

UHY ARE WE HERE, ANYWAY?

"Meaningless! Everything is meaningless!" says the writer of Ecclesiastes, a biblical book with some not-so-encouraging conclusions about human life. The author contends that nothing "under the sun" has lasting meaning, and that to find our purpose, we must look beyond this world.

The story begins with a king who has everything a person could desire: power, pleasure, a mighty army, prestige, and plenty of financial security. In other words, he started out with what most of us spend a lifetime seeking. His conclusion: "Everything is so weary and tiresome! No matter how much we see, we are never satisfied. No matter how much we hear, we are not content."

The Bible devotes twelve chapters to this man's "experiments" with purpose; his attempts at satisfaction through hard work, education, pleasures, buildings, power, even religion, and how each experiment left him empty and depressed. He came to the place where he said, "I looked at everything I had worked so hard to accomplish, it was all so meaningless. It was like chasing the wind. There was nothing really worthwhile anywhere, so I hated life."

Deep inside my heart I find agreement with the writer, looking at the passing pleasures and promises of the world. "If this world is all there is, why should I bother?" All we have will one day be taken from us by death, and all we've worked for or enjoyed will be absorbed into the next generation, who themselves will try to "have it all" as well.

It's easier not to think about this sort of thing - just go on with my life and ignore this warning. But I can't do that. If there is a purpose to find, I want it.



If there is a way to break the endless cycle of chasing the wind, I want to know how.

Every day we see the sun shining above us, and every day the majority of our time is spent dealing with earth-bound issues. It would be easy to get so caught up in "under the sun" activity that we forget to pursue lasting purpose.

The author's conclusion is found in 12th chapter of Ecclesiastes, where he urges us to "... remember your creator now ... before the silver cord of life snaps."

Life under the sun only has meaning when God is the focus. He created us with a purpose; fulfilling His goals is primary reason for our existence. If we live for other things - wonderful as they may be - they will never satisfy the cry of our hearts, and they won't last beyond this life.

Jesus asked: "How do you benefit if you gain the whole world but lose your own soul?"

THE **MEANING** OF LIFE

We have to understand the *meaning* of our lives before we can ascertain the specific *mission* of our lives. In other words, if you don't know why you were made, you'll never have a clear picture of what you are supposed to do!

First, we can ask, "Why did God make us?" In all of my studies, theological and philosophical, I've come to this conclusion: "God made us because He wanted to."



Think about it for a moment. If a child asks his parents, "Why did you have me?" what is the answer? "Because we wanted a child to love." Ultimately, those parents hope their child grows into a successful person, one upon whom they can look with pride and say, "See, that is my child!" And even better, a child might look back at his parents and say with satisfaction, "I'm so glad that you had me! I'm so glad to be in your family!"

Such is our relationship to God.

This is wonderful news. God *wanted* to make me. That means I'm not an accident. I'm not an afterthought. God wants to love me as a perfect father would. He wants to have a relationship with me, according to the Bible, both now and forever. I was created: not as a slave, or a robot, or a pawn, I was created to be His child!

This clears up most of my wondering about the meaning of life. *I was made because God the Creator decided I should exist.* So, my next question goes like this: "God, if you want me to be a part of your kingdom-family, what specifically does that mean? How do you want me to relate to You? What would You like me to do?"

THE MISSION OF LIFE

Jesus gave us a head start on understanding the mission of life when He singled out the "first and greatest" commandment. Matthew reports:

An expert in religious law tried to trap him with this question: "Teacher, which is the most important commandment in the law of Moses?"

Jesus replied, "You must love the LORD your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. A second is equally important: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' The entire law and all the demands of the prophets are based on these two commandments."

That means the real key to life is in how we learn to love God and each other. Because God first loved us, our mission is to love Him in return! And while there are many ways we could potentially show our love for God, the Bible outlines five that are definitely part of our personal mission:

1-OBEDIENCE TO JESUS' COMMANDS

Jesus said, "If you love me, obey my commandments." I can learn how to do this by reading the Gospels (the four accounts of Jesus' life and teaching that appear in the Bible) and asking, "How can I apply these teachings to my life?" When we study the words and actions of Jesus, we show that we are serious about fulfilling the purpose of our lives.

Z. TURNING AWAY FROM EVIL

Psalm 97 says, "You who love the LORD, hate evil! He protects the lives of his godly people and rescues them from the power of the wicked." Loving God means I turn away from the evil that lurks in my own heart – pride, lust, greed, envy, bitterness, anger, selfishness and anything else that doesn't honor His law. This part of our life-mission is admittedly difficult, given all the temptations we face. To this, the Bible says: "If we confess our sins to Him, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all wickedness."

3 SERVING PEOPLE IN NEED

From the Gospel of Matthew, regarding the final judgment: "Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the Kingdom prepared for you from the creation of the world. For I was hungry, and you fed me. I was thirsty, and you gave me a drink. I was a stranger, and you invited me into your home. I was naked, and you gave me clothing. I was sick, and you cared for me. I was in prison, and you visited me.'

"Then these righteous ones will reply, 'Lord, when did we ever see you hungry and feed you? Or thirsty and give you something to drink? Or a stranger and show you hospitality? Or naked and give you clothing? When did we ever see you sick or in prison and visit you?'

"And the King will say, 'I tell you the truth, when you did it to one of the least of these my brothers and sisters, you were doing it to me!" (Matthew 25:34-40)

4. SPREADING GOOD NEWS

The most specific "mission statement" from Jesus came when He commissioned His followers to share His message everywhere. He said, "Go into all the world and preach the Good News to everyone." (Mark 16:15) I get to be a part of extending God's love and growing His family, by introducing more and more people to Him. Now that I've discovered life's true purpose, I'm excited to share the life-changing truth of the Bible with anyone who will listen!

5 PRAISING GOD

As I learn more about how much God has done for me, and how much He loves me, I am delighted to praise Him. The Bible offers examples of people doing this in private prayer, public declarations, music, art, service – even in the way they conduct themselves in family and work life. Everything about our existence can be connected to our relationship to God – we

can live our lives for his glory. As the Psalmist prayed: "I will meditate on your majestic, glorious splendor and your wonderful miracles. Your awe-inspiring deeds will be on every tongue; I will proclaim your greatness."


Here's something exciting: once you start fulfilling God's purposes, you'll sense His presence and power in your life. You'll look back weeks or months from now and see how many ways He has changed you.

Rather than the discouragement of tiresome life "under the sun" that the ancient king declared "utterly meaningless," your life will be full of joy. The things you do will count forever, not just in this life. Each day, whether circumstances bring sorrow or happiness, will filled with eternal meaning. I know it has worked that way in my life. And I trust the same will be true for you.

stepmother. Christy's father, Rick, also had a rough family background. Upon learning that they she was pregnant, the teenagers did not know what to do.

In 1973, just days before *Roe vs. Wade* became law, the Christy's parents found themselves in a New York abortion clinic. Beth took a number, and, within minutes of her number being called, she had the procedure performed. It was quick and anonymous, and they thought everything was taken care of.

Later that spring, Beth noticed that her body was changing and there was a bulge in her stomach. *She was still pregnant!* Beth decided to have the baby, and in June, after graduation, she and Rick were married. Two months later, on August 22, 1973, Christina was born. She was a completely healthy, 7-pound baby girl, with no birth defects or problems. As Beth held her newborn daughter, she declared her to be "her sweet, beautiful Christina."

One would wonder if this affected Christy's relationship with her parents, and especially her mother. Christy says that it did not: "Nothing changed after that revelation ... everything stayed the same." Christy was not angry with her parents, because she grew up feeling loved and secure. She thought this announcement affected her mother more than it did her. This news did, however, stir something in 17-year-old Christy -- she determined to learn more about abortion.

A few months later, Christy went off to college and found herself among a minority of students who were "pro-life." When discussions came up among her peers, she did not tell those who debated with her about her own perilous beginning.

But that timidity has changed in the years since, and today Christy feels God's purpose in her life is all about restoration. In October of 2010, as Christy studied the Book of Isaiah, she learned of the mandate to care for widows and orphans. She immediately thought of her widowed grandmother, and now takes her children for visits as often as she can -- nearly once a week. In getting to know her grandmother, Christy has gained a better understanding of all the dysfunction in her family tree. Christy's grandmother related how her own mother

hated her and did not want her, and would say "evil things" to her. This is generational, because Christy's great-great grandmother would refer to her own daughter as "step-child" and would not call her by her name.

Christy said, "So, you see a mom who hated her daughter, another mom who hated her daughter, and that hate-pattern trickled down until her grandmother abandoned her three daughters, and then my mother tried to abort me. It is the enemy's (Satan's) determination to destroy families -- it is the spirit of destruction that follows families. Only Jesus can stop this pattern." Christy continued, "That is why I love the theme of restoration in the Bible. Every time you read it, you see God's purposes revealed. This story of restoration continues because God saved me, and now my three children are also saved by Jesus Christ."

When Christy was asked about her personal insights for her life since God has given her a second chance, she said, "I know He has a purpose for my life, and I believe this is true for everyone." She said, "It is a matter of knowing Him and pouring His Word into our hearts so that we understand it. Then, when He calls us to act, we do what He wants us to do."

"When I was growing up, my faith was my parents' faith -- I believed it because that was how I was taught. When I was 22, I was walking my own way -- a way that was far from God, and He stopped me in my tracks. At my birth, God had hidden me in the shadow of His hand and saved me from murder. Then, at 22-years old, while I was going in my own direction, it was as though He came down and put His hand over me again. He took me back for Himself, for restoration, and for His own purposes. In the beginning, that purpose was to make me the wife of my husband, and then to make me the mother of my three daughters."

When she hears a woman express the opinion that she has a right over her own body and a right to control her own destiny, Christy's first thought is that such a woman is in need of Jesus, the Savior. She adds that, "God is Sovereign and reigns over all life, and my life is proof of that. People will choose what they want, and they want comfort and convenience and that is why they turn to abortion." She continues, "For my parents, their lives would have been so much easier not having me, as they had to put their lives and plans on hold. But the pursuit of self-fulfillment is a deception of the devil. God has a greater purpose for life."

When asked if she ever wonders why God allowed her to live, she said, "Yes, I do wonder about that, because we are now up to 53 million of my generation that are gone -- and I am not. I do not know why God saved my life, but He did."

Christy says that abortion has affected her mother, and her mother deeply regrets that decision. Her mother knows and accepts that she is 100% forgiven, but the scar of the regret is still there. She is reminded of what she is capable of; but the fact is, we are all capable of doing evil things.

As for restoration, Christy's mother went to Ghana, Africa ten years ago, and was overcome by the needs of the children. In 2005, she was compelled to build a building to house the orphans, and they now have an orphanage with 29 children living there. "My mother has always had that hunger for God, and she had a call to go to Africa." Christy's husband manages the orphanage, which is called the "House of Hope," and



her mother helps with loving and planning for the orphans. Christy sees this as God's plan and purpose for her husband right now, as he has developed a real love for the children. They are building another orphan home as money allows, and are hoping to add job training and a day-care program to train young girls who would otherwise fall into prostitution.

What does Christy say to those women who may be contemplating abortion?

"It sounds like a pat answer, and I hate pat answers, but, God has a plan and a purpose for you. Isaiah 46:9-10 says, 'there is no one like God...He knows the end from the beginning...His purpose will stand.' An abortion will lead to unknown trouble for you. There is no way to tell how it will affect your health, your emotions and your spiritual life. There is no way to tell who your baby would have been, or how much precious joy and treasure he or she would have brought to this world, and to the countless others that individual would have touched."

"However, God does know these things," Christy explains. "He values life because He is the author and sustainer of life (Acts 3:15, Col. 1:17). He delights in the creation of new life, and we share in that divine plan when we bring life into this world through our own bodies. God knows the beginning and the end, and will do what is perfect and right for you if you are willing. The situation may not seem ideal, but God's ways are not our ways (Isaiah 5:8) -- there is none like Him."

"I am 38-years old and have a husband who is applying his life to the work of the Lord through an orphan ministry in Ghana alongside my mom. We have three girls whose lives I am dedicated to consecrating to the Lord continually. My grandma found joy at the end of her life through a restored relationship and a second chance. I am a friend to many women; and, perhaps, through this publication, the words of my story will influence women I will never know, Lord willing. God uses people who were once deemed useless and inconvenient, and puts them to noble use for His sovereign and unshakable purposes."

I was born in the farming community of Millersburg, Ohio. Our family moved to Cleveland during the beginning of America's involvement in the Second World War. War jobs boomed in our city, which helped end the Great Depression. We were poor, but it seemed like everyone around me was in the same condition, so I never felt deprived.

I began to doubt the existence of God when I was about twelve. At eighteen the curriculum of evolution taught at our school more strongly enforced my doubts. However, I did not want to believe that God was nonexistent. But to say I believed when I was so unsure seemed very hypocritical. I needed to know the truth and had so many questions. I experienced a terrible void in my life and for the first time felt absolute cold depression. I had never experienced this before.

One day when I was feeling particularly low, I prayed from the very depths of my soul. Ten days later I had a terrifying experience which brought me to the brink of death. This experience taught me in a variety of ways that His existence was a fact and was the beginning of my earnest search of the Bible and other books to help me understand. It was there at my fingertips all the time. What seemed difficult for me to comprehend before became the most exciting reading I ever encountered.

It led me to other believers who also had faith in God. I now understood the great love God has for us. Even so, I still didn't know my own reason for being born. What was my purpose?

At first, I thought my personal purpose in life was to utilize my talents and abilities. Later, I came to understand my job is bigger than that – I am to worship, learn about and serve God. I should try and promote all that God and Heaven are about. My talents, of course, are a part of this – they can be used as tools to reach out to other people.

Since realizing this, I've found a new level of fulfillment in life. Jesus Christ came to earth and sacrificed His life to teach us of His love, care, and mercy; love being the greatest of these. Whatever we do, we should do it to honor Him – whether that is working at being the best mother, father, teacher, scientist, artist, animal trainer or secretary – we can do all of these things, as the Bible says, "to the glory of God."

Jesus told us to let our light shine so that we can introduce others to Him. I am trying to share some of that light. It is for His purpose, glory and love I feel we are here.



FINDING PURPOSE IN THE ORPHAN MINISTRY

t was 2002, four-and-a-half years after we had adopted our two children from Russia, a ten-year-old girl and six-year-old boy. I continued to work after the adoption as a legal secretary at a Cleveland law firm, a position that I had held for over 15 years. To be honest, I derived a great deal of significance and purpose from my job. My work was valued. I was part of a team working on high-profile cases. But keeping up the hectic pace of a full work week, with its daily one-and-a-half hour commute, and mustering the remaining energy to meet family needs in the evening (both in the immediate and the extended family) was taking a heavy toll on me. I was worn out!

So, after 29 years, I left the workforce to stay at home. The initial relief from the tiresome task of keeping all the balls in the air soon faded to the life of the routine. I was having difficulty finding fulfillment in the mundane day-to-day obligations of cooking, cleaning, grocery shopping, paying bills, checking homework, etc. I no longer felt respected or appreciated. I was unhappy and unfulfilled.

Slowly, it dawned on me that this new direction in life was actually a desire God had put in my heart years ago. I remembered that as a single adult I had planned to adopt a child someday. I was surrounded by friends at church who adopted and/or did foster care, so the decision to one day adopt was quite natural for me. I eventually married. Once married, and finding that we were unable to have children of our own, our decision to adopt was an easy

one to make. Regardless of whether we had children of our own, we would still have adopted because we already felt led by God to do so.

My purpose had been there all along and I did not recognize it. My kids needed me more than ever. They were in a new country, with a new language and culture, and they had great emotional needs. They needed me at home. I was to raise the two children we adopted from Russia.

Once I was onboard with God's plan for my life, I found myself discussing our adoption experience with anyone who was interested. I was excited to help others on the journey of caring for kids in need. When I was asked to participate in the Orphan Ministry at church, I jumped at the chance to participate.

Today, I find myself thinking of ways we can best serve orphaned, abandoned or enslaved children. I am drawn to articles about the plight of AIDS orphans, homeless children, children who are bought and sold into slavery or are exploited in the sex trade industry, children who age-out of foster care and have no families or homes to go to - the list goes on. Through the Orphan Ministry, I can be a part of the solution to these challenges. I can live each day with purpose!

I felt deep inside my heart there had to be an answer, but I wasn't finding it anywhere.

That time period was the pinnacle of the hippie movement. I was never drawn into the drug subculture and all that went with it, but I was drawn to the philosophical side. People were de-emphasizing the material world and were focusing on the existential and spiritual side of life. I latched onto that and started my search. As a musician who had played in bands, I looked for an answer in music. Particularly groups like the *Moody Blues* whose lyrics addressed the same deep questions I had. But I found nothing that filled the emptiness in my heart. As a biology major I searched for an answer in nature, but again, nothing could fill the emptiness. The world at that time seemed to be spinning out of control, to the point of coming totally unraveled. After all, Barry McGuire recorded The Eve of Destruction, which said it all. I believed that my generation had the answer for the world's ills. But when I witnessed the violence of the anti-war demonstrations at Kent in May 1970, I came away realizing that my generation was no different from any other. I was left with an utter sense of hopelessness. I had nothing to look forward to. No reason to have hope.

The result was that my hopelessness grew to the point that I had no desire to live anymore. I couldn't escape the gnawing ache in my heart and I wanted to end it all. I wanted to die. I would dream of ways to take my own life, but I was always stopped by the thought of how it would hurt my family. I was terrified at the prospect of death and what was beyond the grave. I pictured myself floating in absolute darkness, all alone, and it scared me. I now know that I was being watched over and protected from myself, from doing something rash and foolish.

I was at my lowest point in the winter of 1972 when a friend in my dorm invited me to a meeting sponsored by The Navigators, a Christian campus ministry. I said I would go, not because I wanted to, but simply to be polite and not hurt his feelings. That decision changed my life forever. The meeting took place in one of the dorm lounges, so it was very informal. The speaker presented his message, most of which I don't remember. But when he started talking about people who walk around like empty shells looking for the meaning of life, it was like he was talking directly to me. And then he said if you will ask Jesus Christ into your heart and life, He will fill that emptiness. At that point something clicked inside me. I was not a church person nor was I a praying person. But that night before I fell asleep, I prayed. I asked Christ to forgive me, and I asked Him to come into my life to fill the emptiness.

When I awoke the next morning, I knew something was different. Something had changed. I felt whole. I felt alive. I had a peace and a joy in the depth of my being

21:3-8. So, to avoid this fate, we must admit to God what we've done wrong (confess our sins) and then let God take the lead in our lives.

REPENT

The first and most obvious step toward following Jesus is turning toward Him. The Bible says that our sins – *the things we do that violate God's moral laws* – are what separate us from a relationship with God. Ultimately, the consequence of breaking God's laws is condemnation on Judgment Day. The Bible discusses this in detail in Revelation 20:11-15 and

BELIEVE





THE FIRST STEP IS THE SAME

Without this higher purpose involved, all our pursuits will feel empty. We'll keep asking, "Is this it?"
We'll keep looking at the next stage of life as the key to our happiness – "when I get older, when I graduate, when I get a job, when I get married, when I buy my dream house, when I have kids, when the kids leave, when I retire, when I ...?"

First, you are correct to observe that human origins have everything to do with human purpose. If humanity has evolved by chance, "purpose" doesn't exist. Accidents may perform "functions" in nature, but those functions cannot be construed as valuable. If there is no intention or intelligence behind the world, no value exists. Even our very existence is no more valuable than our non-existence. Obviously, at LifeChange, we believe that God created the world on purpose, for a purpose. His moral code forms the basis of how we perceive right and wrong, good and evil. Thus, a person's life can be meaningful if that person lives for the purpose the Creator intended.

Second, not all scientists believe in evolution. Many embrace the fact that the Universe has obvious design, and that the most sensible explanation is that this design was put in place intentionally by an intelligent being. And, beyond that, there are many scientists who are Christians and believe the Bible's account of human origins. (For example, it was a chemistry professor from CSU who led the team that created this issue of LifeChange Magazine.)

As you hear evolutionary theory discussed, consider: all scientists see the same natural evidence, but they interpret that evidence differently. If you would like to learn more about how scientists who believe in God interpret the evidence, we recommend the book, In Six Days: Why Fifty Scientists Choose to Believe in Creation, by John Ashton. Two websites you can explore: www. answersingenesis.org and www.icr.org.

I HAVE TO MAKE A SIGNIFICANT DECISION. AND FEEL STUCK. I DO NOT KNOW WHICH WAY TO GO .

The first and best advice is to start reading the Bible. Even if the Bible doesn't have anything specific to say about your scenario

(for example, what major to pursue in college or whether or not you should take early retirement), the principles of God's Word will provide guidance for your life. We have found that the book of Proverbs, in particular, can aid with decision-making wisdom. If you want to know God's will, open His Word.

Here is a practical process to help in making a specific

1. List the pros and cons of the choices in front of you. Are there obvious positives or negatives pertaining to your spiritual life, family life, financial well-being or personal happiness? Sometimes making this list can be revealing.

- 2. Pray about each pro and con item you have written down. Ask for God's wisdom to determine what His priorities for your life should be, and thus, which direction you should go.
- 3. Seek the counsel of a few wise friends, especially those with experience relevant to your decision. We also recommend calling a pastor or other church leader for advice, perspective and prayer. The Bible says that "there is safety in a multitude of counselors."
- 4. Set a course of action, praying something like, "God, based on the information and the desires I have, I am proceeding with my _. If you want me to stop or to go a different direction, please make that amazingly clear. Otherwise, I am proceeding." You might also pray about the following Bible verses: Proverbs 3:5-6 and Romans 12:1-2.

I AM A BEGINNER WHEN IT COMES TO BIBLE READING. HOW SHOULD I BEGIN?

To discover the purpose of life, you are right to be opening the Bible. At first, you may want to turn to the Gospel of John. It will provide you with a basic overview of Jesus' life and teachings. Then, we'd recommend you read the book of James (for practical life-advice), the book of Ephesians (to understand God's plan for your life) and then look for inspiration in the book of Psalms. Psalms is a large book, so a few key chapters to read first would include #'s 1, 8, 15, 19, 37, 119 and 145.


Some people find Bible reading difficult because of the old language used in classic Bibles. We recommend that beginners look at the New Living Translation (NLT) as a way to get started. It is written in simple, current-day English. If you don't have a copy for yourself, the church can provide one, or you can locate one at almost any bookstore. There are other worthy translations that people use for study (NIV, NAS, KJV, etc.). Two online resources to be aware of: BibleGateway.com provides free access to the Bible in a many different languages and translations; and YouVersion is a free app you can download to your mobile device. YouVersion not only allows you to read the Bible, but also to set up reading plans and to access helpful study notes.

Finally, we highly recommend attending a Bible study or church service that emphasizes Bible reading and explanation. This will increase your understanding of God's Word and also keep you motivated in your study. Our church (and many others in our area) offer Bible studies both on Sundays and in weekday home-groups. If you don't have a church home of your own, we invite you to visit LifeChange/Weymouth this Sunday.

Bethany is a naturally-talented surfer living on the beautiful Hawaiian Island coast of Kauai. In her words, she was "born to surf" and had taken to the waves at the young age of three. Trained by her father, Tom (Dennis Quaid), Bethany began competing in the National Surfing Competition, until one morning she lost her left arm when she was attacked by a 14-foot tiger shark. Her faith helped her to remain calm throughout the ordeal and led to her miraculous survival.

While recovering, she had to face the nagging questions about her shattered future dreams. Why did this happen? Why did she have to lose everything she held dear? Would she ever be able to ride the surf again? What was her worth? Most importantly, could she ever be happy again?

After the devastating 2004 tsunami in the Pacific Ocean, her church organized a mission trip to devastated Phuket, Thailand. Reluctant to go on the trip, she was encouraged to go by her youth group leader, Sara Hill (Carrie Underwood). Sara

assured Bethany that God would find His use for her. In Phuket, Bethany had a life transforming experience as she witnessed the devastation left by the tsunami. Children were left homeless, without parents and near starvation, and she felt she could relate to their losses. This profoundly changed her whole perspective on life. The children on the island had suffered devastating losses. Through her surfing skills, she was able to encourage them not to give up, and Bethany found a renewed sense of hope and direction.

Returning home, her father and mother (Helen Hunt) helped to strengthen and encourage her not to give up her dreams. Bethany resolved to conquer her own fears and limitations. With prayer and determination, she faced the demons that plagued her. She made the bold decision to return to the surfing world, and, with just one arm, won worldwide acclaim.

Do Hard Things: A Teenage Rebellion Against Low Expectations by Alex and Brett Harris challenges teens to live a more purposeful life.

I'm Not Wonder Woman, But God Made Me Wonderful by Sheila Walsh is an encouraging read for women who are struggling to keep everything organized, who are trying to "be perfect," and who feel like their lives are a big run-around.





Viewers are treated to stats and scores, names and faces, winners and losers. History is made, and stars rise to the top, carrying home gold and silver medals in the name of their countries.

To win in the Olympics takes discipline. It takes *resolve*. To win takes sacrifice and pain. But when the flag is raised and the anthem is trumpeted, all the years of hard work are rewarded with a single moment of glory.

Most people hate discipline. The thought of Olympians jumping out of bed at four in the morning ready to run laps, workout at the gym, and meet with a trainer makes our couch-lounging bodies cringe. But deep down, we wish we could do what Olympians do. And in our own lives, whatever our pursuit, we wish we could "win the gold."

The Apostle Paul was a fan of athletics, and even referenced Olympic-style competition in the Bible. He spoke of a victory crown greater than earthly medals: "Don't you realize that in a race everyone runs, but only one person gets the prize? So run to win! All athletes are disciplined in their training. They do it to win a prize that will fade away, but we do it for an eternal prize. So I run with purpose in every step. I am not just shadowboxing. I discipline my body like an athlete, training it to do what it should. Otherwise, I fear that after preaching to others I myself might be disqualified." (1 Cor. 9:24-27).

Paul saw sporting events as an illustration of spiritual life. Each of us has a "personal race" to which God has called us. He knew this race to fulfill God's purpose would take discipline; he knew it would take focus and resolve.

The reward for a "gold-medal life" is far greater than a gold medal, as the verse reveals, "we do it for an eternal prize."

SO HOW CAN I LIVE A GOLD MEDAL LIFE?

Fulfilling God's purpose isn't some heroic endeavor reserved only for an elite class of spiritual power-lifters. It doesn't take exceptional abilities to answer God's call, but it does take exceptional effort. We can't run aimlessly or half-heartedly and expect to receive a prize.

Living a gold medal life begins with a simple commitment to God: "I want to fulfill your purpose, Lord. Help me discover what you want me to do." That statement can transform a person's life. But words alone don't win medals. The decision to enter the race is only the beginning - the finish line is yet to come.

Spiritual discipline is challenging, perhaps even more so than physical discipline; saying "no" to temptations, taking steps to know God better, investing time at church, reading the Bible, serving others faithfully, and setting aside our own agenda to accomplish God's objectives.

Living a gold medal life isn't easy. You can't retire. You can't take a week off. Like an aspiring Olympian, you have to give it your all. At the end of the day, however, faithful runners in life's race will receive a reward far greater than anything this world has to offer.

HEAVENLY REWARDS

The Bible promises that those who follow Jesus Christ will be rewarded for their service upon entrance to heaven.

For we must all stand before Christ to be judged. We will each receive whatever we deserve for the good or evil we have done in this earthly body. -2 Cor. 5:10

crying or pain. All these things are gone forever."


