Lenten Resurrection Days

"Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise." (Luke 23:42-43)

This year lent brings us far, through most of April; Easter takes its time. This gives us time to contemplate what it means that even Lenten days are resurrection ones. Here, on the cross, on Good Friday, in the middle of crucifixion, comes the news of resurrection. "Today" is the hopeful word of promise the dying Jesus gives to another dying one at his side: "Today you will be with me in paradise."

Even these Lenten days of ours are resurrected ones. Whenever we gather, it is as Martin Luther said, that we celebrate another little Easter. Resurrection is the word Jesus speaks not after death, but right into the middle of it. Paradise is the joy that the living and the dying have in experiencing the startling and wonderful news.

One ordinary day years ago I sat at Margaret's bedside on her dying day. She had no other family or friends to be with her. As her breathing became more shallow she slipped in and out of consciousness, and as the day went on sitting with her, so did I. I was napping around 2 p.m. when she awoke to startle me. She could not open her eyes, but she began to talk to me.

"Pastor, pastor, look! Look!" She spoke with urgency as I asked her what she was looking at.

"Can't you see, pastor, oh, look. There is Jesus there!" She pointed at the ceiling. "And look at how beautiful he is. Oh, pastor, I wish you could see what I see."

Had Margaret been able to open her eyes, she would have seen my tears, and she would have lost this vision God gave her of where death was leading. I will never forget that day, or Margaret's dying, ecstatic face in seeing Jesus, her eyes closed, her reaching out for glory. She was not crazy, she had not lost her sense of reality, no, Margaret was experiencing resurrection a bit early.

It was about an hour later that she slept away. Never before and never since have I so rejoiced over a death. I think of Margaret all the time, almost every day, and always when I am at another deathbed. Even at the grave we make our song! One day we will be with Jesus Christ in paradise. We look forward to the unending day when the limitations of this mortal life are over. And while we wait for that great and glorious day, is it not true that this resurrected life of yours and mine has already begun? Is God not free to grace us along with Margaret with resurrection a bit early?

As another Easter comes, can you gain a sense of all that is just in front of us! What of this life keeps you from being able to see it, and take in that glory?

March 13 - April 17: Max Lee (Assoc. Professor of New Testament at North Park Seminary) teaches a class entitled "Faith and Discipleship in the Gospel of John". The Bible study series will focus on the various memorable characters of John's gospel, and what real faith looks like. It explores why faith is so difficult at times, and we find in the characters of John's gospel warnings, assurances and the exhortation to genuinely trust God and live out our calling as true believers.

4th Sunday: The Samaritan Woman and the Mission of the Church (John 4)

5th Sunday: Grace and Truth for Peter (John 18:21)

Ongoing intergenerational class: Pastors Erik & Andrea lead a time of experiential learning, storytelling, relationship-building and intergenerational fun. Please consider joining them in room 203 (for high school students and adults of any age).

FOR CHILDREN: Children's Sunday School Rotations

April: "Paul on the Road to Damascus" - workshops will include Games, Art, Drama and Science.

May: "Witnesses Today" - Do you have a story to tell? Telling stories is a traditional way of passing important information from person to person and from generation to generation. When we tell stories of our faith we are passing wisdom and our understanding of God to others.

Sunday School rotations in May are focused on the theme "Witnesses Today." **WE NEED STORYTELLERS!!** These are some types of stories you could tell:

- ◆ an experience you had at camp or on a mission trip or in youth group
- ◆ a time you felt close to God, Jesus and/or the Holy Spirit
- ◆ how you came to faith
- ◆ how you came to Winnetka Covenant

Storytellers can tell their stories to all age groups (4's & 5's, 1st & 2nd grade and 3rd-5th grade) or to just one of those groups. Stories can be short or long. MISSION NEWS

Following is a story that came to us in a letter from Gary and Mary Lou Sander, Covenant missionaries to Colombia who are supported by Winnetka Covenant Church. It demonstrates how the most simple things for us to do, such as donating a pair of used glasses, can be life-changing for the recipient.

Pastor Porfirio Cassares was traveling on the bus from the small town of San Carlos, on his way to attend a ministry couples encounter. He chose his seat on the bus and got comfortable for the 90 minute trip. He overheard one of the passengers on the bus responding to a comment from another passenger regarding Evangelical Christians. His ears perked up and he paid attention.

The passenger was saying that he really had no use for the Church. It hadn't ever done anything for him and he saw it as a lot of words about things that he didn't understand and that he wasn't interested in. That was the case, however, until three weeks earlier. You see, this passenger was constantly looking around him, out the window, as he was talking. One month earlier the passenger never would have looked out the window of the bus. His eyesight was not good enough to see any real distance. So he usually just paid attention to what was around him in his immediate vicinity. But this day, this Thursday afternoon, the passenger was talking out loud on the bus and was looking around him.

Three weeks earlier, while he was walking through the town of San Carlos on his way to work, he noticed a lot of people in the back yard of a house. People don't usually gather in San Carlos in the back yard of a house unless something really interesting is going on. So the man headed behind the house to find out what was going on. He found out that there were some people from the U.S. there giving away eyeglasses. Since he couldn't see very well he decided to forego working and try to get a pair of glasses. When his turn came, he was examined, tried on a few pair of glasses and found the pair that corrected his eyesight. Just like that he could see!

The passenger admitted that he didn't really understand what was going on in that back yard (it was a Dental and Eye-sight Brigade, put on by the Shekinah Covenant Church, in partnership with the Sacramento First Covenant Church Men's Ministry). He didn't know he was entering into anything having to do with an Evangelical Christian Church. But once he got in line, he was willing to forego any prejudice he might have, because he could see enough to know that people were leaving there seeing!

So the man was responding to a comment from another passenger on the bus and saying that, "you can say what you want about the Evangelical Church, but for me, I couldn't see before three weeks ago and now I can. And the only reason I can see is because this Evangelical Church in San Carlos had these people there helping people to see for free! The only place I know of that has done something like that is the Evangelical Church in San Carlos. Something good must be going on there."

Pastor Porfirio wants to track down that passenger (he got off the bus when he finished his story) and tell him what is going on in that Evangelical Church (the Shekinah Covenant Church). We want to continue partnering in putting hands and feet and eyes to the Gospel and bringing it to the people.

We have an ongoing opportunity to donate used glasses for use by missionaries around the world. There is always a box on the counter in the mission display area in the Narthex.

GREATER CHICAGO FOOD DEPOSITORY - Saturday, May 14, 1:30-4:30 p.m.
