

#### (The) Gathering

A year ago we "formally" started an "informal" worship service on Sundays. Through the gifts and talents of Chelsea, Parker, Scott and Christiana, an intimate worship service was offered each Sunday at 5 pm. The group "gathered" between 8 and 15 people together for a *simple* time of singing, prayer, reflection, and oh yes, food!

This service provides an alternative for those who are unable to join on Sunday mornings or who find a smaller group preferable to a larger one. Yet, most importantly I believe it provides another way of getting to the heart of what it means to be a community of faith.

#### United Methodist Women

n September 21 the Naomi Circle of United Methodist Women sponsored the 2nd annual ecological boat tour on the Hackensack River. The pontoon boat left Laurel Hill Park in Secaucus for a cruise up the Hackensack River on a warm and sunny day. Captain Hugh Carola was at the helm and provided a running commentary throughout the 2 ½ hour trip about the wildlife and ecology of the Meadowlands and the efforts of Hackensack Riverkeeper to prevent industrial pollution and keep the river and surrounding meadows clean for the fish and wildlife. Our next meeting will be on Wednesday, October 26 and we are planning to visit the Methodist Archives and History Center at Drew University to see the new exhibit "Books in the Time of Shakespeare". Curator Cassie Brand, will give a tour of the exhibit, held in conjunction with the visit of Shakespeare's First Folio (The Book that Gave Us Shakespeare) at Drew. There are many other events being held at Drew while the First Folio is there as part of a National traveling exhibition commemorating the 400<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Shakespeare's death. If you would like to stay for lunch afterward, please bring a brown-bag lunch and we will provide coffee and beverage.

In 2015 a total of \$130 was sent to the Center and so far in 2016, we have sent \$40. I thank everyone most sincerely for their donations.



#### New Members



#### **OUTREACH MINISTRY TEAM**

Honoring God's gift of Jesus by sharing with others



Market Street Mission has been actively serving the poor, needy and homeless in Morris County since 1889. Part of their mission is to help their guests overcome addiction and poverty through a life centered on Christ. The programs aim at meeting the critical needs of homeless and disadvantaged men, women and children through our emergency services

program. Through the 8 to 12 month residential treatment program participants share in the daily work at the Thrift Store, Bible study, chapel service, group and individual counseling, AA/NA meetings, and computer assisted and classroom instruction. The goal is to help the guests to achieve selfsufficiency including skills to find sustainable work and shelter. Some of the accomplishments of the past year include:

- Serve more than 90,000 meals to homeless and underprivileged individuals.
- Provide over 30,000 shelter nights of care to men at our Emergency Shelter and residents in our Life Change Program.
- Hold over **400 chapel services** with approximately 80 people attending daily.
- Distribute 1,200 backpacks filled with supplies to needy school children and teens in our area.
- Graduate 45 men from our Life Change Program.
- Distribute approximately 2,500 winter coats at our annual Coat Giveaway (the first Saturday of November).
- Distribute \$35,000 in Thrift Store vouchers to families in need.

The Annual Coat Drive is one of the outreach services organized by the staff, residents and volunteers to provide warm winter coats to others in need. During October, our congregation can bring in gently used coats of all sizes that will be sorted and distributed by Market Street Mission at the Morristown Green on the morning of Saturday, November 5<sup>th</sup>.

Adult and youth volunteers from church are sought to help sort coats on the morning of Saturday, October 22<sup>nd</sup>, at the warehouse. The coats will be displayed on the Green where those in need can 'shop' for the best outerwear to help keep them warm throughout the winter. So clean out those closets and share from your abundance.



#### **Outreach—Feed my Lambs**



SHARING Whenever and wherever disaster strikes, the presence of relief and recovery teams becomes critical to the care and return of well being for those involved. United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) is

the domestic and international arm of our church that is ready for immediate response to any disaster or health crisis. UMCOR is widely praised for its organizational approach that includes partnership with local and ther global relief agencies. When catastrophic flooding hit Louisiana in August, the First United Methodist Church in Denham Springs was one of the only buildings in the area that didn't flood. Immediately after communications were reestablished, the church became a distribution site for United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) cleaning buckets, among other supplies to anyone who needed them from the neighboring towns.

And the need across the world is growing for UMCOR Relief Supplies as reported by the Supply Depot - 15,000 cleaning buckets and 2,000 hygiene kits were recently shipped where needed within the US and across the globe.

#### AFWH- A Future with Hope Update



A Future with Hope (AFWH), conceived as the mission arm of

Greater NJ Annual Conference, is dedicated to helping families with

SuperStorm Sandy recovery and continues its effort to help rebuild homes and lives in our communities. Our church has supported the rebuilding effort through hands on volunteers and by preparing meals to feed the scores of volunteers that come from across the country. To date the results include completion of restoration of 244 homes, 22 homes under construction, 4 homes in queue, hosting 11,540 volunteers at 10 host sites with 284 person hosting capacity. AFWH case managers have worked with 450 families and households totaling over 1000 individuals.

UMC Madison has now completed its commitment to assist with the Family Promise families at St. Vincent's Martyr Church for 3 weeks during 2016. Our last time to help was during the week of August 7, when there was a full house of 7 adults and 2 children, ages 8 and 1. Karen Jeisi headed up the meal preparation and serving, with the help of Donna Conley and Karla Tram. Kris Pfeiffer helped in the evening, and volunteers from St. Vincent's Knights of Columbus stayed overnight. Chelsea and Parker helped on Saturday morning. Many thanks to all who helped over the summer. Our next chance to volunteer with the families at St. Vincent's will be in February, 2017.

Family Promises latest newsletter had very encouraging news about Nahtrelle, one of the guests who stayed in shelter this summer. During her time in shelter, Nahtrelle has demonstrated a positive attitude and commitment in achieving her goals, one of which was to earn her high school equivalency. She did achieve this goal and is now working towards an Associates Degree in human services. Last month, she moved out of shelter and into Family Promises' Abigail House program. There was also news of a new Family Promise Board member, The Reverend A. Craig Dunn, pastor of First Baptist Church in Madison. First Baptist is a support church for St. Vincent's and recently became a host church, a very ambitious undertaking.
