

PART ONE: What Jesus meant by "Good News"

PASTOR ANDY STANLEY / NORTHPOINT CHURCH 1. When Jesus spoke of life-after-death, why was it so "mind-bending" to the religious leaders? MARK 12:28-31 One of the teachers of the law came and heard them debating. Noticing that Jesus had given them a good answer, he asked him, "Of all the commandments, which is the most important?" "The most important one," answered Jesus, "is this: 'Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength. 'The second is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no commandment greater than these." 2. Even though Jesus seems to mention two commandments, He speaks singularly - (There is no commandment greater than these) What does this teach us? 3. Pastor Andy intentionally spends a great deal of time describing who Peter is. What is the purpose of such detailed set-up? One of the most powerful details for me, and we see this again and again, is that Jesus chose people who seem very unlikely for the Job. Peter was illiterate, had a very strong personality, etc. Paul was extremely educated but deeply rooted in the corruption of Judaism. Matthew was a hated Tax Collector. Rich, poor, educated, illiterate, short, tall, corrupt, Jesus chooses and can powerfully work through all of us. MARK1:14&15

After John was put in prison, Jesus went into Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. "The time has come," he said. "The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!"
