

Pastor's Column

Once upon a time, 2018 seemed like the future; but now it's here. In April, our congregation will have its 199th birthday, and we will be able to begin our countdown to being 200 years old.

What's the best thing you can say about our church, in 2018?

It's got to be the way our children's contributions are valued. Beginning with infant baptism, it is understood that each child is known and loved by God. Children are involved in worship regularly, where they don't merely perform but have roles that support the worship themes of the day. The Children's Center is the brightest, most colorful place in the church. During the year there are many enrichment programs, art and crafting events, and the like.

It's got to be the music! We are blessed with a talented choir, which likes to try interesting music, and a variety of music. An extraordinary choir director, Wayne Pope, leads them. We often have guitar and mandolin music. During special seasons we have a brass ensemble. On the third Sundays of each month, our Children's Choir sings or chimes. It's a program for all ages and musical tastes!

<u>It's got to be the people!</u> We don't come to church alone. We gather with folks who are wise, and often funny. The people in our congregation are generous, and encouraging of each other. It's pretty hard to get "lost" in our church, because people care for each other.

Reformed and Presbyterian Theology gets it right, mostly. Our branch of the Christian faith has roots! We start with the absolute sovereign freedom of God. God can do anything, and God wills to rescue and deliver us. Our response is thankful service in the world and among the people God loves.

Oh! It's got to be our thorough-going democratic form of government! Because the people of our congregation elect their officers and ministers, everyone's voice/vote counts. Committee structures preserve this idea that no one person is more important than another. God calls us to ministry together. The Spirit of God works through us all for the common good.

The church's staff is excellent. We're fortunate to have people who know their jobs, have been together for several years, and who care about the church. Most of the time, the church runs like a top, thanks to Cheryl, Tom, Richard, Wayne, Leslee, Cedric, Dana, et al.

It is a New Year! Our regular Sunday schedule resumes on January 15. Join us for Coffee Fellowship at 8:30am, Children's choir and chimes meets at 9:00am and then classes for all ages at 9:30am.

Adults have three options: **The Ellis Class** begins a study of Philippians, meeting in Room 201. Books are available in the office for \$8. The Christian Thought Class will be using DVD materials from Great Courses to explore Science and Religion (meets in the Conference Room). Coffee and Conversation gathers in Room 203 and will be reading through the Bible. They will read a set number of chapters each week and then discuss those the following Sunday.

Children age 3-4 will gather in the Preschool room and learn about God's love with Deep Blue Bible study materials. In January they will learn more about Jesus, the Greatest Prophet. Elementary children meet in Room 20 (Godly Play) and will learn more about important Old Testament people and stories. Each Sunday the worship inserts lists the specific scriptures for each class. Parents are encouraged to read these scriptures at home and discuss them with their children between Sundays.

Youth (6th-12th grades) gather in the Youth Suite each Sunday to study the Bible and how it impacts our daily lives.





6th Interfaith Dialogue on Earth Care – Interfaith Workshop on Sustainability & Social Justice is February 16-17th.

The Presbyterian Church Mission Committee is co-sponsoring this event, along with Western Kentucky University and a number of other area faith communities. On **Friday February 16**, beginning at 6:00pm at Jody Richards Hall on the WKU campus, there will be a screening of the film *Dirt*, a 2009 documentary, and a panel discussion following. On **Saturday February 17**, we gather at the Islamic Cultural Center, 2140 Morgantown Road, beginning at 8:00am. A day of workshops, plenary sessions and discussion to follow. Dr. W. Glenn Kirkconnell will be one of the presenters. Registration is open and should be done early. The cost is \$25 which includes all food and materials. Session Report

The Session met for its regular meeting on December 19, 2017 in the Church conference room. These items highlighted the meeting.

Matthew Covington opened the meeting with prayer. The minutes of the last regular meeting were approved on proper motion. Katie Thomison was interviewed as part of the process of becoming an Inquirer for Ordination. She was affirmed by the Session on proper motion. Newly elected Ruling Elders and Deacons were announced. Incoming Ruling Elders are Pam Bratcher, John Kernohan, Mary Evans, Tim Leigh, and David Sears. Incoming Deacons are Ray Elms, Sally Calkins, Shannon Dyche, Linda Leigh, Ken Royse, Melody Harper, and Susan Thomison. Those present were examined as to their personal faith.

Matthew advised and the Session called a Congregational Meeting after worship on January 7 for the purposes of presenting the budget, affirming the call of the Minister, and election of the incoming officers. The meeting will be followed by a called meeting of the Session during which the completion of examination of the incoming officers will occur. Additionally, a second called Congregational Meeting will occur on February 18 following worship. There will be a luncheon and the meeting's purpose will be to have an overview presented concerning the purposes of the Church's ministries and committees. Following, the business agenda was taken up.

Leslie Kirkconnell, Director of Christian Education reported on the upcoming Christmas events. There were several Ministry reports. Personnel reported that the staff was hosted to a Christmas lunch. Worship advised and moved that the downstairs doors be locked during worship and that a greeter or usher remain in the downstairs area during worship for security reasons. The Finance Chair reported the current budget status a good with a probable surplus at year's end and presented a proposed balanced budget for 2018 at a bit under \$650,000. That proposal was adopted.

Business having been completed, the Session meeting was adjourned with prayer.
