Some time ago a dear friend sent me a “keeper” email. Her friend had just returned from Ghana with something called a “prayer song,” common to the Christian community there. It’s a prayer sung repetitively, and it goes like this:

Journeying God
Pitch your tent with mine
So that I may not become deterred
By hardship, strangeness, doubt.
Show me the movement I must make
Toward a wealth not dependent on possessions,
Toward a strength not bolstered by might,
Toward a God not confined to heaven.
Help me to find myself as I walk in others’ shoes.

The prayer has been a page marker in my Bible for two years now. It’s become familiar enough that I’ve created my own tune: good prayer that belongs to someone else comes to life in me.

On October 6, World Communion Sunday, we will gather, along with the world’s countless host, to remember again what God has done. As Eugene Peterson’s Message translation says, “The Word became flesh and blood and moved into the neighborhood.” Indeed, the journeying God has pitched his tent with mine!

Remember your praying brothers and sisters around the world. Receive their beautiful prayers, and make them your own.

Children's Rotation Sunday School

What is it?

We're now in another great year of Rotation Sunday School. What is Rotation Sunday School? This curriculum style focuses on teaching major Bible stories and concepts through kid-friendly, multi-media workshops, such as: art, drama, music, cooking, puppets, storytelling, games, audio-visual, and woodworking. Children learn the same Bible story four consecutive weeks, rotating to a different workshop each week. Personal connection, familiarity and continuity are provided by a volunteer called a "shepherd." These individuals accompany the children each week and focus on building relationships.

2013-2014 Theme: THE WORD OF GOD

The Word of God, as passed on to us through the Bible and the lives of the faithful, is a multifaceted jewel providing for us many different ways to enter into the story of faith. It is from these words that we receive guidance and support as we travel on the journey of faith. From the ancient text of Genesis to the power of Revelation God's word continues to be relevant to our lives.

October 13, 20, 27 & November 3 The Word of God: The Psalms

Created by the Spirit: Kids will explore Psalm 121 and create 3-D paper sculptures to illustrate the images.

Moved by the Spirit: Kids will play a variety of games, explore Psalm 139, learning that God is always watching over us.

Video Live: Kids will explore psalms of lament, particularly Psalm 22, the first words of which were spoken by Jesus on the cross. Create a music video to reflect the images in the psalm.

Mad Scientist: Kids will explore the wonder of God's creation and images of nature in Psalm 8 using microscopes, binoculars and magnifying glasses.

Share your faith and gifts with our kids by leading a workshop! Being a workshop leader is a great way to share your gifts with our kids. Less preparation is involved than traditional teaching, as you will prepare the same lesson for each of three age groups, and lead the workshop just three Sundays. Choose a workshop that connects with your skills or interests, and discover how you can share faith with our kids in a fun and meaningful way! Fall Adult Sunday School

"The Reason for God:

Conversations on Faith and Life,"

A DVD and discussion facilitated by Peter Hawkinson in the Upper Room, September 15-October 20.

Captured live and unscripted, pastor and author Timothy Keller meets with a group of people over six sessions to address their doubts and objections to Christianity. Using literature, philosophy, real-life experiences and the Bible, Keller and the group explore the truth of Christianity. This series gives fascinating insight into non-Christians' perspective of Christians and Christian belief and practice and helps us think about how to interact with them in honest ways around their questions.

"American Christianity:

From the Puritans to Billy Graham"

October 27-November 24

Taught by Kurt Peterson

Kurt will be relating concepts from the past to our present experiences today. For example, when we study the Puritans, we will discuss the relationship between church and state. When we talk about the mid-19th century, we will talk about how slaveholders and the opponents of slavery read the Bible, relating that to how people today read scripture as well. When we talk about modern evangelicalism, we will talk about ecumenism and other faiths.

Handbells at Winnetka Covenant Church

Music has been a part of worship since Biblical times as found in Psalm 150:

- 3Praise him with trumpet sound; praise him with lute and harp!
- 4Praise him with tambourine and dance; praise him with strings and pipe!
- 5Praise him with sounding cymbals; praise him with loud clashing cymbals!
- 6Let everything that has breath praise the LORD! Praise the LORD!

(The Latin word “cymbala” is used both for cymbals and bells.)

Handbells as we know them are descendants of church tower bells from 16th century England. At that time the practice of change ringing or pealing was common. It took hours of practicing in cold bell towers to learn the numeric sequences required to perform the peals properly. This much ringing was disturbing to the surrounding villagers so something had to be done. With technological advances being made in the ability to cast metal, smaller bells were developed so the ringers were able to practice indoors. In the 18th century tune or melodic ringing became popular which is what we hear in worship today. English handbells were introduced to the United States in the 1830's and '40's. They have been a part of worship in American churches for almost 200 years.

In 1980, our music directors, John and Merle Hanson recommended adding handbells to the music program. They arranged for Schulmerich Carillons, Inc. to loan a set of handbells to Winnetka Covenant Church. A number of high school students and adults quickly learned the techniques and performed in several services. As a result of the enrichment handbells added to worship services it was approved to purchase 3 octaves of handbells with memorial funds. Handbells have been a part of our worship for 33 years. It has been said that the handbell choir may be the ultimate expression of music-making as a community of believers. The ensemble cannot function without each individual; at the same time, the contribution of each individual is meaningless apart from the whole.

As our new season begins I would like to recognize two long-time members of the handbell choir and they are Joan Wallgren who has been ringing for 25 years and Cindy (Hanson) Buettgen who has been ringing for 33 years. They have been individuals in the whole making music to praise our Lord.

Please help us to continue the tradition. We are in need of some people to help with the bass bells. If you are comfortable in the bass clef we need you. Come give us a try!

The Winnetka Covenant Church Financial Summary through August, 2013:

As of the end of August 2013, we are still significantly below budgeted giving and less than the same time last year (August 2012). We are keeping expenses below budget, but not enough to offset our giving shortfall. We still have a \$90K deficit to make up! Thank you to those who have already responded and for others, please help us catch up.

- General Fund Giving and Receipts through August 2013 - \$631,842
§ Receipts to date are 17% below planned budget.
- Expenses are slightly less than with the 2013 planned budget.
- Cash position is still very good due to recent memorial gifts and bequests, however these include designated funds not intended for the general fund and operations of WCC. Overall cash is up 244% from 2012.

My name is Matt Johnson and I wanted to tell you a little bit about the work I do at World Relief Chicago. We are a refugee resettlement agency in Chicago that serves refugees from several different countries including Iraq, Burma, Bhutan, Somalia, and Sudan. The people we serve have been subjected to various forms of persecution that forced them to flee their homes, often times leaving everything behind. We work alongside the local Church to make the transition to life in America as easy as possible for those that we serve. One way that churches get involved is by donating various items that can be given to the refugees that we serve. In preparation for the winter and cold weather, we will have a need for blankets and warm clothing for men, women, and children. The clothing items include coats, hats, gloves, scarves, and boots.
