A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

"I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." ~John 10:10

The other day on Facebook I changed my profile picture. It had been a picture of the Denver Bronco's logo in honor of their Super Bowl victory. Now, it's a picture of me riding my bicycle. I put the bicycle pick up in hopes of hurrying spring along. After all, even though it hasn't been very snowy or cold, winter still feels like it is dragging on and I am beginning to yearn for spring time.

I suppose I get that way every March. The weather heats up a bit. The snow starts to melt a little. Sometimes, like this year, I can even see patches of grass in my yard. All these, and other signs, cause my mind to wander to the bike trail,

and the river, and the hill at Lincoln Park that my kids like to roll down, and the beautiful flowers at the Japanese Gardens, and the little path that meanders around Turtle River State Park. I just want the winter to be done. I just want to be outside again—in a way that doesn't involve a shovel in my hand. I want to hop on my bike and zip around the city or take the kids fishing at Ryan Pond. Instead, I'm still stuck in the house, or in the office, or in the car.

I suppose that's the way many feel in life, and not just during the winter. Many feel stuck in a rut, stuck in the same circumstances, stuck in the same career, stuck in the same community, stuck in the same relationships, and stuck in the same life. I'd be willing to bet that many folks in our neighborhoods and in our community are longing for something deeper, more fulfilling, and more rewarding then just the same old, day in and day out routineness of life. They are longing for springtime in their life where they can come out of the dead of winter and experience new life.

The Good News for anyone who has ever felt this way is that it is possible. It is possible to have a better life, a more fulfilling life, and a life of deep meaning. As Christians, we believe this life comes from a relationship with Christ. Jesus frequently commented that he came to bring new life into the world. His mission wasn't simply to teach, or to forgive, or to perform miracles, but it was to offer up to the world a new way of being and living—a way that would lead us into a life giving relationship with God.

We see this "new life offering" played out most significantly during the season of Easter. In just a few short weeks we will celebrate that death cannot contain Jesus, and that just as Jesus was given new life, we can have new life. It is this new life that those of us who have chosen to follow Christ have already experienced. It's also a new life that is meant to be shared. I wonder, is someone in your life stuck and longing for something different? Do you know of anyone who might be interested in hearing how God could help transform their life? If so, I'd like to encourage you to invite them to church on Easter Sunday. It's one of the easiest days of the year to invite someone to church. Many folks who don't attend church regularly are already considering going somewhere, and even if they aren't many of these folks are aware that something big is happening in churches

that Sunday. It's as simple as asking, "Hey. Would you like to come to Easter worship with me?" But that simple invitation could change someone's life forever. Who will you invite?

Wesley United Methodist Church, Church Council and Finance Meetings January 14, 2016, 7 PM—Library

Present: Pastor Howie Baird, Penny Millspaugh (Council Chair), Berniece Holm, Judy Christy, John Galegher, Doug Williams, Steve Schlasner, Ryan Zerr, Jessica Zerr, Jeff Steckman Opening devotion & lesson by Pastor Howie—"A Picture of Biblical Community: Acts 2 Community"

Recited our purpose: To make new disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world. MCCI Report

Pastor Howie noted that first MCCI prescription has been completed with the special worship service affirming and celebrating the new mission statement. Initial teams are ready, and arrangements are being made to put teams in contact with coaches. Coaches may meet by phone and/or fly in to meet with teams. Coaching will begin soon. Teams are Declutter Team, Lobby/Fellowship Planning Team, and Signage Team. The Council prayer walked the lobby/fellowship to bathe the work to be done by these teams in prayer.

Finance Meeting Called to Order by Penny Millspaugh.

- I. Doug Williams reported that an audit has been completed by Doug Williams, Judy Christy, and Jerry Griffin. Accounts seem to be order. Late payments to the IRS have been made; outstanding penalties of approximately \$800 are due by Jan. 26, 2016.
- II. John Galegher reported that the 2015 fiscal year would be closed by the end of the week with exact figures available then. The following preliminary points were discussed:
 - a. Nearly \$4,000 in Christmas offering will be sent to the general conference as approved at the December council meeting.
 - b. We have an approximately \$20,000 increase in paid apportionments over the previous year. Everyone agreed this is something to celebrate; however, we do expect to be approximately \$14,000 short in fulfilling our total commitment to support the work of the conference (apportionments) for 2015.
- III. John also reported on the fall stewardship campaign & 2016 financial outlook, highlighting the following:
 - a. \$217,000 pledged income to date, representing an increase of \$31,000 over pledges in 2015.
 - b. 79 pledges received, including 15 new pledges (meaning they did not pledge in 2015). 62% of repeat pledges increased their pledged amount. 15 pledged last year but did not pledge in 2016, so John will be following up with these.
 - Electronic giving has 21 participants. Doug and John would like to encourage more electronic giving because of the consistent and dependable nature of this method of giving.
 - d. Reminder: Council will need to approve a long term budget in the March meeting to replace the three-month interim budget approved in December. Additional fundraising will be discussed as MCCI prescription implementation gets underway.

Financial meeting adjourned.

Council Meeting Called to order by Penny Millspaugh

- I. Council—Old Business
 - a. Approval of minutes from October, November, and December. Doug Williams made a motion to approve all minutes with discussed corrections. The motion was seconded by Berniece Holm. Motion passed unanimously.
 - b. Trustees Report
 - i. Projects completed: coat hooks in Sunday School hallway and tree
 - ii. Upcoming projects: address heating problems in the lobby/fellowship area
 - iii. Election of Trustees Officers for 2016:
 - 1. Duane Sandwick, Chair
 - 2. Jeff Steckman, Vice-chair
 - 3. Mark Hoffman, Secretary
 - c. SPRC Report: Interviews for the church secretary position have been completed, resulting in a recommendation by the SPRC sub-committee to offer the position to one of the candidates pending a clear background check. The position is for 16 hours/week, Monday—Thursday.
 - d. UMCOR Sager-Brown Depot Trip: two individuals interested.
 - Safe Sanctuaries policy draft still under review by various parties and undergoing proofreading.
- II. Council—New Business
 - a. Pastor Howie asked the council to discuss modifying the church office's business hours to Monday-Friday, 9:00 AM—1:00 PM. Discussion followed, noting the low office traffic on Fridays and the ability to prepare Sunday bulletins by Thursday each week. John Galegher made a motion to set the church office hours to Monday—Thursday, 9:00 AM—1:00 PM. Doug Williams seconded. The motion passed unanimously. New hours will into effect January 18, 2016.
 - b. Report by Pastor Howie on the Dakotas Conference capital campaign: Thrive. Thrive is the five-year conference capital campaign to raise \$6.2 million for building new churches, leadership development, and revitalization of existing churches through the MCCI process and Journey Renew, which focuses on smaller churches. Rev. Randy Cross, our district superintendent, will meet with us in February to talk about Thrive and the way our congregation can support the initiative through a congregational pledge. Any congregational pledge would be approved by council and is considered separate from our apportionments. Pastor Howie will schedule the February meeting with Rev. Randy Cross.
 - c. Berniece Holm announced UMW Sunday is February 7, 2016. Circles have been challenged to think about how UMW will support the work of the MCCI prescriptions.
 - d. Lent (February 10-March 24, 2016)
 - i. Ash Wednesday Service to be held at Zion UMC on February 10.
 - ii. Planning for Wednesday Soup Suppers with a time of worship—tentatively a 5:30 PM supper with worship following. Youth will lead the Lenten worship one week.
 - e. The Contemporary Service's formal launch is scheduled for Jan. 30. The service is going well. The Young Adult Group will begin again on Jan. 24 following the Contemporary Service.

Meeting was closed in prayer by Pastor Howie and then adjourned. Next meeting: February 8, 2016 at 7:00 PM Submitted Respectively by Jessica Zerr




It is with deep gratitude that I thank the members of your congregation for your generous donations of beautiful hats for the children of the Grand Forks

their bowling skills, as well as hiding and navigation skills during the night games! (Have you ever tried to find Patrick Lamberson when he hides in a pitch dark church?? It is virtually impossible!)

The Wesley Youth Group will be working with PATH-ND, Inc. to put together totes of supplies to help aid older foster children as they age out of foster care. We are aiming for five (5) totes. We would like your help as well! Some items that would be useful are: towels, sheets (twin size), blankets, kitchen towels and supplies, silverware, pots, pans, grocery store gift cards, Wal-Mart gift cards, soaps, cleaning supplies etc. These totes would be used when the youth aging out of care transition into their own apartment, going to college etc. A collection box will be in the Narthex.
