When Jesus talked about the church in the Sermon on the Mount he painted a picture of a pretty compelling organization. He said: "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden" (Matt 5.14). In the ancient world, when cities were often under threat by invaders, it was common to build a city on a hill because a city on a hill could be easily defended. In times of trouble, those villages that surrounded the city would gather their family, pack their valuables, and go to the city on a hill because they knew it was a place of refuge.

Not only was the city on a hill a place of refuge in times of trouble, but it was a place of prosperity and blessing in times of plenty. The spiritual, social and cultural benefits of the city would overflow out into the local countryside and bless the surrounding villages. That is why Jesus says to the church, the prosperous city on a hill to "let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven" (Matt 5.16).

Over the past six months the clergy, staff and a team of lay people have gathered to ask hard questions about Trinity Church and do a little bit of day dreaming. What many of us kept coming back to was this picture of a City on a Hill. We began to ask, what would it look like for the church to be a refuge in times of trouble for the people of Myrtle Beach? What would it look like for us to be a resource, giving the spiritual, social, and cultural benefits of the Gospel to the City of Myrtle Beach?

Trinity Church: A Place of Gospel Refuge

Trinity preaches a Gospel of grace that we believe creates a refuge for people in need of God's grace. But, as you know preaching isn't enough. We recently commissioned a report that did an analysis of the people in Myrtle Beach. Aside from very useful demographic information, we also gained invaluable spiritual insight into the people of Myrtle Beach. We learned through this report, that in spite of all the opportunities for play and pleasure in this city, the people that live here are some of the loneliest in the country. This report compiled a list of the top "felt needs" of the people of Myrtle Beach. By "felt needs," the report indicated those things that people would say they needed if asked. The number one felt need in Myrtle Beach was community. That is why over the next five years, we aim to place 70% of the existing congregation into small groups so that they can work out their faith in a close, supportive and encouraging community under the banner of the Gospel. More than that, we aim to respond to the other felt needs of our community such as divorce recovery, financial wellness, aging parent care, and marriage and parenting workshops. We will begin offering "felt needs" workshops as soon as this fall.

Trinity Church: A Place of Gospel Resources

As I've already said, the spiritual, social, and cultural benefits of the city must overflow into the countryside. We must "let our light shine before others, so that they may see our good works and give glory to our Father who is in heaven." This will take place in two different ways, one missional and one charitable.

Missional Resources:

In the year 1900 in the United States there was one viable church for every 430 people. Now, in Horry County, there is one viable church for every 2,000 people. To use an illustration, when Mary and Joseph arrived in Bethlehem there was no room at the inn. Not because the people in Bethlehem were stingy, but because the little town simply could not meet the demand of the hundreds if not thousands of travelers passing through the tiny village. The church in North America, like Bethlehem, is too small to meet the needs of the population. So we need more churches. That's why we're committed to planting a church in Carolina Forest. That's why we've recently initiated a partnership with thirty area churches to plan for church plants in Horry County. We want to make room at the inn for people who need a City on a Hill. Within the next five years we aim to have planted a viable, thriving church in Carolina Forest to do our part towards creating space for hungry, spiritual pilgrims.

Charitable Resources:

To begin to understand the potential of our charitable resources at Trinity we must first learn to ask the question, "How can I bless this city with the material wealth with which God has blessed me?". We hope to establish creative partnerships with local charities that aim to improve the quality of life for the poorest and most vulnerable in Myrtle Beach, like the approximate 200 homeless children currently occupying our school system. This will be done by our newly established "City on a Hill Fund" which will seek to annually distribute funds to local charities in shared ventures.

What does it require of you? I would ask you to pray for this vision. I would ask you to partner with us, particularly in building a community of small groups that is a refuge in Myrtle Beach. And I would ask you to consider your pledge, as we aim to increase our budget in order to begin building our charitable contributions towards a five year goal of \$40,000.

Why? The beginning of the Gospel teaches us that "God so loved the world, that he sent his Son." But the end of the Gospel teaches us that the Son so loved the world, that he sent the Church. We haven't strategized and prayed for how you can make Trinity a better church. We've prayed and strategized for how the Church, through the power of the Gospel, can make a better city. We hope you'll join us in this endeavor.

It is a great time for moms to get away for a few hours, have fellowship with others in their same place in life, learn about different topics each meeting, and have a time together in the Bible each week.

Trinity's children's ministry is hoping to continue to be a safe place for children to hear about Jesus, and be able to reach out to parents and lost children. Be on the lookout for more information as to how you can help us reach the children and parents of this city with the Gospel.

From The Associate Pastor

On September 20, 1954, the Coastal Carolina Junior College opened with 53 students. Today, Coastal Carolina University has grown to over 8,000 students! Not only that, but the University exerts a considerable influence on our area as graduates remain in Horry County to build their lives and become the future leaders of our city and county. For that reason, I have had a heart to see a vibrant college ministry at Coastal since I moved to Horry County in 2006.

I share this passion with Chad Young, area director for Cru in the Lowcountry. Although Chad has had his eye on Coastal Carolina for years, they do not yet have the staffing to build a vibrant ministry here, two hours north of their headquarters. In June, I approached Chad to talk about launching Cru at Coastal this year. He was ecstatic. We began by handing out bottles of water on the first day of class with the small handful of student leaders that we already knew. The next Monday, we launched our first weekly meeting with 12 students in attendance.

The weekend of September 23-25th, 6 students and I travelled to Camp Thunderbird in York, South Carolina for Cru's Fall Getaway. After meeting with our students to discuss building a movement on Coastal's campus, Chad and I were talking as we walked to our next event. As we were talking, Chad very nonchalantly stated, "Iain, if you got hit by a bus tomorrow, we'd still have the beginning of a movement at Coastal." While I'm not excited about the prospect of getting hit by a bus, my heart leapt at this observation. What Chad had noticed was that we had a handful of students who were zealous about the Gospel being spread at Coastal! I can honestly say that in 5 years I have not witnessed a group of students who were this excited about seeing Christ exalted at Coastal.

This group of students continues to meet on Monday nights at 8 o'clock. They are also meeting together throughout the week to study the Bible, pray for the campus, and promote Cru amongst their peers. I thank God that as the Associate at Trinity, I have the freedom to go and invest in the future leaders of Myrtle Beach and Horry County. Because of your support of our ministry here, students have a safe community where they can come and be encouraged in their faith.

What else can you do to support this ministry? If you do anything, pray. Six student leaders have a mighty task in front of them to help a student body of 8,000 encounter the Gospel! That is a truly God sized task. Also, please contact me if you would like to host any hospitality events for students (cookouts, laundry, etc.) Finally, if you see any of these students at our West Campus, please stop and encourage them.
