Thirsty!

My soul thirsts for God, for the living God (Psalm 42:2)

But those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life. (John 4:14)

I've been really thirsty lately. The band-aid on the inside of my elbow with the gauze pad underneath is evidence of an early morning blood test, to find out why my mouth is so dry. It may be a vitamin deficiency, or something more ominous, but my thirst, in the meantime, remains. It puts me naturally, organically, in touch with these common biblical metaphors of thirst and of water, of parched desert wilderness longing and of gushing spring provision. When I was in Israel three years ago, I saw for myself the desperate thirst of the rocky mountain desert where nothing could grow, and I heard that every ancient town found its home on top of a spring, in one of those few scant places where there was water. No wonder the psalmist and our Savior tapped into the metaphor that thirst is for this life, and how God's presence becomes a gushing stream.

There are great images for Advent and Christmas. Advent is the thirsty time, that moment in the year when we get deeply in touch with the longings we carry, which all lead us to a hope for God's presence in our world. Out in the wilderness of all that's desperate and incomplete, where life seems unable to last, where wars and hungers and injustices seems to gain a foothold, there in the wilderness we thirst for God! We lament what is, and cry out for help, for life, for water.

And at Christmas, in the birth of God's Son, the world gets its Living Water, a most abundant provision, grace and mercy once, and for all! In the coming of Jesus and the Kingdom of God into our world we see the real possibility of no more war, of no more hunger and thirst. There is a gushing stream of peace, and of abundance found in neighbor love and care.

Here's the point, that our dry, thirsty souls drink in the water of life, that God feeds us with God's own self, that our holy longings are met with the abundance, the fullness of God's own loving presence. God is with us, friends.

Maybe like me, though for other reasons, you are really thirsty these days. Maybe something isn't quite right in your spirit; for sure, things aren't quite right in our world. It's a thirsty time. That's for sure. But there is a spring of water, gushing up to life. Listen to the shepherds and the angels. Follow the start. Like Simeon, hold onto God for dear joy. Christ, the Savior, is born.

Alleluia! Alleluia, let the thirsty ones say.

Another Christmas is here. O people, be of good cheer.
Give love, give joy to praise the Boy,

This is the opening verse of “Why Chimes Rang”: “What gift can I bring?”, the musical (with subtitle I added) the children will present December 15 at 5:00.

Depending on what has happened in our lives the last 12 months, we have widely varying enthusiasms and ways of ready-ing ourselves for “Another Christmas.” For me this year, it is a joy to re-center and focus on the enormous wonder of “The Gift of God’s Grace” - the theme I’ve chosen for our musical focus on December 21.

I’m overwhelmed by the joy and energy of our children to learn the story anew in music. Meanwhile, as Advent prepares us, the adult choir will sing many classics foretelling Christ’s coming: Bach’s “Sleeper, Wake!”; “Lift up your heads ... and the King of glory shall come in. Who is this King of glory? The Lord of hosts.”

We have an array of anthems to feature in worship December 21, from the beloved “Coventry Carol” in a new arrangement with flute and piano (Cindy Buettgen and Nancy Magill), to the hearty “Fum, Fum, Fum” with 4-hands piano (Donna Kuhel and Mary Beth Molenaar). The newest anthem, a Christopher Wills arrangement, uses “Whiter Than Snow” in a touching setting with cello and piano titled, “He Sends the Snow”:

... So God gives us His only Son, the purest, precious holy One;
Like snowfall to a darkened world, to cover ev’ry sin.
Such beauty surprises, a night so cold and dark,
And the light of the moon catches ev’ry fragile part.
Though the gift seems small, a closer look shows all.

GIFT TREE INSTRUCTIONS - choose a gift request. As you remove the tag from the tree, it is most important that you sign your name on the lower half of the tag, detach it, and paste it on one of the lists on the table near the tree. We ask you to do this because we carefully check that we have a gift for each resident. If we do not have all of the gifts, we must purchase those that are missing.

If you are bringing a gift certificate, please put it in a gift bag or box. Just a plain envelope can easily be lost. Also, if you use the same tag that was on the tree, cover over the printing that says what is inside. **It is preferable to make a new tag.**

All gifts should be wrapped and returned to the tree by Sunday, December 14. If you intend to bring your gift directly to the party, please be sure to notify Gladys Johnson.

our Lord Jesus for all your prayers and concerns - and for the good outcome.




