PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear Friends,

*By the waters of Babylon – there we sat down and wept
when we remembered Zion.*

*On the willows there we hung up our harps.
For there our captors required of us songs, and our tormentors mirth, saying,
“Sing us one of the songs of Zion!”*

*How shall we sing the Lord's song in a strange land?
If I forget you, O Jerusalem let my right hand wither!
Let my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth if I do not remember you,
If I do not set Jerusalem above my highest joy!*

*Remember, O Lord, against the Edomites the day of Jerusalem,
How they said, “Tear it down! Tear it down to its foundations!
O daughter of Babylon, you devastator!
Happy shall they be who pay you back what you have done to us!
Happy shall they be who take your little ones and dash them against a rock!*

Psalm 137

This is a hard Psalm. Obviously, it is written after Babylon swept into Judah and utterly destroyed Jerusalem and the people were carried into captivity. It is a lament for what once was. Their captors were making fun of them, saying sarcastically, “*Sing us one of the songs of Zion!*” Those carried into exile remembered their home land. They remembered the way things used to be. Now, their memories may not be that accurate because things are always larger and grander in our memories than what they really are, but perception is reality. Whether they were accurate or not, they remembered an alternative to their reality. They remembered something better. They were sad and felt abandoned, so they cried out. They expressed their anger and frustration saying things that they normally wouldn't, like “*I'll be glad, God, when someone takes their children and smashes their heads against the rocks!*” It's shocking language. It's ugly and cruel, but it is honest. It is an honest expression of how they felt. The Psalms are prayers, and our prayers should be nothing if not honest. While it may not be ok to express that anger and frustration to people, we've been given permission to say them to God. God hears our prayers, those prayers we are afraid to say out loud, those prayers that express our deep anger and frustration. It is safe to offer those

prayers to God where it might not be safe to express them to other people. God is able to absorb them and transform them.

Some Old Testament scholars say that Psalm 137:4, *“How can I sing the Lord’s song in a strange land?”* is at the center of the Old Testament, that the Old Testament is written or edited in response to that question. What they are saying is that the Old Testament is edited in light of the exile, that everything in the Old Testament reflects the exilic experience.

Initially the people of Israel couldn’t believe that God had not saved them from the Babylonians. What they learned was that God had not abandoned them, but that God went with them into exile. They had lived with the fear that they couldn’t worship God outside of Israel because God was the God of Israel, and if you’re not in Israel, then they couldn’t worship God. What they discovered is that God wasn’t just the God of Israel, but that God was God of all, even the Babylonians. They learned that God did not operate in the way they anticipated. Instead God used Babylon.

This Psalm still speaks to us because at some point in our lives we all have some kind of exilic experience, a time when we are carried away into a strange land. It could be a physical place or it could be a mental or emotional exile. It happens whenever we find ourselves in a strange and unpleasant experience, dealing with a deadly disease, dealing with loss, a death of a loved one, a divorce, the loss of a job, something that turns our lives upside down and inside out.

It happens to all of us, so we need to equip ourselves. Here are some of the important elements that allowed Israel to survive. First, they discovered that God went with them. As God went with them, so God goes with us wherever we go. Secondly, they remembered. They remembered the way things had been and they shared those stories, those traditions, those memories with their children. We, too, have memories and when we’re carried away we need to remember. We need to remember who we are and whose we are. We need to tell our stories and pass them down. Lastly, those carried into exile prayed. They prayed, hard, honest prayers that expressed how they really felt. In doing so, they appealed to the one who can and does make a difference. And they survived. That’s the good news. Our faith is not an insurance policy that will somehow keep bad things from happening to us. Instead it is a First Aid kit that allows us to survive.

SESSION REPORT

The Session held its regular monthly meeting on January 10, 2017. This is a summary of the reports received and actions taken at that meeting.

The Session welcomed the new Class of 2020: Katie Banks, Charlie Boyd, Steve Messer, AJ Strauch, and Mark Tibbles. It also recognized the elders who rotated off the Session and thanked them for their service: David Ahnquist, Judith Jia, Liz Orndorff, and Darren Peckler.

COMMITTEE REPORTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Budget and Finance (Tom Quilligan): The year-end report from Ruth and Shearer showed that 2016 expenditures exceeded revenue (including the \$15,000 carryover from 2015 and \$50,000 transfer from the Session's Contingency Fund) by \$4,771. Based on current revenue projections, the committee recommended that we increase the draw from our income account managed by WealthSouth. After a discussion of the recommendation, **the Session approved increasing our draw from 4% to 8% in 2017.**

Christian Formation (Bill Garriott, Laurie Pierce, and Judith Jia): The Explorers Class has begun a series on gun violence. In February, Hannah McIntyre will lead a class with the working title of "Presbyterian 101." Rev. McIntyre will be meeting with representatives from First Christian Church to discuss the possibility of including their young people in our youth activities.

Report from the Board of Deacons (Mary Beth Garriott): On January 22nd, Jan Heckler, mission co-worker in Madagascar, will be our guest and will lead both worship services. The 2016 Joy Offering was \$2,450. The results of the Christmas Gift Market are not yet available.

OLD BUSINESS

New Beginnings: Jim Stewart reported that our contract assessor will visit on January 23rd. The visit will include a meeting with members of the congregation, and he urged all Session members to attend this meeting.

NEW BUSINESS

Soups On Us: The SOU team requested that half of the money received in the Cents-Ability offering be retained for use by this local program. At the present time, all of this offering is sent to the Transylvania Presbytery. Some is used for Hunger Grants to churches within the presbytery, and some is sent to the Presbyterian Hunger Program. SOU currently is funded by gifts from the congregation and \$9000 from Local Mission. The cost of the program has risen to about \$1200 a month. After a discussion of the proposal, **the Session approved a motion to use 50% of future Cents-Ability offerings to help fund Soups On Us.**

NEW BEGINNINGS LEADERSHIP RETREAT

The presbytery, under the leadership of Philip Lotspeich, is encouraging churches to engage in a self-examining process to help them determine their ministry. The process was developed by the Disciples of Christ church. It involves collecting data about the church, its membership, building use, having a trained assessor come in to look at the church facility, the community, and to interview the church staff and leadership. Then leaders of the church will be trained to conduct neighborhood meetings in which the members of the church will be invited to someone's home to talk about our ministry. The Session discussed participating in this visioning process last November and voted to participate.

The first stage of the process was conducted this past Monday, when the assessor came and met with the staff and leadership. The next step will be a leadership retreat, February 24 and 25, which will be held with the other churches in the presbytery that are participating in the process. During the retreat leaders will be trained to conduct the house meetings. The goal is to have the house meetings this spring, after which the results will be collected and distilled so that by fall we hope to have some goals established. We look forward to this process and hope that you will all help by participating when asked.

Naming Ceremony for Dalit Christians in India

THE LEADERS of the Exodus Presbyterian Church ushered in the new year with a naming ceremony of the youngest child of education director Rajesh Joseph Dharmi and his wife, Reena. The name Raksha means *Protection*. Elisheba (Elizabeth) means *God is her Oath*. Dharmi means *Faith*.

THE NAMING CEREMONY helps Christians coming from untouchable roots to find exodus from thousands of years of oppression. Naming practices, designed to humiliate and dehumanize people, silently continue to perpetuate isolation and oppression today. Is the one name Machchhar (meaning mosquito) humiliating? What kind of job can you get with a name like that?

EARLY IN THE MINISTRY, Rev. Philip Prasad clearly understood the naming quagmire and took action by creating a way for Christians to formally adopt three respectable and meaningful names. The Naming Ceremony includes a history lesson along with the promise of a new life in Christ encouraged through prayer. The family joyfully embraces this meaningful Christian discipline as they start all of us praying for a new year in the ministry that is reaching deep into the culture of the *Dalit* people of India.

- **Pray thanksgiving** that people who have suffered so much are able to come out of the shadows, radiant and unashamed of who they are. Jesus Christ has reached them and changed their names, their lives, and their futures.
- **Pray for the Year 2017.** As the leaders gain more footing in their awesome opportunity to reach out to others, pray for their safety, energy, and health. They are excited about this year. Let our prayers lift them up to the Lord who will provide.
- **Pray for the children in the second half of their school year.** It is the time for the children in school to complete their courses and prepare for examinations. For the first time in my experience, I am seeing spoken English become a fun and exciting process. Education Director Rajesh Dharmi is to be praised for his enthusiasm guiding the children to practice and use English joyfully. The Sentence of the Day and the Conversation of the Week have taken on their own life. The importance of this is that there are much better vocational opportunities when one can understand, speak and write in English.

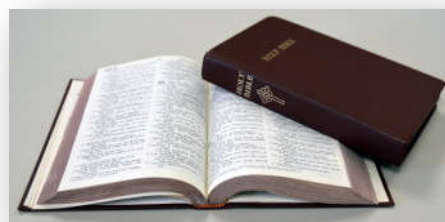
