College Ministry studies, describes our church well. You may remember that title: Bring Your Own Brain!

Children's club attendees were: Cheyenne Gore, Callie & Carson Shoemaker. Adult Leaders were: David Muffett, Kelly Goad, Terry & Dacia Shoemaker. Everyone had a great week and the Shoemakers very much enjoyed their first trip to Montreat. The Montreat Sunday Worship Service was August 1. We've received many complements on the service. We have booked a new house for next year that is much nicer and will accommodate more people.

City Sights/City Lights 2010 was held at Murray State University July 6-8. This was a mission experience for 6-8th graders. Todd & Evan Kessler, Ben Guthrie, and David Muffett attended. The Reverend David Montgomery (1st Pres Murray) did a great job planning and carrying out the event. There were a total of 28 people in attendance from churches around the Presbytery. We did trash pick up at a LBL campground, helped at the Calloway County Animal Shelter, and bagged 221 bags of groceries in 1.5 hours at a local food bank. We were given a tour of the MSU campus and had some rec. time at the pool/rec-center, watched the movie "Pay it Forward", and met with MSU President Randy Dunn.

We took 17 people to Kings Island on July 28 and several youth helped with VBS (June 13-17).

On August 13 &14 Lydia Suh, Todd Kessler, & David Muffett attended the **WKY Presbytery Youth Council Overnight** at First Presbyterian – Paducah. We played some games and decided on next year's senior high mission trip. We will be going to New Orleans June 11-18, 2011. The trip is booked through Youth Works (the same organization that was used this years). Estimated cost is \$400 per person. We will be doing some fundraising to help offset the cost.

Our Wednesday Mission Workdays in June were very helpful to the community, We helped out around the church, the Salvation Army, & the Humane Society.





From the Director of Music Festival IX: Celebrating Our Scottish Heritage

We can expect to see a kilt or two at the church this month as our Music Ministry presents its ninth annual **Liturgical Arts Festival**. The theme for the Festival is "Celebrating Our Scottish Heritage," and we have a wonderful week of activities scheduled.

The Festival opens with special music during worship on Sunday, September 12th. The Chancel Choir, Rainbow Ringers, and the King's Kids will all present Scottish sacred music during the morning worship services. Our opening concert takes place that afternoon at 3:00pm in the sanctuary. You will want to arrive early to hear Glasgow bagpiper JP Johnson play as the audience gathers. The joint choirs of the Presbyterian churches of Bowling Green, Franklin and Russellville, accompanied by Tom Moody, will then present a program of Scottish sacred music and folksongs. You will be surprised how many of these wonderful songs you already know! The concert will be followed by a reception for all prepared by Circle 9 and celebrating both the opening of the Festival and the new art exhibit "Celebrating Our Church Building." We will also have more music from our piper.

On Monday, September 13 at 1:00pm, Monday Afternoon with the Arts resumes meeting, tipping its hat to the Festival theme with a study of Donizetti's bel canto masterpiece, LUCIA DI LAMMER-MOOR. Based on a novel by Sir Walter Scott, we will begin watching a recent Metropolitan Opera production featuring soprano super-star Anna Netrebko. All are welcome.

On Tuesday evening, September 14 at 7:00pm, we will be delighted to have lecturer Michael Morgan with us to give an overview of the Reformation in Scotland, the transitions in the church, and our Presbyterian worship tradition. A staff member of the Central Presbyterian Church in Atlanta, Morgan will bring a selection of his vast collection of English Bibles and psalters to share with us. A reception by Circle 4 will follow.

Thursday evening, September 16 at 7:00pm will see European historian Bill Hockensmith presenting a program on the history and geography of Scotland, highlighted by slides of his travels there. Hockensmith is highly involved in the Glasgow Highland Games and brings a unique background to his presentation. A reception by Circle 3 and the Sunday Morning Circle will follow.

An elegant evening of dinner and music is planned for Friday, September 17. A lovely dinner catered by Blakey and Duffy Hayes will take place at 6:00pm. Tickets are \$15.00 and reservations can be made at 843-4707. A dinner program of Scottish folksongs will be presented by our College Ensemble and Marilyn Anderson. At 7:00pm, we will move to the sanctuary for a program titled "Inspired by Scotland." Soloists Jennifer Brennan-Hondorp, Paula McMahan, Paul Hondorp, and Andrew Wulff will sing Beethoven's "Twelve Scottish Folksongs," with Randall Olson, violin, and Sarah Berry, cello, accompanying. Catherine Larson, viola, and Alyna Atkinson, violin, will join Olson and Berry for Gustav Holst's "Seven Scottish Airs." The program and the Festival will be brought to a close as our choir sings selections from Lerner & Lowe's BRIGADOON.



WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY OCT 3, 2010

It is one of four special offerings designated by the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)'s General Assembly. The offering was set up in a way to encourage all levels of the PCUSA to work for peace. Each congregation is invited to find ways to promote peace within the congregation and within the community.

For that reason our church will retain 25% of the offering we receive, and we will decide how best to put this money to work. Another 25% will go to our presbytery and the remaining 50% goes to the General Assembly for peacemaking around the world. Bulletin inserts during the next few weeks will offer examples of how these funds have been used over the past year.

Buckhorn Children & Family Services has been caring for suffering children and families for over 100 years; first in educational programs and orphanage care in Kentucky and later, in quality treatment services for abused and neglected youth throughout Kentucky and Ohio. Started in 1902 in the heart of Appalachia by Presbyterian Minister Harvey S. Murdoch, the mission has expanded to other rural and urban areas, reaching out to thousands of troubled children and families.

Buckhorn serves over 200 children and families daily in residential care, foster care, in home family services and transitional living. Youth referred to Buckhorn are victims of severe abuse and neglect. They are products of families who suffer from drug addiction, domestic violence, poverty and the lack of education and parenting skills. Through the care offered by Buckhorn programs, youth find the much needed safety, structure, guidance and sense of belonging that they need to learn trust, respect, responsibility and most of all, hope. Through Buckhorn, damaged youth find a place to heal and a place to call home.
