



Happy Eastertide Everyone!

As we move into Spring and season of Easter, I hope you all have experienced time to rest, relax and reflect throughout Lent and Holy Week. These seasons have brought us to where we are now, Eastertide, a fifty day period to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus, that concludes with Pentecost.

As Lent, Holy Week and Easter are such identifiable markers of the Christian tradition, it is fitting that we engaged in programs and projects framing this important time. One of these programs was the Stations of the Cross coloring project, created by artist Mary Button. Many of you may have noticed the *Climate Change* centered *Stations of the Cross*, placed throughout the sanctuary during Holy Week.

We thank our youth and church families for their work on these pieces of art and appreciate each pieces reflection on climate change as a spiritual crisis that mirrors the suffering and Passion of Jesus. However, if you missed this program, don't worry! You will have a chance to see this exhibit during the upcoming Eco-Art Show!

April 17th-24th, UMC Madison will be hosting an Eco-Art Show, showcasing artwork from New York City, Newark, Morris and Drew artists. The goal of this art show is, "to engage Madison and surrounding communities in creative expression centering on appreciation, stewardship and justice for the environment, and those most impacted by its devastation."

We will have a small Opening Reception for the show after service on the 17th. The following week, on the 24th, we will close the show with a special guest speaker and luncheon. Drew Professor Dr. Laurel Kearns will speak on faith and the environment during service on the 24th, and following the 10 am service she will then lead a *Lunch and Learn* for all church and community members. To view the other dates throughout the week that the show will be open, please check the church website.

Also, please note this is a community show. Artists of all ages and experience levels have submitted their work, and it is our hope that all community members will be invited and feel welcomed to enjoy and reflect upon the art. So please consider not only visiting the "gallery" but also inviting your friends and neighbors!

Lastly, the church is once again hosting a Stop Hunger Now Event, and we have chosen a date! On May 21st we will gather at Madison High School, where as a church and community we will package 25,000 meals. The majority of these Stop Hunger Now Meals will go to school children in developing countries, with the hope that nourished children can better attend school and learn, increasing their chances of breaking out of the cycle of poverty. This project has had wonderful reviews from our church community, yet it is also a time and financial commitment. Therefore, if you have questions or you are interested in either packaging meals and/or donating to this project please let me know! Any time, energy and financial donation is appreciated!

As a church we have many big projects coming up. These projects will engage us with the community and creation, all while deepening our connection and community with one another. However, even in the midst of these events, I pray that each of us find time to lean into the mystery of Easter and the Resurrection, and sense the grace, love and forgiveness of a living and ever-moving God.

The expanded coffee hour/brunch was once again well received and especially with the wonderful Turkish treats provided by our guests from Peace Island Institute. The fellowship offered demonstrates one of our congregation's best qualities. The Lenten/Easter Offering will be distributed to Peace Islands Institute, the Laundromat Project, and UMCOR One Great Hour of Sharing.

The presentation about Peace Islands Institute highlighted their Center for Interfaith which plans activities with churches, temples and other houses of worship to open a common ground for dialogue. http://

The Laundromat Project focuses its work in three anchor neighborhoods of NYC where they use creativity as a catalyst to bring change and networking to communities to foster greater pride and ownership. http://laundromatproject.org/

Erin Rowell, Madison Area YMCA, informed the congregation about TerraCycle recycling program sponsored by the Y which established special recycling processes for items considered "non-recyclable" i the norma stream.

UMCOR annual One Great Hour of Sharing offering directly supports overhead expenses of United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) to ensure the continued global ministry and the promise that 100% of each designated offering for disaster relief goes directly to that effort. When we meet the needs of those who suffer we answer Jesus' call to ministry. UMCOR began in the global turbulence of World War II

with relief missions in Europe and Asia. It has continued relief efforts globally, expanding their services and building international partnerships.

"I was hungry and you gave me food to eat. I was thirsty and you gave me a drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me. I was naked and you gave me clothes to wear. I was sick and you took care of me. I was in prison and you visited me." (Mt. 25:35-36, CEB)

Recent UMCOR relief efforts

Partners from 13 Caribbean islands met for UMCOR's fifth International Disaster Response training in Grenada. Previous UMCOR IDR disaster response trainings have

been held in Chile, Philippines, Zimbabwe, and Germany. These training sessions prepare regional partners from the church, missional organizations, government, and other professions to design and implement humanitarian assistance and disaster risk reduction projects.

UMCOR with the support of local volunteers from the Louisiana Conference of the United Methodist Church distributed health kits and flood/cleaning buckets to those suffering from floods, in Louisiana and everywhere!

With UMCOR support, <u>International Blue Cross & Blue Crescent</u> identified the most vulnerable 1000 families and distributed emergency food provisions and hygiene materials to those impacted by the Nepal earthquake.

It is the sixth year that UMCOR has provided support to displaced populations affected by the Syria conflict. Working with more than a dozen international partner agencies, UMCOR provided emergency food supplies, health care, shelter, psychosocial support, education support, and even mine removal.

South Sudan, the world's youngest nation, has nominal infrastructure and social services due to years of civil war and continued conflict. UMCOR has embarked on a new development project that will include community health care unit.

Several nursing students have been helping guests with foot care and blood pressure screenings. This partnership has benefitted over 50 individuals who attend Our Promise and has provided the students with valuable and enjoyable experiences.
