## On the Road Again . . .



On Thursday, May 12, we will leave the church at 9 a.m. for a trip to Penderlea Homestead Museum.

Penderlea in northwest Pender county is an agricultural community established in 1934 by the U.S. Department of Interior as the first of 152 resettlement projects under Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal. Penderlea was known as a farm city with a school that included an auditorium, a gymnasium, and a teacherage. Radiating off the community center were 20 small farms believed

sufficient to provide homesteaders subsistence and cash to purchase homesteads under a lend/lease arrangement by the government. Each homestead featured a two- to three-bedroom house, a barn, a poultry house, a hog house and wash house. Designed not only to provide modern new homes and land to penniless young farmers, the homestead project employed thousands of out of work men in the Civilian Conservation Corps. In 1934 Eleanor Roosevelt made a personal visit to Penderlea to boost




national
