## We Can Do More Together Than We Can Do Alone

Farming communities have a tradition called "barn-raising" - the whole community comes together to build a barn for one farm in a day or two. Everyone pitches in to get the project done.

On Sunday evening, May 22, the congregation is invited to come together for a barn-raising of sorts. We won't be building a barn, but the concept is the same. We'll be making a large quantity of privacy curtains for the emergency shelter at Cornerstone Community Outreach, a mission of Jesus People USA in Chicago. Cornerstone houses 400 people each night, and each person sleeps in a bunk bed. However, the bunk beds do not allow for privacy. We have the opportunity to provide privacy for the shelter guests by sewing simple flame-resistant curtains that fit around the bunks. We will use funds raised in the rummage sale to purchase the material needed.

If you have a sewing machine and are knowledgeable about sewing, WE NEED YOU! If you do not have a sewing machine and don't know the first thing about sewing, WE NEED YOU! This sewing project will be simple enough that you can learn from those who know how to sew. We invite people of all ages to come and join in. Those who sew can teach. Those who don't sew, come to learn and help. Everyone is needed. We hope you'll join us!

**May 1 - taught by Al Laser, "Worship for Everyone"**

A look at selected movements and inspiration for individual expression of worship by common people in various places and circumstances: from slaves to monks and others. Hopefully this class will encourage us toward a more personalized, authentic, 'from the heart' approach with our worship of God; whether praise in joy or lament in suffering.

May 8 - Biblical Foundations for Music

The scriptures have a surprising amount of references to music, both Testaments, and how it functioned and shaped God's people, how it was the primary vehicle for praise, and how it was used to usher in the presence of God. A broad overview of what the Bible says about music, striving to bring understanding and meaning to this great gift from God, one that we can easily take for granted.

May 15 & 22 - Why We Worship and How We Worship

Worship: a religious program or divine encounter? What is worship? Examining our motivations for attending worship. What is "contemporary" worship? Or "traditional" worship? And why the conflict in so many churches? Understanding the rhythms of worship, the progression of the service, the dialogical character of worship. A biblical perspective on the centrality of worship in the Christian life and experience and how music and worship are inextricably linked in scripture and contemporary practice.

**Ongoing intergenerational class:** Pastors Erik & Andrea lead a time of experiential learning, storytelling, relationship-building and intergenerational fun. Room 203, for high school students and adults of any age.

**FOR CHILDREN: Children's Sunday School Rotations**

**May: "Witnesses Today"** - Do you have a story to tell? Telling stories is a traditional way of passing important information from person to person and from generation to generation. When we tell stories of our faith we are passing wisdom and our understanding of God to others.

Sunday School rotations in May are focused on the theme "Witnesses Today." WE NEED STORYTELLERS!! These are some types of stories you could tell:

- ◆ an experience you had at camp or on a mission trip or in youth group
- ◆ a time you felt close to God, Jesus and/or the Holy Spirit
- ◆ how you came to faith
- ◆ how you came to Winnetka Covenant
- ◆ a "God-sighting"
- ◆ a person that you feel exemplifies Christ-like living or who has had an influence on your life of faith
- ◆ a piece of art or music that has had spiritual significance to you
- ◆ explaining how you see or feel God
- ◆ a Bible verse that is special to you
- ◆ and many more stories that you might feel called to tell

Storytellers can be of any age (we'd love to have some high school kids!). Storytellers can tell their stories to all age groups (4's & 5's, 1st & 2nd grade, 3rd-5th grade) or just one of the groups. Stories can be short or long. Stories can be simply told or enhanced in any way you see fit. So, do you have a story to tell? ## NEWS FROM THE TRUSTEES

The Winnetka Covenant Church financial statements through March 2011 can be summarized as follows:

- ◆ Year to date general fund receipts are 13% greater than 2010 and 6% (\$18,000) below the 2011 budget.
- ◆ Expenses through March are slightly higher than both 2010 and the 2011 budget through three months.
- ◆ Year to date receipts are \$6,192 less than expenditures.
- ◆ Cash on hand, including all accounts (general fund, exchange funds, memorial funds, etc.) is \$201,449 at March 31, 2011
