Understanding Our Budget

In this column last month I began a brief description of the section of our church budget we United Methodists refer to as "apportionments" or Conference Askings. Apportionments support the connectional work of Christ's ministry in our denomination both locally and globally. The following descriptions continue the interpretation of our apportionments.

Retiree, Disabled and Widowed Fund: Provides funding for the unfunded portion of the pension plan for ministers' service years prior to the implementation of the Ministerial Pension Plan and Comprehensive Protection Plan on January 1, 1982 in addition to medical benefits for retired and disabled ministers and widows or widowers.

Conference Health Plan: Provides medical benefits for active clergy and direct billings to churches for the clergy share of the plan.

District Superintendents Fund: Provides for salaries, pensions, supplemental medical benefits, travel, workers compensation and continuing education for the district superintendents of the Virginia Conference.

Conference Services Fund: Funds the variety of services provided for the local churches through such functions as the Conference Treasurer's Office, the Annual Conference Session, conference publications, computer services, and mortgage on conference center and telephone services.

Education Fund: Provides support to five Virginia Conference church-related colleges and universities and one preparatory school. The major portion of the funds is used for scholarship assistance for United Methodist students attending these schools.

Ministerial Education Fund: Helps recruit and train effective United Methodist ministers. Three-fourths goes to support our thirteen United Methodist theological schools and seminaries. The other one-fourth provides financial assistance for Virginia Conference students enrolled in seminaries and to assist active ministers with the costs of continuing education.

Thoughts from Allie

By the time you read this Lent will be about halfway over, which in my experience means it's time to take another look at the spiritual disciplines we have (maybe) chosen and have (maybe) given up on by now. So, I offer some mid-Lent reflections on discipline:

My first introduction to the concept of Lenten discipline came from my two Catholic aunts when I was young. They gave up sweets each Lent, so I thought I should, too, and I did. I started giving up sweets for Lent in the fifth grade. As I got older, I realized my main goal in doing so had less to do with spiritual preparation and more to do with getting really skinny by Easter. Not only was this never effective, but it was also missing the point. So I began to try some different things to get at the spiritual heart of Lent. One year was a Diet Coke fast, which still felt superficial. For two years in seminary, inspired by my pastor at the time, I gave up buying unnecessary things. Groceries and gas were OK, clothes and Chik-Fil-A milkshakes were not. That was a little closer. For the past few years I have been blogging during Lent, writing down one theological thought a day (when I am good) in hopes of learning to see my daily life more and more through God-colored glasses.

Whatever disciplines we have chosen, they should be things that respond to the invitation of the prophet Joel each Ash Wednesday: things that help us turn our hearts toward God.

When we turn our hearts toward God, we turn them also toward our neighbors. As a church, one way we observe Lent is through our special Lenten offering, which benefits three missions selected by our Local and Global Outreach committees. If you gave something up for Lent which saves you money, maybe you could use what you save in support of these organizations and projects, or in support of relief efforts in Japan, or both. Perhaps Lent can also be a time to be intentional about serving others in a more hands-on way, or a time to practice seeing people around us differently. Pay attention to people who would ordinarily be in the background of your life; imagine what their stories might be. Barbara Brown Taylor calls this "practicing reverence" on people.

At the beginning of Lent, we turn our hearts—let's keep them turning, through Easter and beyond.

We Did It!! The Pew Cleaning Project!!

Church Trustee Kay Hollandsworth organized a group of 25 willing and able volunteers to refurbish the dark wood portion of our sanctuary pews. First the wood was thoroughly cleaned (54 man hours), and then the wood was polished for protection and appearance (25 man hours). Obviously, this was very labor-intensive work, and we all thank Kay and her crew of volunteers for their diligence and dedication. The results certainly speak for themselves!

From the Trustee's Corner...

The trustees have been extremely active the first quarter of 2011:

1. Parking Lot Lighting

We have replaced all outdoor parking lot fixtures and added brighter, more efficient lighting. This will add much greater security for our members and guests during evening hours and should eliminate approximately \$800.00 per year in electrical costs.



2. Atrium Roof Repair

The necessary work to stop "on going" leaks in the atrium has been completed. The DeShazio Roofing Company, recommended by our roofing consultant Jim Talley, performed this work.

3. Our Parsonage

We have replaced the microwave oven in our parsonage and are currently in the process of acquiring bids for replacement of the roof and windows. This work may be completed in 2011 if adequate funding can be arranged.

4. Sanctuary Windows

We have completed touch up painting and re-caulking of the windows in the sanctuary. This work was done by the Bone Painting Company.

5. Sale of Church Bus

We have sold our 15 passenger mini-bus to CarMax for the price of \$5,500.00. The bus was rarely used and cost our church many dollars on maintenance costs and insurance.




Book Review: Gnostic Gospels by Elaine Pagels

We are all familiar with the Gospels of the New Testament as Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. But what are the Gnostic Gospels? Discovered in 1945 in an Egyptian cave, these sacred books are the writings of one of the earliest Christian sects. In this book, Elaine Pagels, a linguist with fluency in the first century Biblical languages, digs into the genesis of the Gnostic Gospels as well as the central beliefs of this varied group of original theologians.

How does the studying of these ancient writings contribute to an understanding of early Christians and the church? Discussing some of the controversies such as the resurrection of Christ, "one God, one bishop" politics, and God as Father or God as Mother, Elaine makes it clear that much disagreement between the Gnostics and the orthodox Christians marked the beginning of the Christian Church and its body of beliefs.

Reading this book will help you to articulate your own faith as well as to understand the events leading up to the establishment of the catholic Church, its creeds, and our Christian heritage.
