

Pat Glatthaar, Vice President, called the meeting to order and Vivian Lowe presented a devotional on "Love".

The April Minutes were approved as written.

Reports:

Sherry Williams, Treasurer, reported a balance of \$11,531.62 as of 7/13/14. Total from the Walk-A-Thon was \$2,928.00, of which \$1,205 is included in the bank statement. There are two outstanding invoices: \$2,000—4 N. shower room and \$400 for planter boxes.

JoAnn Martin, Membership, reported a total of \$3,338 from 17 churches which is an increase from last year (\$3014) with 2 churches and MHCV yet to be included.

Misty's Musing

Obedience...Or Something Like That

God is faithful. This is something I have heard many, many people say many, many times. So many people and so many times, in fact, that it began to seem less meaningful and more like a routine thing that Christians say when they can't think of anything more creative or more thoughtful to say. It may even be up there in the ranks with "I'll pray for you" and "It was a God thing." I don't discount the truth behind these phrases, but we can't deny that they have become overused Christian clichés. However, despite my usual resistance to bandwagon trends (I will NOT be dumping ice on my head anytime soon), I am about to say this with the utmost sincerity...God is faithful.

Let me tell you the story of Misty Jordan's life over the past year. This story has threads that go back much further than that, but I will keep this short.

One year ago today, I had a life that most would see as successful for a 24 year old fresh out of college. I was working for the North American Christian Convention, making a good salary with benefits, and living independently in a new city. I was not fulfilled.

That was the summer that God told me to dedicate my life to music and youth ministry. I'd like to tell some elaborate story about how it was revealed to me. The truth is I was just sitting in my car alone, driving home from church camp, and I said aloud to myself, "I am supposed to hang out with kids and play music every day." For the first time in my life, I knew without a doubt that God was speaking to me. So then I quit my job.

I didn't have another job lined up, I had bills to pay, and everyone told me that I was foolish and that I was making a poor decision on a whim. I knew that I was obeying God. I couldn't explain how I knew, but I knew.

This began my season of serving tables at the Cracker Barrel while searching for a ministry job. During those several months, I didn't make anywhere close to enough money to support myself, but the money seemed to come from the most unexpected places and sometimes completely out of nowhere. I was turned down by many churches, being told that I am too young and too single and too female to serve in a ministry role. This was one of the most difficult times of my life, but at the same time there was so much beauty in the mystery and the uncertainty. While everyone else was calling me crazy, I had this unshakable confidence that I was following God's will, and that I had to surrender everything and rely only on Jesus.

Today I am in full time worship and youth ministry at West Side Church of Christ. My heart is over-flowing with gratitude that I get to invest my entire life in my greatest passion and what I absolutely love doing. If I didn't know this to be true before, I do now: God is faithful

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Bible Trivia

Daniel was taken captive to Babylon during the reign of what king of Judah?

Daniel 1:1-6



To popular music fans, a "one hit wonder" is a performer who has one major hit recording, then slips back into obscurity. This also happens to songwriters. One pop music example is "Moonlight in Vermont." This also happens in sacred music as well. "Jesus Paid it All" is a prime example.

Not much is known about Elvina M. Hall except that she was born June 4, 1822 in Alexandria, VA and died July 1889 in Orange Grove, NJ. She was a widow who married a minister. She also sang in church choirs for many years.

On one Sunday in 1865, she was sitting in the choir loft at Baltimore's Monument St. Baptist Church. Another minister, Rev. George W. Schreck, conducted the service that morning. During the service, her mind began to wander. Soon, a new poem began to form in her head. Searching for a piece of paper and finding none, Elvina wrote her poem down on the inside flyleaf of her hymnal.

Choristers know that anything that happens in the choir loft will be noticed by the congregation. After all, they usually sit in front in the chancel area where everything and everybody is noticed. The congregation, doubtless, noticed her inattentiveness. Perhaps the minister noticed it too. After the service, she showed her new poem to Rev. Schreck. He read it over, then remembered a new melody that the church organist played him recently. The melody might fit with these words, he thought.

The church's organist was John T. Grape (May 6, 1835-Nov. 2, 1915), a Baltimore, MD native. Not much is known about him either, except that he was a successful coal merchant and an active Christian layman. He served various churches in the Christian Education and the Music Departments. John wrote his melody while he was organist and choir director of the Monument St. Baptist Church. While the church was undergoing repairs, the organ was moved to his home. This enabled John to spend more time practicing new music. One of those new works was a melody by William Bradbury that appeared in a new hymnal that he received recently. John liked it so much that he wrote a similar melody in that style.

This was the tune that he showed Rev. Schreck. Sometime later, Elvina had showed the minister her poem. He realized that the words and melody fit, except for one thing. John's melody included a refrain. Elvina's poem didn't have one. She quickly wrote a few words, completing the collaboration. Soon, the new hymn was being sung not only in the Monument St. church, but in neighboring churches as well. Eventually, John submitted his poem for publication. It first appeared in an 1868 hymn.

It has been published in many hymnals since then. It has been recorded many times since the late 1920s. Recent recordings include those by the Gaithers, The Newsboys, Fernando Ortega, and Kathy Trocolli.

PRADER MATTERS from the Prayer Ministry Team

But encourage one another daily, as long as it is called Today, so that none of you may be hardened by sin's deceitfulness" (Hebrews 3:13).

May I suggest a short prayer that you and/or your family can lift up each and every day? "Lord, show us the people You want us to help or encourage today. Lead us to those who are hurting or in need and we will trust you for the means to do something about it." I can promise you that your loving Father will answer if you will listen and obey. He will trust you with small things first and then He will stretch you to be obedient in His bigger plans and purposes.

Being the answer to the prayers of others is one way to be used by God. Being the answer to our own prayers is an astonishingly powerful privilege. There may be situations in the lives of people you know, or perhaps He will choose to use your prayer to work in the lives of those you may never meet. Prayer is a great mystery, but God has chosen to use us to be His agents of answered prayer. Knowing this makes prayer such an honor. It encourages us to pray more and to listen better! We should always be ready to stand in the gap when the Lord places a burden or need on our hearts. He may not always use you in certain situations, but because of your prayers, He may have touched the heart of others to respond. A good prayer when those you are praying for are far away is, "Lord, would you put one of Your willing servants into the path of this person today who can be a blessing to them?" The family of God is extensive and worldwide. He will use every heart that is willing to listen to His voice.

PRAYER: Lord may we seek you always and your will, show us those who are hurting and in need of our help and how we may help them in action, not just raising them up in prayer alone.

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FAITH: The Old Beagle by Bobby D. Harkins

While I was sitting on my porch one morning, drinking my coffee and doing my daily Bible reading, I looked down the street and saw an old Beagle, walking alone. It did not take long to see that the old dog was totally blind. He would run into things like the neighbor's porch steps or his car. Each time he hit something, he would turn and go on until there was nothing in his way. I told my wife about him and we were afraid he would get hit by a car. The old beagle came over to my side of the street and went behind my neighbor's house. I went over to see if I could catch him and give him some water because it was hot that day. I called to the old dog to try and get him to come to me but all he would do was stop, turn his head to hear where the sound was coming from and go the other way. He would not listen to me.

He wandered around for some time, running into things. He headed toward the main highway. I went out to the highway later to see if he might have gotten hit by a car. I did not see the old dog. Later that evening, I looked up the street and saw the old beagle following a man. The old dog was listening to the man's voice. When they came to the street they needed to turn onto, the man turned but the dog went straight on until the man spoke to him, then he turned and continued to follow the man home.

It reminded me that the Lord wants us to be like that old beagle. He wants us to only listen to His voice and follow Him home. When we start to go astray, He speaks to us in that still small voice to bring us back in line. I do not know about you, but I am going to follow the Master's voice on home, "Because your adversary, the devil, walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour." Jesus said "My sheep hear My voice and I know them, and they follow Me." Are you listening to His voice today or are you like the old beagle starting to go down the wrong road? **FUN:** A letter from a Lewis County, Kentucky mother to her son--Copied.

Dear son.

I'm writing this slow 'cause I know you can't read fast. We don't live where we did when you left. Your father read in the paper where most accidents happen within 20 miles of home, so we moved. I won't be able to send you the address as the last Kentuckian family that lived here took the numbers with them for their next house, so they wouldn't have to change their address.

This place has a washing machine. The first day I put four shirts in, pulled the chain, and haven't seen them since. It only rained twice last week, three days the first time and four days the second time. The coat you wanted me to send you, your aunt Sue said it would be a little too heavy to send in the mail with them heavy buttons, so we cut them off and put them in the pockets. We got a bill from the funeral home, said if we don't make the last payment on Grandma's funeral bill, up she comes. About your father...he has a lovely new job. He has 500 people under him, he is cutting grass at the cemetery. About your sister...she had a baby this morning, I haven't found out if it's a boy or girl, so I don't know if you're an aunt or uncle.

Three of your friends went off the bridge in a pickup. One was driving, the other two were in the back. The driver got out, he rolled down the window and swam to safety, the other two drowned, they couldn't get the tailgate down. Not much more news this time, nothing much has really happened. Love. Mom


