TESTIMONY OF A LIFE CHANGED: VRNI RECOVERY PROGRAM

I was born in Taft, CA and was the only child in a family with my mom, my grandma, and my uncle and I was spoiled rotten by all of them but it was my grandma "Gee-gee" that loved me unconditionally. I spent a lot of time with Gee-gee and she's the one who taught me to pray and it was with her that

When I was five, my life as I knew it changed, my mom got married and we moved to Idaho. My new dad drank a lot and was very abusive to my mom and to me and I was in constant fear of what he would do next. By the time I was seven I started stealing and smoking my mom's marijuana. The only times I would feel okay was when I got to spend the summers with Gee-gee. But I started to feel like a ping-pong ball being bounced

back and forth when all I wanted was to live with Gee-Gee. My life became a nightmare because of the on-going abuse and it didn't take long before I started to act out. I was sent to a continuation school where I was always in trouble and eventually got kicked out in the middle of my 6th grade year.

By the time I was eleven I was experimenting with alcohol and harder drugs, stealing cars and breaking into houses with my

friends. I was out of control...my mom couldn't handle me and neither could Ge-Gee. So my uncle, who was now living in Mariposa, stepped in and I went to live with him. I was now living in the middle of no-where which made it harder to get in trouble but I liked living with my uncle, he was firm but loving and he brought structure into my life. I remember my uncle used to take me fishing as a reward when he saw I was being good. I brought my grades up from straight F's to B's & C's, but my uncle's marriage was falling apart so I was put into foster care half-way through 7th grade. I thought I was doing good but I was being sent away...I didn't understand. The rejection I felt drove me to methamphetamine and slamming' dope.

I was really messed up for a few years and don't really remember much but I know I got pregnant when I was 13 and had an abortion. By the time I was 16 I was pregnant

again and ended up marrying the father

of my son. My life started to change...I stopped partying and was becoming a responsible person and living a "normal" life. My husband and I had decided to live close to Gee-Gee who was very sick so I could take care of her...things were going pretty good, my husband had a great job, we had a car, we were paying our bills every month and then, soon after my second son was born, Gee-Gee died. I was 22 and felt my whole world had crumbled. My husband and I both went back to the drugs and it was so bad that my husband left and then my mom took our kids.

Prior to Gee-Gee's death my mom and dad had moved to Modesto and turned their lives over to God so I knew my kids were safe but I wanted them back. Mom said she would return my kids if I went to a rehab to get help so I did. I successfully completed a drug rehab program, started going to church, got baptized with my kids and got back with my husband. We were living the "normal" life again but I was miserable. My husband started drinking and food became my drug of choice and I managed to eat my way to 500 pounds. I had gastric bypass surgery but couldn't resist the pain pills I was given so my addiction began again.

I just needed to get away...so left,

"boy was that a mistake". I walked out on my husband and kids in search of happiness. I began staying with friends and when I got tired of "house hopping" I went to the streets. I remember my first night, I was burnt out, it was raining, I had one blanket and I was crying because I didn't know where I was going to sleep. Then, I started praying and soon after that prayer I found a small dry space next to a building and crawled into it and fell asleep. I survived the night which for me was an accomplishment since I had a fear of the dark. The next day I went to a park and met some homeless people who took me to their camp, shared what they had with me (cigarettes & vodka), and taught me the ropes. For seven years the homeless community became my family.

I can't explain it but I grew to love living homeless and I was good at it, but that life ended when I was arrested for stealing.

One day I just snapped...I needed transportation so I decided to "jack" a car. I grabbed a lady's car keys and demanded her money but as I was getting into her car I noticed a child in the back seat and...I couldn't do it, I dropped the keys and took off with the money. It didn't take long for the police to find me and take me to jail. While in jail I was drawn to this man, Chaplin John, who made regular visits to the jail to teach the love of Jesus. He encouraged me to check out the House of Hope if I was serious about changing my life.

Although jail wasn't my residence of choice, I did get reconnected with God and made the decision to turn my life around. Becky from the House of Hope interviewed me at the jail and said I met the program criteria and I should contact the House of Hope as soon as I was released. As my release

date arrived I had no idea as to how I would get to the House of Hope so I hit my knees and prayed. Thirty minutes after my prayer Chaplin John showed up at the jail to let me know that transportation to the House of Hope had been arranged for me. The very next morning a woman arrived with a bag of clothes and drove me to the House of Hope.

I have been at the House of Hope since April and my life is changing. I have been given the opportunity to learn things that will help me in my recovery and to grow in my relationship with God. I get up excited everyday and I am so grateful to the House of Hope and all they do for women like me.

Recovery Program for Men and Women

Our Spiritual Training and Educational Program (S.T.E.P.) was developed to assist those who seek to escape the slavery of addiction and sin. The core program is nine months with additional aftercare services available for up to a year following graduation.







Men's Program: Updated!

In the 30 year history of the VRM, we have gone through many changes. Though staff, facilities and resources have evolved, the goal has remained the same, Hope and Restoration Through Jesus Christ. We are continuously looking for new and more effective ways to provide life change through a relationship with Christ. We recently came to the conclusion that the only way that would happen would be by providing more of Him, and less of us.

Our new recovery program format does just that. Our once six month program is now

twelve. What once were a handful of Bible and 12 step studies is now an intensive structured spiritual formation and life skills program. Men who graduate this program will possess a solid spiritual foundation to go along with new found sobriety. In addition, GED completion, job training and transitional housing opportunities provide the final step to full re-entry into society. Ultimately however the answer lies with Christ and Christ alone. He must become greater and greater, and I must become less and less. John 3:30

munity Garden has begun to bear fruit and show promise for the future. In Levitical law, the Hebrews were instructed to let a fruit tree mature for three years before allowing it to bear fruit, an exciting analogy we hope corresponds with the investment our generous volunteers and donors have made to the garden.

Initially the brainchild of a VRM volunteer, the garden became a VRM project. In 2010, VRM volunteer coordinator Janelle Macom began oversight of the garden project, enlisting area farmers, irrigation advisors, and other business leaders to help establish healthier soil via an extensive irrigation project. In early 2011, the garden began to acquire volunteer leadership and project coordination with the help of John Schaap, Meg Svensson, and Steven and Jackie

Potorke, who assisted irrigation expert Eric Limas in completing the subterranean irrigation system.

As of today, the garden now consists of several dozen permanent fruit trees, including apples, pears, plums, peaches, nectarines, and apricots. Other permanent plants include several blackberry bushes and two rows of grapes. A beautification effort has been undertaken in an attempt to create an oasis in the urban setting of Visalia's east downtown, and includes flowering vines planted along the chainlink fence of the property and plans for seating and shade. The garden's raised beds consist of tomatoes, pumpkins, zucchini, yellow squash, peppers, green beans, kale, cabbages, lettuces, leeks, eggplant, and a variety of melons.

In the interest of appealing to community investment, family plots are also available for volunteers to come and claim several rows of our subterraneanirrigated land, with seeds, tools, and fertilizer available from our donated supply. There are also plans for educational programs to be held at the garden, including lessons about composting and horticultural techniques. It is the prayer of garden coordinators that these opportunities will be reinvested into creating an abundant harvest for the residents of the VRM, with the bulk of produce devoted to supplying the VRM's kitchens with fresh produce. There is an immediate need for volunteers to help maintain the garden, as well as a list of supplies currently needed for donation.
